WERNER PELLET 80

It is with great pleasure that we announce the 80th birthday on 19th November of Mr. Werner Pellet, of 30 Cheyne Walk, Hendon, N.W.4. He was born at Morat and came to the U.K. straight from the "Ecole de Commerce" in Neuchâtel. He joined Nestlé's in Staffordshire, and it was there that he met his wife. In 1914, he returned to Switzerland to do military service for a year, and then he went to Paris to work with the Swiss Bank Corporation. But he returned to England, and in 1918, he got married. After a short term with a Belgian wool merchant in London, he joined the Record Watch Company in Hatton Garden in 1918, where he remained until his retirement.

Mr. Pellet's great love was and is music. On arrival in London, he joined the then Swiss Institute Orchestral Society where he was Leader of the Orchestra until the Swiss Orchestral Society had to be dissolved for lack of Swiss members. For the last few years of its existence, Mr. Pellet was its President. We not only remember him as a violinist, but also his wife who sang solo parts on several occasions. On one of them, at the Conway Hall, she and her husband were presented to Federal President Motta. As a matter of fact, when the Pellets originally met, it was at a concert after she had won the soprano solo prize at the Stafford Festival.

But Mr. Pellet is also a member of the Swiss Mercantile Society and a very early and faithful member of the London Group of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique. Now he lives in happy retirement, still enjoying piano playing, whilst his artistic wife delights in painting and handicraft.

We join his family (they have a daughter and two grandchildren) and his many friends in wishing Mr. Pellet a memorable birthday and many happy returns of the day.
