A Message from the Swiss Ambassador

"Festival of Switzerland in Britain 1991"



Next year will see the 700th anniversary of our country's birth. This anniversary falls at a time when Switzerland is facing choices which will be crucial for her future in Europe. It is therefore of paramount importance for Switzerland to demonstrate her presence among her European partners, of which Britain is one of the closest.

That is the reason for holding, on the initiative and under the auspices of the Swiss Embassy, the "Festival of Switzerland in Britain 1991". The Festival has the honour to be under the Patronage of HRH the Prince of Wales and the President of the Swiss Confederation.

This project has aroused great enthusiasm and received support from many quarters. I should like to mention in particular Mr Gilbert de Botton, who chairs the fundraising effort, and Mr George Whyte, Chairman of Cultural Events. Mr David Stone is the Executive Director of the Festival. The Festival will take place throughout the year and all over the country. It will feature three kinds of event: some for the Swiss community, others

demonstrating our country's cultural

creativity and, finally, official events. The Battersea Fair on June 29 in Battersea Park will be the highlight of the community events. Federal Councillor Adolf Ogi will address the audience. Not only Swiss citizens but also British friends of our country will have the opportunity to enjoy Swiss folklore and Swiss food and to meet in friendship.

A 700th anniversary ball organized by the City Swiss Club, in co-operation with the Federation of Swiss Societies in the United Kingdom, the Anglo-Swiss Society and the Sherlock Holmes Society will take place at the London Hilton on Saturday, March 9, 1991. For the Swiss living in the north of Britain special events will be held at the Moorside Hotel in Manchester on August 3 and at Hopetoun House near Edinburgh on September 28.

In the cultural field, the events planned will include music, films, dance, drama and exhibitions of paintings, sculpture, photography, Helveticae etc. A lecture series and a seminar will cover topics as diverse as neutrality, literature, mountaineering, architecture and science.

The official event for the British

authorities will be a gala concert by the Orchestre de la Suisse Romande under its principal conductor, Armin Jordan, which, for the first time ever, will tour Britain in the autumn.

The detailed programme of events will be published in several broadsheets, the first of which will appear in December. In addition, a festival brochure, containing messages from the patrons as well as articles about various aspects of Switzerland, is planned to commemorate the Festival as a whole. Such an ambitious project would never have been possible without the generosity of private sponsors and the support of official bodies like the Pro Helvetia Foundation and the Coordinating Commission for the Swiss Presence Abroad (COCO). To all of them I express my gratitude.

Let me conclude by inviting every Swiss and all friends of Switzerland in Britain to take part enthusiastically in this celebration, which I hope will forge lasting links between our two countries.


At the Consulate General in Manchester, Consul Felix Naef is the successor of Consul Bruno Ritter, who left Great Britain for Damascus last autumn.

And the "all that" covers 700 years of history, turbulent and impressive, the making of a state, a nation, **the Swiss Confederation**, a country that loves and practises unity, but rejects uniformity at all times. This unity in diversity will be mirrored over 12 months in next year's celebrations at home and expressed in the United Kingdom by a variety of events.

Festival of Switzerland 1991

The gracious patronage of HRH The Prince of Wales and the President of the Confederation (who, next year, will be Federal Councillor Flavio Cotti) reflects the friendship which has existed between the two countries. The British and the Swiss share the love of freedom and value the rights of the individual. Many are the links that have been forged over the centuries.

The Festival will be a panorama of Swiss achievements in every field of culture, the performing and the visual arts, literature and science, philosophy and philanthropy, not forgetting folklore.

The special Swiss Fair at Battersea Park on 29th June has already been publicised. But many more individual functions, exhibitions, displays and performances up and down the country have been scheduled.

The Festival Steering Committee is headed by the Swiss Ambassador, Monsieur Franz Muheim, and includes the Cultural Attaché, Monsieur Livio Hürzeler. In order to benefit from tax reliefs as donors and the Festival as recipient, a Charitable Trust has been established. The directors include Dr R. Duttweiler (President City Swiss Club, organiser of the big ball at the Hilton Hotel in London on 9th March), the Earl of Limerick (President Anglo-Swiss Society), Jeffrey Long (President Federation of Swiss Societies in the U.K. — FOSSUK), Mariann Meier (Hon. Vice-President New Helvetic Society).

A country-wide presentation of events

At the first meeting of the Trust in September, a most impressive progress report was presented. Space will not allow to give details. The final programme will be published in due course, and its wide scope will enable you to make your choice. Suffice it to say that the geographic dimension will reach from Scotland to the South of England, from Wales to the East Coast. Exhibitions, drama, concerts by British and Swiss orchestras and ensembles, groups of every description, aimed at young and old and every taste and interest. Broadcasting will be involved, the cinema, young Swiss artists, architects and authors, folklore and tourism — every facet of the diverse structure of Switzerland's heritage.

Practical involvement in events in the Swiss Community

The aim is not only to foster Anglo-Swiss friendship and to put Switzerland on the map, but also to promote comradeship in the Swiss community. If you have no Swiss group near you, but have ideas about possible functions in your neighbourhood, please get in touch with Mr Jeffrey Long, President of FOSSUK, 115 Ladbroke Road, London W11 3PR.

You may wish to sponsor an individual event in the Swiss community like the big Swiss Fair in Battersea Park on 29th June, or the Raffle planned for the day, or the concert and get-together organised by the Swiss in Scotland at Hopetoun House on 28th September, or the events by the Manchester Swiss or any other unspecified Swiss function in general.



Tree of Friendship for London

A new 'tree' will be blossoming in London's Leicester Square next year to serve as a colourful reminder of the strong links between the people of Switzerland and Great Britain.

The Swiss Cantonal Tree, which will be unveiled in April, is a tall oak pole decorated with enamelled shields representing all 26 Swiss cantons.


"This beautiful tree will be clearly visible from both Piccadilly Circus and Leicester Square," said Mr Joseph Buehler, director of the Swiss National Tourist Office in London. "It is a symbol of the centuries-old close friendship between our nations — a bond that was instrumental in gaining permission for the Swiss Centre to be built in one of London's most prestigious squares 25 years ago."

Over the years a tradition has developed of the Swiss nation presenting gifts to mark a special occasion. In 1977 the Queen's Silver Jubilee was honoured by the gift of an historic inn sign, a golden crown from the city of Solothurn, which now hangs outside the Swiss Centre in Leicester Square.

During the 400th anniversary of the City of Westminster in 1987 the Swiss gave the people of London the glockenspiel decorated with a procession of herdsmen that adorns the facade of the Swiss centre. Each bell on the glockenspiel is inscribed with the shield of a Swiss canton and the name of one of the wards of the City of Westminster, and its chimes have made it a popular attraction for both tourists and locals.

The tradition will be continued by the inauguration of the Cantonal Tree on April 15 by the Lord Mayor of the City of Westminster. Cantonal Presidents from each of the four language areas of Switzerland will be present, along with the Swiss Ambassador to Great Britain.

Said Mr Buehler: "We hope the Swiss tree will remind the thousands of British people and the tourists who pass by every day of the close ties of friendship between our two countries."



Switzerland 700 in the British Library

Next spring, as its contribution to Switzerland's seven hundredth birthday celebrations, you will be able to get an idea of the wealth of the British Library's holdings of Swiss and Swiss-related treasures. Most have rarely, if ever, been seen before — and certainly never in this context: an exhibition 'Switzerland 700', generously sponsored by Shell (Switzerland).

As visitors wander through the Library's galleries in the British Museum building in Bloomsbury they will see the earliest dated book to be printed in Switzerland (in 1470) and hitherto virtually unknown manuscript description of Switzerland of 1607, decorated with depictions of Swiss knights, Swiss heraldry and Swiss towns by some of the leading Swiss artists of the day. Autograph manuscripts written by famous Swiss such as Rousseau and Cardinal Matthäus Schinner will be coupled with those of famous visitors or refugees such as Calvin and Stravinsky. Merian's handsome bird's eye view of his hometown

Basle in 1615 will be seen with the noble Scheuchzer map of Switzerland of 1712. All four cultures of Switzerland will be well represented with rare and beautiful treasures, but the stars of the exhibition for many will be Turner's watercolour view of the Chateau de Chillon of 1806 and the manuscript of Lord Byron's famous poem, 'The Prisoner of Chillon' which will be brought together for the first time. Less expected and just as intriguing may be the important English royal letter drafted by a citizen of Basle, the watercolour of Tahiti drawn by the Swiss who accompanied Captain Cook on one of his voyages to the South Seas, or the letter sent to the Duke of Marlborough in 1707 which he left unopened. Nor will be the long-established Swiss community in this country be forgotten!

Accompanying the main exhibition will be other displays. Thus you will have the chance to see part of the British Library's almost unequalled collection of Swiss stamps, including many early cantonal issues. Colleagues in the British Museum will be mounting displays of Swiss printmaking, featuring the work of Holbein, Urs Graf, Fuseli, and, more recently, Klee and Lill Tschudi, while exhibitions of gold, silver and bronze coins and medals and, it is hoped, of Swiss watches, will add further dimensions to the 'Swiss spring' in Bloomsbury.

The separate displays will be linked by single Swiss items, such as an ornate lamp dating from Roman times and the famous 'Moutier-Grandval Bible', a masterpiece of European book painting created in about 850 A.D., in a 'Swiss Trail' through the Museum building. All the items will be brought together and integrated in an illustrated catalogue which, it is hoped, will be more than a simple souvenir.

The exhibition will be opening on 3 May 1991.
