# SWITZERLAND IN LONDON

A group of Swiss hospital and medical experts visited Britain between 30th May and 5th June as guests of the British Hospitals Export Council in conjunction with the British National Export Council and the Export Council for Europe. It was a mission with highly specialised interests, and included directors and senior officers of many of the leading teaching and non-teaching hospitals, together with senior representatives of the Swiss Army Medical Services, Swiss Hospitals Association and the Swiss Medical Press. In planning the programme, a correct balance was sought between hospital and factory visits, as well as a visit to the Hospital Centre, Nutford Place, and to the International Hospital and Medical Services Exhibition at Olympia.

A spokesman of the mission commented on the excellent organisation of the tours, and of first-class medical equipment available in Great Britain, an export market which could be of importance to Switzerland in some fields.

On the last day of the visit, a luncheon was given at the Hospital Centre, Nutford Place, W.1, when it was discovered that the excellent buffet was prepared by the Centre's Swiss Chef and her niece.

The Royal College of Art present, by courtesy of the Pro Helvetia Foundation, Switzerland, an **International Exhibition of Swiss Award Winning Posters** 1959, 1961, 1963. It is being shown at the R.C.A. Galleries, Kensington Gore, S.W.7, from 8th to 20th June.

An exhibition of thirty original graphics — lithographs and etchings — by **Le Corbusier** opened at the Editions Alecto Gallery, 8 Holland Street, London W.8, on 9th June, remaining open until 10th July.

These examples of the graphic art of Le Corbusier — better known as one of the great contemporary architects of this century — are being shown in this country for the first time.

Fourteen exhibitors from Switzerland will take part in the INTERPLAS, the **International Plastics Exhibition** at Olympia from 16th to 26th June. Exhibits range from raw materials, machinery and equipment to semi-finished and finished products of every description.

### TWO NEW SWISS BOOKS

Two new Swiss books have been published on 8th June by Messrs. Edmund Ward, London: "First Book on Switzerland" by Sam and Beryl Epstein, and "Tante Heidi's Swiss Kitchen" by Eva Maria Borer. They will be reviewed in a future issue.

#### A NEW SWISS MACHINE FOR THE HOTEL TRADE

A Geneva firm has just put on the market a new machine for packaging butter in individual portions. This machine, when fed with butter of a sufficiently soft consistency, produces portions of 10 to 30 grams ( $\frac{1}{3}$  oz. to 1 oz.), at the rate of 80 portions a minute, with a precision of 0.1 gram. The wrapping consists of a sheet of aluminium foil cut from a printed reel, with automatic electronic centring of the label, and a second foil acting as a cover. This new system makes it possible to remove the butter from its package more easily, without having to touch it with the fingers; in addition, it offers more efficient sealing and in this way guarantees perfect preservation of the contents.
