ST. MORITZ AND THE **OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES**

A few days ago the international press was notified that St. Moritz would like the 1972 Olympic Winter Games held here. St. Moritz is the only place which has already twice had the honour of being the Olympic Town. It is also certainly the only place in the world which can hold all the Olympic competitions within a few kilometres of the centre of the Town, and also have at one's disposal accommodation for competitors, officials, press, radio, films and television in the same area. Even if one distributes the Games over the whole Engadine area, that is from Samedan and Pontresina over St. Moritz up to Sils, they will still be concentrated into a smaller area than would be possible elsewhere.

Besides St. Moritz is available with its convenient surrounding area so that one can see all the Sports without having to refer to a Plan of an Olympic Village. Furthermore, St. Moritz already has a Stadium which naturally lends itself to Inaugurations and Closing Ceremonies.

How high St. Moritz's chances are is absolutely unknown. We know to the contrary that Sapporo in Japan and Banff in Canada are high on the list. Nevertheless it is the decision of the Local Authorities to prove that St. Moritz was and is always prepared to organise important international Championships.

INTERNATIONAL FAIRS IN BASLE IN 1966

In 1966, the following international fairs are to be held in the halls of the Swiss Industries Fair in Basle: from 8th to 17th February: IFM 66, International Mechanical Handling Fair; from 13th to 22nd May: Third International Fair of Bakery and Pastry Making; from 24th to 28th June: Didacta, Eighth European Fair of Didactic Teaching Equipment; from 4th to 6th September:

Interferex 66, Fourth International Trade Exhibition of Ironmongery, Tools and Household Arts; from 8th to 14th September: Nuclex, First International Fair of Nuclear Industries; from 1st to 9th October: Fifth International Woodwork Fair; from 17th to 22nd October: Ilmac, Third International Salon of Laboratory Techniques, Metering Techniques and Automation in the Chemical Industry; from 19th to 26th November: Surface 1966, First International Salon of Surface Treatments.

In 1966, the Swiss Industries Fair will celebrate their Golden Jubilee. The Fair will take place in Basle from

16th to 26th April.

NEW ALPINE HIGHWAY FOR 1968

It is thanks to the extensive construction of power stations in the Swiss Alps that an interesting new highway system, running through the heart of the Alps from the Upper Valais down to the Ticino, will be opened in the summer of 1968. Both the Aeginen Valley and the Bedretto Valley, at the northern and southern approaches respectively to the 8,200-feet high Nufenen Pass, have already been opened to construction vehicles by means of good roads. The 3-mile stretch of pass highway, and expansion of the two existing valley roads, are all that is needed to provide a touristically fascinating through-route from the Rhone to the southern Switzerland which will be open to the public from five to six months a year. It will result in one of the "cheapest" trans-Alpine roads; thanks to the already existing facilities, the final stage of construction now under way will cost "only" about 20 million francs. The 50-mile stretch from Brig to Airolo, which up to now has led over the busy Furka and St. Gotthard passes, will be shortened to about 36 miles thanks to the new Nufenen highway, which will have a maximum gradient of only 10 per cent.
