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
Coop profit grows

Switzerland's second largest retailer, Coop, appears to be closing the gap on its main rival, Migros.

On Tuesday, Coop announced a 9.6 per cent increase in net profit last year to SFr331 million (\$237 million).

It said turnover also increased by seven per cent.

On Monday, Migros - the biggest retail chain - reported a 30 per cent fall in profit.



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
