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FEDERAL.

INTERNATIONAL DISARMAMENT CONFERENCE.

The Swiss electorate decided by 510,695 votes to 338,838 against the Government proposal for the institution of State social insurance, financed by a tax on tobacco. According to the scheme, every man was to pay 18f., every woman 12f., and employers 15f. a year for every worker, so that a pension of about £10 a year might be paid to every poor citizen aged 66.

The scheme was backed by the Radical Party and by the Socialists. Its rejection was due to a general feeling that its financial basis was not sound and that it would mean a big increase in State expenditure, as the Cantons and Federal

The judgment delivered at Basel last week The judgment delivered at Basel last week against six persons engaged in illicit traffic in heroin drives home once more, in a spectacular way, the solid value of a most important side of the League of Nation's activities. The successful the League of Nation's activities. The successful discovery of the criminals—a story which eclipses any professional thriller—was largely due to the energy and resource of Russell Pasha and the Narcotics Bureau which he established at Cairo three years ago to deal with the vast imports of heroin from Europe.

The actual convictions could only be carried through by the closest co-operation between the police and drug departments of the several coun poince and drug departments of the several countries involved, a co-operation which the League has done a great deal to make possible. Till lately the disparities in the drug laws of different nations gave the trafficker many loopholes of escape. Thus, in Switzerland the definition of an cape. Thus, in Switzerland the definition of an illicit drug was so precise that the astute criminal, by adding something to his compound and thus changing its chemical formula, was able to keep technically on the right side of the law. In Austria, the maximum sentence for a drug case was only fifteen days: in France, too, punishment was absurdly inadequate. But in the last year or two so much strenuous and effective publicity has been given to the matter by the League, which has published a black list of persons in all countries—notably those mentioned above—have been forced by pressure of public opinion to come into line and tighten up their drug laws.
