Escher Wyss Steam Turbine Business

In accordance with the agreement reached in February 1968 between the Swiss firms Brown Boveri & Co. Ltd. and Escher Wyss Ltd., all steam turbine activities of Escher Wyss have been taken over by Brown Boveri as from 1st January.

In the U.K., British Brown-Boveri Ltd. has, from the some date onwards, taken over the steam turbine activities from Escher Wyss (U.K.) Ltd. This comprises tenders, orders and maintenance of existing plant.

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DEPARTING FRIENDS

It was in 1952 that Monsieur and Madame Félix Ansermoz arrived in London to begin a career which firmly bound them to this country and the many friends they made in the 16 /years of residence here. They are leaving us now, Monsieur Ansermoz retiring prematurely from the services of the Confederation in order to take up some other work with the British Quaker Movement at Tananarive in Madagascar. It was there that the young Vaudois who had studied at the Universities of Lausanne and London and who had worked as tutor in America for six years (he also holds a doctorate in American Literature), served for two out of the eight years in the service of the Society of Friends. He was in charge of a school and looked after the boys' section whilst his wife, who had had similar training, was head of the girls' depart-Following their stay abroad, the Ansermozs ment. returned to Switzerland, where he was Secretary of the International Quaker Centre. The next six years were spent in the Federal Political Department in Berne. In 1952, he was appointed Chief of the Labour and Welfare Section of the Swiss Embassy in London, and ten years later, Monsieur Ansermoz was promoted to Counsellor.

It was only natural that he should be actively engaged in the foundation and running of the Swiss Hostel for Girls, of which he was Honorary Secretary. He was also a member of the Swiss Benevolent Society and of the Welfare Office for Swiss Girls in Great Britain (both since 1952). Monsieur Ansermoz was a member of the Swiss Rifle Association, and both he and his wife most loyal members of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique. Madame Ansermoz was very active in religious and social spheres, especially with the YWCA and the International Travellers' Aid, and she has at all times been a staunch supporter of her husband, not least in his efforts to retard the aging of the Swiss Community and in helping young people to feel at home here. Many young people owe their work permits to the efforts made on their behalf by Monsieur Ansermoz and his Department.

May we hope that one day our friends will be back here? In the meantime we wish them God-speed and a happy retirement even if — typically — it will still be full of, we hope, rewarding and satisfying work.
