RESIGNATION ON THE BOARD OF THE

NATIONAL BANK.

State Councillor Alexandre Moriaud has re signed from the Board of the National Bank. AGREEMENT BETWEEN IRISH FREE STATE AND

SWITZERLAND.

An agreement has been concluded with Swit-zerland by virtue of which "Swiss citizens who have become unemployed in the Irish Free State will, with the exception of those employed on board an Irish Free State ship or vessel, be placed on the same footing as citizens of the Irish Free State for the purposes of unemployment insurance on condition that citizens of the Irish Free State enjoy reciprocal treatment in Switzerland."

GENEVA BANKING.

Further details are now available regarding the fusion between the Union Financière de Genève and the Comptoir d'Escompte de Genève, The share capital will be of 110 million Swiss francs, as follows :---

Frances, as follows :— Seventy million Swiss francs in Ordinary shares, arising from the exchange of 10 old shares of each of the two banks, against seven new shares of 500 Swiss francs. This means a reduction of the nominal value of the old shares (as well of the Union Financière de Genève as of the Comptoir d'Escompte de Genève) from 500 francs to 350 frances francs.

NEW SWISS LOAN.

The Swiss Confederation Four per Cent. Con-version Loan, 1931, for Frs. 200,000,000 was launched last Wednesday. The price of issue is 100 per cent., plus Fr.0.60 Federal stamp—100.60 per cent. net, Swiss terms. Principal is repayable at the Government's option after 30th September, 1046, hut is any cerest not block than 20th September, 1946, but in any event not later than 30th September, 1956.

Holders of the Five per Cent. 1923 Loan, due 15th December next, and of the Four and a Half per Cent. 1917 Loan, to be paid on 31st December next, have the right of conversion.

Bonds of the 1923 Loan receive at the time of conversion a cash payment of Frs.10.30 net per Frs. 1,000 nominal converted.

Bonds of the 1917 Loan have to be presented with 31st December coupon attached, and will receive Frs. 6.50 net per Frs.1,000 nominal converted.

Bonds not absorbed by conversion will be offered simultaneously for subscription in cash. Payment for bonds which may be allotted has to be made from 23rd September to 31st October, 1931, under discount of 4 per cent, to 30th Septem-ber, 1992 ber, 1931.

The exports of electrical machinery and apparatus from Switzerland during the six months ended with June last attained a value of $\pounds1, 640,000$, as compared with roundly $\pounds2,000,000$ in the corresponding period of 1930.

INTERNATIONAL PROTEST AT GENEVA.

The monster petition of the Lausanne League The monster petition of the Lausanne League for Christianity condemning religious persecution in Soviet Russia has now been presented to the Swiss Federal Government with the request to lay it before the League of Nations. More than 136,000 signatures are appended to the petition.

The document declares that incontestable The document declares that incontestable proofs of slavery in Russia are continually being received, some hundreds of thousands of Chris-tian men, women, and children, it states, being driven from their homes, many of them being sent to Silvain to work under twille conditions of to Siberia to work under terrible conditions of forced labour.

The signatories maintain that it is the duty of the League of Nations to inquire into the fate of these Christian martyrs.

PERPETUAL MOTION CLOCK.

It is claimed that by the invention of M. Jean It is claimed that by the invention of M. Jean Leon Reutter, a young Swiss engineer, a perpetual motion clock has become a reality. So simple is it that (it is declared) such clocks can be manu-factured at little more than the cost of ordinary ones.

The invention consists of a tube (containing The invention consists of a tube (containing mercury and liquified gas) bent into U-shape, one end of which is sealed in an airtight chamber and the other exposed to the air. "There is nothing extraordinary about it," said M. Reutter in an interview. "When the slightest atmospheric change takes place the mercury mounts or falls in the tube as in a barometer. Naturally one side becomes either heavier or lighter than the other as the mercury changes as the mercury changes.

"Since the tube is on an axis it rocks back "Since the tube is on an axis it rocks back and forth as each end has more or less mercury, thereby turning slightly a rachet-like circle of metal which forms the end of the devices shield-ing box. The teeth in this disc, in turn, wind up the clock movement."

A NARROW ESCAPE.

A NARROW ESCAPE. A corporal and recruit of the "Ballon Rekruten Schule" in Berne had a narrow and lucky escape. Shortly after 1 o'clock on Thurs-day last, a violent storm broke out over the town of Berne, and owing to circumstances which are as yet not explained, the cable of the captive balloon, which was attrached to a motor, suddenly snapped, setting it free. The balloon at once gained a height of about 3,500 metres, and was driven by a strong wind towards the Emmental, where it encountered heavy storm clouds, and was struck by lightening, setting the cover on fire. where it encountered neary storm clouds, and was struck by lightening, setting the cover on fire. Corporal Herter, who throughout his ordeal showed great presence of mind, ordered his com-panion to jump over board with his parachute, an order which was followed and a few seconds later he jumped from the gondola, both para-chutes encoded and hours this paracement of the seconds chutes opened and brought their passengers safely to mother earth about three miles from where the balloon crashed.

The balloon was completely destroyed, but it is a matter of congratulation that no lives were lost. A preliminary investigation has shown, that the main cause of this unfortunate accident is due to the violent storm which broke out before any arrangements for the safety of the balloon could be made.
