News and Articles from Switzerland....

Reform of Family Allowances

A special commission appointed to review family allowances in Switzerland has proposed a number of reforms, hoping to reduce poverty within families by 50 per cent.

The Federal Co-ordination Commission on Family Matters proposed a standardised programme to replace the inefficient existing system, which currently varies widely amongst all of Switzerland's 26 cantons.

The reform proposal is based on a three-tier system: the two existing systems of tax deductions and family allowances, plus the "Ticino Model", which would introduce extra allowances for low-income families. Currently, about six per cent of all families in Switzerland are considered to be living in poverty.

The commission reported that the "Ticino Model", used on a national level, could reduce that by half, after successful trials in the southern Italian speaking canton of Ticino. They also favoured reforms in the family taxation system, recommending a federal payment of at least SFr200 (NZ\$280) a month per child - eliminating cantonal differences.

It was felt the cantons would not object to losing their authority on the issue, as the present system no longer has any bearing on mobility in modern society. If somebody lives in one canton and works in another, there is often the problem of deciding which canton is responsible for paying the family allowances.
