NEWS FROM THE COLONY

SWISS RIFLE ASSOCIATION

Annual General Meeting

Once again the Annual General Meeting of the Swiss Rifle Association was held at the Glendower Hotel on Friday, 1st April 1966, in order to render an account of their activities during the past twelve months, as well as to discuss and establish the programme for the forthcoming activities in 1966.

Mr. J. C. Wetter was in the Chair and there were about twenty members present. Mr. F. Magnin, Hon. Secretary and Hon. Treasurer, read the minutes of the last General Meeting and also presented and explained the accounts which closed with a small surplus.

The President then gave a survey of the activities of the Association during the past year. Despite losses through death and departure from this country, the Association still numbered seventy-five active members. Eight shooting practices were held at Bisley during the year, and 5,556 rounds of ammunition were fired, compared with 4,880 in 1964. In a hard-fought competition against the Surrey Rifle Association in which six members took part on each side, our team scored a total of 886 points against 887 obtained by our opponents.

According to the presidential report there will be eight meetings at Bisley in 1966, namely:

24th April, 8th May, 22nd May, 5th June, 19th June,

21st August, 11th September and 2nd October.

Medals received from Switzerland which had been won in additional competitions in 1965 (see below) were distributed to the "crackshots". Moreover, it was agreed that a cheque for £10.10.0 should be sent to the Federation of Swiss Societies as our Association's contribution. As a token of our appreciation for the many kind and valuable services rendered to our Association by Mr. Georges Goodridge, Secretary of Surrey Rifle Association, who has now tendered his resignation, it was further decided that a watch should be given to him as a parting gift.

All members present were happy to hear the announcement that the old committee was prepared to carry on and, needless to say, it was re-elected *en bloc* with much applause.

Mr. J. C. Wetter warmly thanked his colleagues on the committee for the support they had so spontaneously given him during his year of office and special words of praise were tendered to Mr. F. Magnin and the Range Officers.

The members then adjourned for an excellent dinner. *H. SCHMID*,
