SWISS INSTITUTE ORCHESTRAL SOCIETY.

Although circumstances have compelled the Swiss Institute to suspend its activities, the Swiss Institute Orchestral Society is by no means dormant but on the contrary maintains a lively and flourishing existence. It is just now embarking on a new winter session which there is every reason to hope will prove as successful as the last. Well do the members recall, with gratification, the rounds of applause that greeted their efforts at the National Fête at Caxton Hall last June. That is the sort of encouragement to make players practise with enthusiasm and give of their best in concerts. The omens for the season now commencing are favourable. The membership is increasing; and, under the genial conductorship of Mr. E. P. Dick and the inspiring example of the "leader," Mr. W. Pellet (who is also President of the Society) the weekly practices at Fitzroy Square are both pleasant socially and progressive in point of execution.

Apart from the National Fête, the Institute Orchestra last season took part in two high-class concerts organised by the Excelsior Musical Society at Croydon in January and March, being judged worthy to collaborate with eminent professional vocalists and entertainers. It also rendered items at the Swiss Choral Society's concert at Mortimer Hall last Spring, and helped the Union Congregational Chapel in the poor district

of Bermondsey by giving a Saturday evening concert to a packed and appreciative audience. So flattering, indeed, was the reception of its playing on all these occasions that the Committee feel the Orchestra should undertake a more ambitious programme and make itself more widely known. Let it be remembered that its success will redound to the credit of the Swiss colony in London and of our Fatherland. But this ambition can only be realised if more members, playing and otherwise, are forthcoming. We are a musical nation and have the talent, and any of our readers who are instrumentalists—be it strings or wind—are strongly urged to join the Orchestra. There may be some who play a little in private and would like to be in a band but are diffident of trying their hand in public. The Orchestra will make them at home. If in doubt, let them first witness a practice at Swiss House some Thursday evening to note the atmosphere of enjoyment that pervades these meetings.

An appeal is also made for honorary members to support the Orchestra by regularly patronising its concerts and by helping to give it publicity. It is hoped that the *esprit de corps* which makes our National Fête so brilliant and memorable a function will be extended to the Swiss Institute Orchestra so that it may take its place as an integral part of the Helvetic community, besides raising our prestige in the eyes of the English public.
