Te-Huia Hemopo only wanted to travel Europe. However, because he fell in love with Deta, the New Zealander now drives holiday-makers and guests through snowy mountain villages by horse and carriage.

tugs at his "Burechutteli", then says in "Prattigauerisch": "Hargott-sacknomal, das weiss i numma!!!" Te-Huia, as his mother-in-law says, is "aina vo unsch" (one of us)!!!
