NEW SWISS BANKING LAW.

NEW SWISS BANKING LAW. The Swiss Parliament approved a new law on banking proposed by the Federal Government. The law is to be applied to all financial concerns which receive sums from the public and operate with such funds. The account and balance-sheets will be drawn up according to certain definite rules, and when the balance-sheet exceeds 100,000,000f. (about £6,353,000) the bank will have to submit every month a separate balance-sheet to the National Bank and a detailed one at the end of every year. When the balance-sheet does not exceed 100,000,000f. the bank has to issue provisional balance-sheets during the year. A bank before investing important sums

A bank before investing important sums abroad or before issuing a loan for another coun-try or a foreign industry will have to ask for the approval of the National Bank. The law also approval of the National Bank. The law also contains some drastic dispositions as to the rela-tion between liquid assets and short-term engage-ments. It further provides for the protection of savings and makes the creation of any new bank conditional on the approval of the Federal Government. The new law is intended on the one hand for controlling banks and protecting deposi-tors, and on the other hand for preventing the tors, and on the other hand for preventing the excessive export of capital.

THE BUDGET OF THE SWISS CONFEDERATION.

The 1935 Budget of the Swiss Confederation was approved by the Federal Council. The revenue is expected to amount to 436.3 million francs, whilst the expenditure has been estimated to amount to 477.9 million francs.

FEDERAL JUDGE RESIGNS.

M. Thélin, Federal Judge and President of the supreme court has tendered his resignation to the two chambers. His successor will be elected during the december session of Parliament.

NEW APPOINTMENTS AT THE BANQUE POPULAIRE.

Mr. Hermann Baumberger, formerly Manager of the Banque Populaire at Winterthur, and Dr. R. Hofer, Sub-Manager at Zurich of the Banque Populaire, have been appointed Managers of the same institution at Zurich.

LESSONS FOR SWISS APPRENTICES.

LESSONS FOR SWISS APPRENTICES. In French-speaking Switzerland a series of broadcast lessons has been organised for appren-tices living in the outlying and mountainous dis-tricts who are not within easy reach of the local educational centre. (Trade apprentices in Swit-zerland are compelled by law to attend classes thorities.) These broadcasts, which are given by organised by the various County Education Au-experts, will be radiated from Sottens twice each week, from November 2nd to March 22nd. Ex-aminations will be held at the conclusion of the course, which has been given with success for several years. several years.

HYDRO-ELECTRIC POWER IN SWITZERLAND.

The construction of the Dixence hydro-electric power plant in Canton Valais is nearing comple-tion. It is one of the largest hydro-electric power plants in the world, and its 10 powerful turbines will work under a waterfall of about 5,741ft.

will work under a waterfall of about 5,741ft. The power plant is nearly two miles south of Sion, in the Rhone valley, at the foot of the wooded hills on which are situated the "Mayens de Sion." It consists of five groups each of one triphased alternator driven by two Pelton tur-bines. Each group is capable of producing nomi-nally 21,250 h.p. The power will be distributed all over French-speaking Switzerland, an area of about 4,350 square miles, and part of it will be exported to the French Departments of the Ain and Doubs.

THE LEAGUE'S BUDGET.

The Secretary-General of the League has written to member States indicating that the Budget for 1935 has been reduced to 30,639,664 Swiss francs, and the individual unit payment to 30,294,65 Swiss francs. contributions for 1935 by Great Britain and the other principal contri-butors to the League's revenue will therefore be as follows : as follows :

NEW DIRECTOR OF THE INTERNATIONAL OFFICE OF THE TELEGRAPHIC UNION.

The Federal Council has appointed M. von Ernst, secretary of the National Council and a noted Journalist, to the post of Director of the International Office of the Telegraphic Union, in succession to Dr. Joseph Räber, who recently died.

The new head of this important office was born in Berne in 1879, and studied law at various Universities both in Switzerland and abroad. At an early age he started the career of a Journalist in which profession he soon made a name for himself. M. von Ernst was for over 30 years a distinguished member of the Association of Swiss Journalists.

The Federal Council has appointed Colonel Herbert Constam, to be the new commander of the "Zentralschulen," in succession to Colonel Borel, who has been made a commander of division. Colonel Constam was formerly com-mander of the "Schiesschule" at Wallenstadt.

BANK FOR INTERNATIONAL SETTLEMENTS

The Administrative Council of the Bank for International Settlements met at Basle, for its forty-sixth meeting, to discuss current monthly affairs.

It was stated at the meeting that the balance-sheet shows an increase from Swiss Frs.655,900,000 (\pounds 42,578,000 at current rates) to Swiss Frs.659,900,000 (\pounds 42,856,000) since October.

The Council discussed the resolutions adopted at Brussels by the gold bloc countries and the results of the conference of Central Banks of the Little Entente at Bucharest, where decisions were taken to stabilise currency on a gold basis.

A report was made on the difficulties of pay-ment of the coupons on the Young Loan which fall due in December.

It was stated that the bank was trying vainly It was stated that the bank was trying value to obtain equality of treatment for Germany's creditors. A number of countries, particularly America have complained that the system of transfers discriminates in favour of creditors who belong to countries having an unfavourable trade balance with Germany.

Countries whose commercial relations with the Reich are well developed and who buy there more than they sell have been able, by the trans-fer of privileges, to obtain higher payments for these acurons. these coupons.

The next meeting of the Council was fixed for 10th December.
