LAST MINUTE INFORMATION

The Nigerian Government has declared the International Red Cross Committee's Commissioner General, Dr. August Lindt, as *persona non grata*. This move came close on the heels of the shooting down of a Red Cross plane by federal forces. The I.R.C.C.'s reputation for neutrality, fairness and political disinterestedness is beyond question, as is Ambassador Lindt's personal reputation. Dr. Lindt has resigned.

The Pope sent a telegram to Swissair, thanking company and airport officials, crew and staff on board the Swissair machine which H.H. used on his one-day visit to Geneva. He said he would include them in his prayers.

The Swiss aid organisation in foreign countries, known as "Schweizer Auslandshilfe", is changing its name to "Swissaid". This new name will be understood clearly in all parts of the world.

Entry permits have been refused to North Vietnamese speakers who wanted to come to Switzerland to give talks, in particular to members of the National Liberation Front at present in Paris.

The heartplant patient in Zurich, whose operation took place two months ago, is doing well as far as circulation and heart condition are concerned. Unfortunately, raised temperature has been registered which gives cause to some concern.

Over 50 mountain guide trainees took part in the search for the body of the Valais politician Mr. Michel Rouvinez. He disappeared in a snow-storm in May when a large group of mountaineers were stranded at the Hollandia Hut in the Loetschental. The body was discovered under a snow

cover of 2½ metres. It took 24 hours to find it.

120 Swiss have taken part in this year's soldiers' pilgrimage to Lourdes. A similar meeting was held for Protestant soldiers at Miallet in France, at which some 20 Swiss soldiers took part.

The new Swiss chess champion is André Lombard (Thun), who beat Heinz Schaufelberger (Glattbrugg). He is the youngest ever champion — 18 years old.

WILD GAME SAFARI

In the large Bernina region there once lived and worked the famous chamois hunter Gian Marchett Colani whom J. C. Heer in one of his novels glorified as the king of the Bernina Mountains. Even to this day the area is among Switzerland's richest in game. There are more than 1,000 chamois in the Val Roseg which includes the Bernina. The Alps' largest colony of ibex, numbering about 700, is to be found on the Piz Albris above Pontresina. Many marmot families make their home in the Val Languard and the Val del Fain. Deer roam in the stone pine and larch forests surrounding the village. A pair of eagles moves its roost from the high cliffs of the Piz Rosatsch to the Piz Chalgagn or to the Piz Albris.

This unique wildlife paradise is the destination of safaris rich in adventure which the Pontresina Tourist Office organises once or twice a week from the beginning of June until well into September. Under the expert leadership of Mr. Nuot Vonmoos, an experienced hunter and composer, the excursions alternate between the Languard-Paradis-Albris region and the wildlife preserve of Muottas de Puntraschigna.
