After the presentation of a book and a cheque to Father Scherer, the Chairman honoured Mr. Boos, congratulating him on his recent birthday. He presented him with a duly illuminated copy of the New Roman Missal, pointing out the valuable work Mr. Boos had done as former Chairman of the Swiss Catholics in London.

The British guests warmly supported the Chairman in his praise of the hard work Father Scherer had done during the past nine years and paid tribute to Mr. Boos, as well as the present Chairman, for their untiring efforts. Mrs. W. Meier, the only non-R.C. guest, reminisced about the days when she, as President of the Welfare Office for Swiss Girls, learned to respect Father Scherer and his work amongst the young compatriots, and about the time Mr. Boos, as President of the Swiss Mercantile Society, did sterling work for the Swiss community.

The two Guests of Honour next spoke about their activities, and their musings about the past and the present were taken up about the future by Father Bossard.

It was a warm thank you to Father Scherer, many happy returns of the day to Mr. Boos and good Luck for the future to Father Bossard. And incidentally, also a thank you to the host, Mr. Edgar Bonvin who had provided an excellent repast.

OUTSTANDING HONOUR TO ONE OF OUR READERS

Dr. theol. h.c. William Preiswerk, C.B.E.

The last Friday in November is *Dies Academicus* in Basle. Amongst the new honorary degrees bestowed, is a Doctor of Theology on our old friend and S.O. subscriber Mr. William Preiswerk. This was in recognition of his great help and support to the Faculty of Theology in particular and Basle University in general, as well as of his devotion and active help to the work of the Basle Mission.

Dr. Preiswerk, born in 1893, began his career in the "Basler Lagerhausgesellschaft", having finished his schooling with matriculation at the "Humanistisches Gymnasium" in Basle. He came to London in 1919, and soon afterwards was entrusted with the duties of Economic Attaché at the Swiss Legation. When his father died in 1938, he became President of the "Basler Handelsgesellschaft" and one important office after another followed. In 1939, he returned to London and was put in charge of the Special Division of the Swiss Legation, looking after the interests of belligerent nations. For six years, Mr. Preiswerk held this office with great distinction, and he was awarded a C.B.E. in 1952.

Dr. Preiswerk is the brother of Miss Rosie Preiswerk, former Warden of the Swiss Hostel for Girls in Hampstead. His many friends will be pleased to learn of the honour bestowed on him and send warm congratulations.
