


Storms: hard-hit Poschiavo (Grisons), with damage amounting to around SFr. 50m.




Storms: aerial view of the floods at Flüelen.

The «Rail 2000» concept was accepted in the referendum of 6th December. (The picture shows the opening of the Geneva-Cointrin airport railway station).




After the opening of the Walensee motorway in November, the legendary traffic jam belongs to history.




Election of National Council and Council of States in mid-October. (Our picture shows the opening ceremony and oath-taking of the 43rd legislative period of the Federal Assembly).

Two resignations from the Federal Council as from the end of the year: Federal Councillor Leon Schlumpf – in our picture as principal post-office official, sorting the railway mail ...




... and Federal Councillor Pierre Aubert (second from right with Queen Noor and King Hussein of Jordan – front, left – during their state visit to Switzerland).




The fall in prices on the world's stock exchanges had consequences in Switzerland too: stressed brokers at the ring of the Zurich bourse.



Forcible eviction of settlers in the alternative shanty colony called Zaffaraya, by the Berne police, was followed by further hard confrontations between demonstrators and police.




Cold record in La Brévine, Neuchâtel on 12th January: minus 41.8°C, the lowest temperature ever recorded in Switzerland.

The Sandra Gasser doping affair: this Swiss athlete had to return the bronze medal she won at the track-and-field world championships in Rome.



Sportswoman of the year: Maria Walliser, who won the title of world champion in the parade discipline of Alpine events and the gold medal in the Super G in Crans-Montana.



Sportsman of the year: Werner Günthör. He won the gold for shotputting at the athletics world championships in Rome.
