SWISS MERCANTILE SOCIETY.

The Monthly Meeting of the above Society was held on the 17th December, at 8.30 p.m., at the Union Helvetia.

Thirty-one members were present when the President, Mr. R. H. Cornu, opened the meeting.

Various matters of importance had to be discussed, and after the minutes of the last Monthly Meeting had been duly passed, admissions and resignations dealt with, Mr. Stähelin, the Chef de Cours, opened the discussion with regard to the proposed "Debating Society." This proposal was made with a view to stimulate the interest of the members. The "Debating Society" should by no means be an independent body within the Society, but only a gathering where discussions and debates on selected topics could be arranged, in order to "overcome nervousness in addressing a meeting." After a debate of some length it was decided that a first meeting of the new "Debating Society" should take place on the 7th January, at 8.30 p.m., at the Union Helvetia, when the matter could be gone into more thoroughly. A number of members present signed on, and a good attendance is looked for on the date mentioned.

The next item on the agenda was "Evening Classes." A detailed prospectus had been sent previously to all members, which largely helped and shortened the discussion. Special attention was drawn to the decision of the Trustees of the Education Department to allow a certain part of the legacy of the late Mr. G. Dimier to be devoted annually to the payment of class fees in the case of members who are desirous of taking advantage of the Evening Classes, but have not the financial means to do so. It was thought that the memory of the late Mr. G. Dimier would be better served by using part of the legacy in this way, than by putting the amount simply to the credit of the Education Fund.

The Chef de Cours further informed the meeting that he was looking forward to a great many applications for the new session of the Evening Classes.

With reference to the Annual Banquet it was decided that it should take place on the 4th April 1925. The Annual Meeting will take place on the 4th February, and members are requested to make it a point to be present.

After a somewhat prolonged discussion about the "Zentralblatt" and "Invaliditäts-Kasse" the meeting closed at 9.45 p.m.

NOUVELLE SOCIÉTÉ HELVÉTIQUE. GROUPE LONDONIEN.

Meeting of the Council on Wednesday, 17th Dec., at 28, Red Lion Square, W.C.

1. The Treasurer reported two admissions and no resignations.

2. The President made several intimations, the most important of which were as follows:—(a) The invitations to our Dinner will be sent out on Dec. 29th. Owing to the Christmas holidays, it was thought inadvisable to send them out any earlier, but an announcement will appear before that in *The Swiss Observer* in order to give everybody good notice of the date (Tuesday, January 13th). (b) Having learned that January 30th has already been booked by another Swiss Society for one of its functions, we thought it advisable to postpone our reading of Monsieur Recordon's lecture on "La N.S.H. et le problème de l'éducation nationale" until March. (c) In spite of our endeavours, it is feared that, after all, it is unlikely we shall find an English publisher who will undertake to

bring out an English edition of "Ur-Ethnographie der Schweiz" in the meantime. (d) Dr. Agénor Kraft, who acted as Secretary of our Group for six months this last summer, has now been elected Chairman of the Lausanne Group of the N.S.H.

3. A letter was read from Dr. E. Steuri, Secretary of the Secrétariat des Suisses à l'étranger, informing us that he was now going to resign from that position. A letter has been sent to him expressing our regret and thanking him for everything he has done for the Groups Abroad.

4. Several circulars from the S.S.E. were brought to the notice of the Councillors, and there was some discussion as to the question of giving an annual donation to the Secretariat in Fribourg, as requested in Circular 51. As the Swiss Government has agreed to grant the S.S.E. a subvention for three years on condition that the balance of its necessary financial resources be subscribed by those interested in the movement, it was felt by the majority of the members that, in spite of our monetary difficulties, it was a moral obligation on the part of our Group to give what support we could to the S.S.E. in this instance. As our own finances are so uncertain, and we cannot foretell from one year to another what our income is likely to be, it was finally decided that we would send £10 for 1925 and whatever sum we were financially in a position to give in succeeding years.
