SOCIAL AND PERSONAL.

The Swiss Minister and Madame Paravicini held a further reception of members of our Colony on Saturday, Feb. 3rd. The large gathering was subsequently entertained to a concert, contributed to by well-known Swiss artists.

Mme. Landolt (Zofingen) delighted the audience with her performance of Beethoven's Sonate op. 78 and especially with the same composer's "Ecosaisse," which she played with a keen sense of rhythm and a clarity and balance which suited them exactly. She played also Chopin's Fantasia in F minor with musical feeling and Liszt's Rigoletto with brilliance and fluency.

The spontaneous singing of Mademoiselle Testuz (Geneva) and the pleasing quality of her voice made her interpretation of Scarlatti's "Son tutta duolo" and "Cia in sole del Gange" full of charm. She gave a selection of Orphée and Saint-Saëns's "Samson and Dalila" with much feeling.

Mr. R. Gaillard gave an especially well-chosen selection of songs with splendid diction in French, Italian, German and English. Every song was a contrast to the other, and his creation of the atmosphere proper to each was perfect. His beautiful singing of Schubert's "Am Meer" and "Der Musensohn" should be especially mentioned, also Rhené-Baton's "Bruit de rames" and "Sérénade Mélancolique." He wound up the programme with Quilter's "It was a lover and his lass," which ended a very enjoyable evening.

Excellent ensemble, clear technique and beautiful, well-graded tone was displayed by Miss Meyrick, who accompanied Mademoiselle Testuz and Mr. Gaillard.

Magnificent bouquets of flowers were presented by the Swiss Minister to Mme. Landolt and Mlle. Testuz.

At the reception of Feb. 3rd, at 21, Bryanston Square, a dark-green leather case of eyeglasses had been left behind; same will be returned to the owner by post, if asked for by post-card addressed to Swiss Legation, 32, Queen Anne Street, W. 1.

At the monthly meeting of the City Swiss Club, held on Feb. 6th, a telegram of felicitation was sent to Mr. Georges Dimier on the occasion of his 69th birthday anniversary (Feb. 2nd), and these kindly feelings were further expressed by a silver collection, made amongst those present, in favour of the Swiss Benevolent Society, of which the veteran is the devoted president.
