conditions have now been framed, chiefly with the object of attracting more numerous entries: the teams in future will consist of six Swiss only, weight not to exceed 70 stone, no win to count for the final retention of the cup, unless three separate teams from different clubs or institutions compete.

In order to facilitate the prompt succession of the events on the ground, another referee has been attached to Messrs. R. Dupraz and J. Sermier in the person of Mr. C. Mayr, who is the president of the Swiss Bank Sports Club; these three gentlemen will so arrange their duties that one of them will devote his time exclusively to directing the different events in an endeavour to prevent loss of time.

SWISS GYMNASTICS IN LONDON.

The Gymnastic Societies "Schweizerbund" and "Union Helvetia" having unanously decided to amalgamate in order to form the nucleus of a new large "Swiss Gymnastic Society in London," which should eventually comprise all Swiss gymnasts in London, the constituent assembly of the new society will take place on Saturday, March 21, at 9.30 p.m., in the large hall of the Swiss Club Schweizerbund, at 74, Charlotte Street, Fitzroy Square, W. 1.

It is proposed to have (a) active members' section, divided into various squads; (b) veterans' section for Swedish drill and free exercises; (c) juniors' section for preliminary training.

If at all possible, a team will be specially trained and sent to Geneva to compete in the contests of the Swiss Federal Gymnastic Association on the 17th July next.

The gymnastic exercises will at present take place: On Wednesday evenings at 74, Charlotte Street, W.1; on Friday evenings at 1, Gerrard Place, W.1; on Sunday mornings, if possible, in the open.

All Swiss gymnasts are kindly requested to make a note of the above mentioned date, and to make it a point of honour to be present at the constituent meeting. E. B.

WEEK-END TICKETS TO BELGIUM.

The passport facilities in connection with the issue of week-end tickets to Ostend have been altered, as the result of their abuse by the travelling public. The regulations at present are as follows:—

British subjects travelling with the week-end tickets do not require a passport, but they should carry with them some paper by which they can prove their identity.

A similar privilege will be granted to nationals of the following countries: Belgium, Luxembourg, Holland, France, U.S.A., Switzerland, Italy, Spain, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, China, Japan, Uruguay, Cuba and Panama, who carry with them documents to prove that they are authorised to reside in Great Britain (Identity Book).

Passengers of all other nationalities require valid passports, duly vised.

All concerned should note and see that the revised regulations of the Belgians are strictly complied with.
