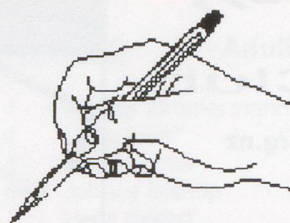

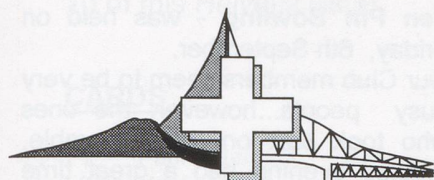

Venturer Scouts experienced Treasure Hunt at the Auckland Swiss Club Farm

Eleven keen Venturer Scouts from the Mahurangi Area (North Shore to Wellsford) and six leaders went out for a treasure hunt camp on the weekend of the 9 - 10 September at the Farm of the Auckland Swiss Club in Kaukapakapa.

The main treasure of the weekend was the experience of sharing quality time outdoors while being trained at different levels. The Venturer Scouts gained the Venturer Workshop Certificate, which is part of the Queen's Scout Award. For three of the leaders the camp was the highlight of their stage three and four Woodbadge training.

Everyone arrived at the site on Saturday morning and camp was set up. Then there were sessions on how a Venturer unit is run and about the Venturer Award scheme.

Lunch was very popular - American hotdogs!

In the afternoon, the Venturers received their first lot of clues to find a part of the treasure map. In one session, the 15-16 year old participants had to think about Self Awareness. It was amazing to see how youths at this age were able to see themselves. Given the next clue, part two of the map was soon found. The Venturers then had the task of organising activities for the evening program. But first, for dinner, the chefs produced delicious spaghetti with two different sauces.

After dinner came the Venturer's first organised activity - an exhausting game called "flag down in the dark". One of the highlights was the campfire, although unfortunately it was very windy. With some difficulties the fire was lit and wow - it was big! With very strong winds coming up the valley, the scouts had to rescue some of the tents and move them in a hurry, before the next groups presentation, and then dessert.

Everyone was quite tired after the busy day and bed seemed a good option for all of the treasure hunters. Following a night of really heavy rain, the next day began with a big, 5-star breakfast, before the next activity organised by the Venturers took place. In the mud, they went off to find another piece of the map.

Taking down tents came next, and then some more sessions for the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme.

Following this, the focus was on Risk Management. Firstly, the Venturers analysed what went wrong with the fire the night before. Later came the task of building a rope bridge across a swamp.

Lunch was a special experience - in three groups they were given a box with food, along with different handicaps such as earmuffs, blindfolds and hands tied behind their backs. The task was to prepare and eat lunch together. Some comments afterwards: "I never thought it could be that hard.....!" and "I'm glad everything works on me.....!"

With lunch over, the Venturers were given the last clue needed to find the treasure, which contained their Certificates and, of course, some 'gold'. The camp came to a close with a final clean up, and then an evaluation of the course. With a song we said good bye.

It was a great weekend - and a great experience!!

English Language Debate

Canton Zurich has announced that from 2003, English would be taught in the third year of primary school, two years before French, one of Switzerland's national languages.

As a result, the House of Representatives has called on the government to co-ordinate the reform of elementary schooling. Many politicians want to ensure the country's national languages receive priority over English when children begin learning their first foreign language. But the Federal Government has no constitutional means to take the matter out of the hands of the cantonal authorities.

French language Film Festival

Switzerland was guest of honour at the international festival of French-language films in Belgium, along with competitors from France, Belgium, Quebec, Morocco, Mali and Vietnam. Over 20 classic and more recently-made Swiss films were screened at the festival, two being entered for the official competition for full-length features.

New Coffee House Deal

American coffee company, Starbucks, is entering continental Europe by teaming up with Passaggio Holdings Limited, one of Switzerland's leading catering companies, in a joint venture agreement to develop retail stores in Switzerland. The new joint company, Swiss-Star Limited, plans to open Starbucks outlets in Zurich by early next year. Switzerland will be Starbucks 20th international market. There are also plans to open further Starbucks' stores in at least six more European countries in the next two years.

Abortion Debate

Abortion, which is still illegal in Switzerland, is once again to be debated by Parliament. The government is seeking to legalise the practice, and set a 14-week time limit.

The proposal has already been ratified, although only by a narrow majority, by a Senate Commission.

The issue is expected to provoke fierce debate as one of the four government parties - the centre-right, mainly Catholic, Christian Democrats - is proposing that abortion should only be legal until the 12th week, and only after a woman has consulted two doctors.

Report on the 2000 "Eidgenössische Schützenfest"

The 2000 "Federal Shooting Festival" was held at Biere (VD), approx. 25 km west of Lausanne, at the end of June - this extremely well organised event taking place at their very attractive local shooting venue.

The actual Swiss-Abroad events commenced with the team competitions in the morning, completed by 301 shooters, all trying their very best to succeed.

But as such things often go in shooting, one sometimes has to be happy with less points than hoped for. The important thing though, was that we were actually there and taking part!

In the afternoon, the individual competitions began, with 40 fully electronic targets to cater for the many marksmen (and women!) from around the world. Each competitor tried once again to gain one, or another one, of the cherished medals.

The official evening function consisted of a dinner, entertainment, speeches, and of course the announcement of results and placings.

In the teams event, The Auckland Swiss Shooting Section finished 21st out of 22 teams, ahead of Luxemburg (however, it must also be said that we had the smallest team!).

Individual results were as follows:

- 37th Henry Werffeli 47 points
- 96th Terry Mason 44 points

Henry was awarded with a Prize Goblet, and both received a "Kranz" (Garland).

- 189th Michael Bünter 40 points
- 257th Valerie Mason 33 points

The overall winner achieved 50 points (equal placings are ranked by date of birth) and there were 298 shooters, so we can be very pleased with our achievements.

Saturday was Parade Day! 3000 participants and spectators were expected, but eventually 5500 took part, resulting in an enjoyable and exciting day.

But all things must come to an inevitable end, so tired and happy we all travelled (with the wrong train!!) back to Zurich.

I'd like to thank my fellow shooters - Terry and Valerie Mason and Michael Bünter; and also my children, Orlando and Isabelle, for taking part, and hope that we will all remember this event for a long time to come. Special thanks also to Hanspeter Enzler for ensuring the smooth running of events for us during both of our shooting sessions, as well as for the parade.

Swiss Talk Trade with Chinese

Switzerland and China began further talks recently, aimed at finally securing Swiss agreement for China to join the World Trade Organisation.

Switzerland is one of the last countries to approve Chinese accession to this Geneva-based body.

The two countries have been at odds over Swiss access to Chinese markets.

Switzerland has been seeking four licences for local companies to sell insurance in China, and also wants to see a lowering of import duties for Swiss watches and other popular Swiss export goods.

Last year, Swiss trade with China reached SFr2.8 billion. About one third was accounted for by Swiss exports to China, with imports amounting to SFr1.8 billion.

Bilateral trade continued to grow in the first six months of 2000, with exports to China up by 43 per cent compared to the same period last year, and imports up 33 per cent.

Hundreds of Jobs Saved!

Months of protest finally yielded results for hundreds of workers at the Swiss company, Adtranz.

About 700 jobs threatened by the planned closure of two Adtranz plants in Switzerland have been saved. The rail technology group said it has reached an agreement with Dutch investors to keep the factories open and productive.

Adtranz announced that it had signed an accord with Dutch investment and redevelopment group, Business Creation, to keep the plants open and to try and save all jobs at the sites.

It said the actual number of jobs would eventually depend on the size of contracts obtained from the Swiss Federal Railways (SBB).

Under the deal, Business Creation will take over the factories at Zurich and Pratteln, near Basel, which will start operations under the new name, Railtech.

Since 1992, Business Creation has rescued or created 38,000 jobs worldwide.

Adtranz sparked protests and widespread outrage in Switzerland when it announced its decision to shut down its plants last November.

The accord comes as a result of intensive efforts over the past year by both the workers at the plants, as well as the authorities in Zurich and Basel, to save the plants from inevitable closure.

Control of Dangerous Dogs

A group of experts has met to draft legislation on dangerous dogs.

Proposals put forward were aimed at counteracting the dangers, but stopped short of recommending a ban on certain breeds.

The group of veterinary scientists, animal rights experts and politicians said in their report that such a ban would not yield any results.

The experts have called on the government to set up a central register as a first step in dealing with dangerous dogs, and to establish an advisory body to handle such cases.

Among their other proposals to parliament were measures to ensure that laws are enforced; greater training for both dogs and their owners; and an information campaign.

There has been increasing public concern at the growing numbers of aggressive dogs on the streets, following recent vicious attacks in France and Germany.

One member of parliament from Zurich, who is seeking harsher measures, has initiated a parliamentary motion calling for a complete ban in Switzerland of all fighting breeds such as pit bulls, bull terriers and rottweilers.

The Swiss Society for the Protection of Animals has been pressing for laws to prevent trained fighting dogs, and those with a history of aggression, from entering the country.

More Job Losses at Sulzer

The Swiss industrial group, Sulzer, recently announced a major company reorganisation that will see 300 jobs go - 150 of them in Switzerland. The company is selling off five divisions, mainly technological, to concentrate on medical devices, and surface and materials technology. These fields offer more potential for higher growth and profitability.

The restructuring, due to be completed by the end of the year, will see the Winterthur-based company merge with the medical group, Sulzer Medica, already 74 per cent owned by Sulzer.

Sulzer will sell its infra, pumps, textile, turbo and Burckhardt divisions. In addition, there will be more than SFr2 billion (NZ\$2.7 billion) worth of acquisitions, spread over the next two years.

Expansion is to concentrate on Sulzer Medica, Sulzer Metco, Sulzer Chemtech and Sulzer Turbo machinery services.

The company aims to double their joint turnover of SFr2.2 billion in the next two years.

One trade union, representing engineering workers, described Sulzer's move as a declaration of bankruptcy as far as the industrial sector in Switzerland was concerned.

Sulzer had sales of SFr5.5 billion in 1999, while annual turnover for Sulzer Medica was SFr1.2 billion.

High Opposition to Privatisation

Half of Swiss voters oppose further privatisation of Swisscom.

A poll has shown that 49 per cent of Swiss people are against the sale of further shares in the state-owned telecom giant, Swisscom.

The opinion polls reveals that only 35 per cent of the people surveyed are in favour of the government losing its majority stake in Swisscom. But the company's director, Jens Adler, said he remained convinced privatisation was necessary if Swisscom was to make the kind of international alliances that are driving the industry nowadays. Currently, 65% of Swisscom is state-owned.

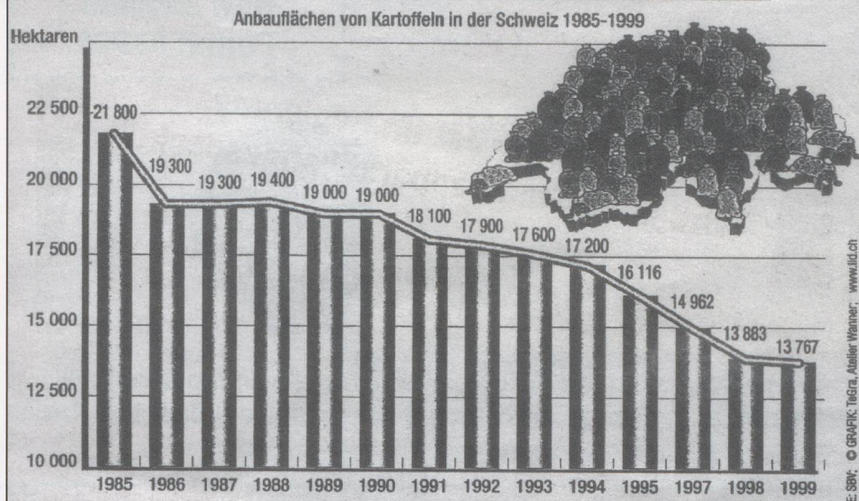
In early September, the government adopted plans to use revenue from stock sales to create a postal bank, even though these plans do not meet with high public approval - nearly two-thirds of those polled did not think it was a good idea.

Surveys carried out by Swiss television and the Sunday newspaper, Sonntags Zeitung, show that Swiss citizens are also not very enthusiastic about the creation of a postal bank.

The head of the Post Office was disappointed with the findings, but said an information campaign was yet to be implemented. The Post Office maintains the plan is the only way for it to provide a non-subsidised public service.

Voting on the project will be in two year's time.

Decline in Swiss Potato Cultivation Stabilising

Overproduction, falling prices, and highly labour intensive - Swiss potato production has declined steadily over the past few decades. But stable prices in 1998 and 1999 have resulted in corresponding stable levels of production.

Early Olympic Success

Swiss triathlete, Brigitte McMahon won the opening event of the Sydney Olympic Games, with Magali Messmer close behind her taking the bronze medal. After winning on the world's biggest stage in triathlon's first Olympic showing, McMahon was almost speechless. "It's unbelievable," she said, "I just can't express it... just fantastic! When I reached the last turn and saw just Michellie (Australian triathlete, winning silver) and me - I just thought 'first or second, I can't lose!', but then tried to push myself as hard as I could." With Messmer coming in at third, it was a great start to the Games for Switzerland. Winning gold and bronze in the opening event, the Swiss found themselves right at the top of the international medal table.... for a few hours at least!!

And Silver made Three... Switzerland won a third medal thanks to the fencing skills of Gianna Hablützel-Bürki. The 30-year-old épéist ('fencer') from Basel exceeded all expectations to win silver after finally losing 15-11 in the final. This individual medal was Switzerland's first in fencing since Oswald Zappelli's bronze medal win in 1952. Previously, Switzerland's fencing success has been an all-male affair. - The Swiss delegation wanted to prove that the seven medals won in Atlanta weren't just coincidence. After three days, that burden became just a little lighter for them! (By the time this issue is printed, we'll know if they succeeded! - Ed.)

Dimitri's Tiny Big Top Museum

As renowned Swiss clown, Dimitri, celebrates his 65th birthday, his museum is attracting crowds of visitors. The museum, with only a few tiny rooms, is very much in character with the country's best loved clown. It was a long-held dream of Dimitri to have a museum, situated in Verscio, a small village in the hills above the northern shore of Lago Maggiore, where the great Swiss clown also set up his own tiny theatre, school and actors' company in the 1970s. One room is filled with elephants figures of all shapes, sizes and countries of origin, which Dimitri collected during 30 years of travelling. Another room is home to Dimitri's 'clown collection' including a cabinet displaying the bald wig which once belonged to Grock, Switzerland's other great 'comical son'. Dimitri's daughter also honours her father with her display of a clown puppet whose features have been made to resemble her father. In a third room there are clips from old black and white comic films, starring the likes of Buster Keaton and Charlie Chaplin, are shown. Nearly 700 items are on show, amongst them a large range of Venetian and Swiss carnival masks, which were all collected by Dimitri.

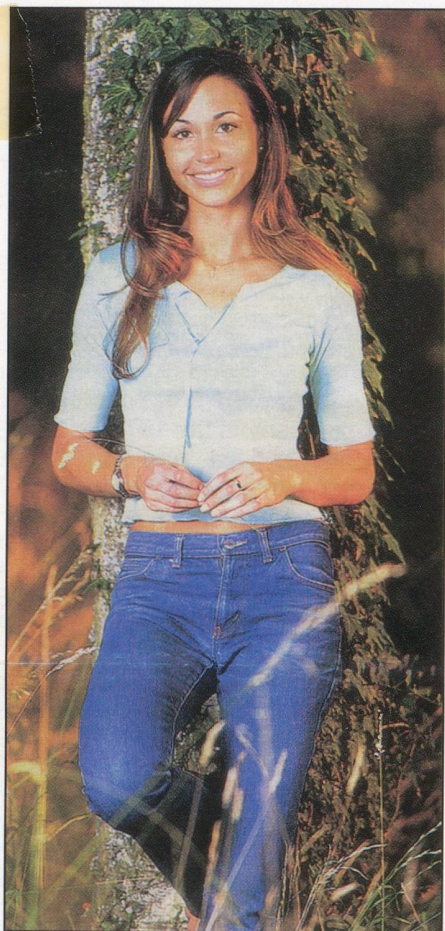

than in 1999, according to the Federal Statistics Office.

But not all regions of Switzerland were equally fortunate. The Bernese Oberland's tourist office reported that in some parts of the country, the number of tourists coming for excursions dropped considerably, probably due to the rain in July.

Generally, though, the tourism industry in Switzerland was able to benefit from the high rate of the US dollar against the Swiss franc.

Visitors from Asia, in which tour operators have boosted their marketing of Swiss destinations, and the United States, were said to be among the highest spenders.

However, local holidaymakers still remain the industry's main source of revenue. "The Swiss themselves continue to be the pillar of Swiss tourism by holidaying at home," said a representative of canton Graubünden's tourist office.

Summer Tourism Higher

Swiss tourism is doing well despite the high rainfall. July had cold, rainy weather normally reserved for the Swiss winter, not the height of summer. Nevertheless, the summer months seemed to be the best for the tourism industry in five years.

The number of nights spent in hotels was the highest since 1995. Pleasant weather in the months of June and August, coupled with a strong dollar, were the likely reasons for these positive results.

June saw an increase of one fifth, and even the dismal month of July, though not ideal for holidaymakers, was still a good month for hoteliers. Six per cent more beds were booked
