thing the late historian Gottfried Gugenbuehl said over a quarter of a century ago, at a time of great stress and decision. But they could serve just as well as the *Leitmotiv* for this year's National Day. For they contain all our important thoughts and feelings. They express the sense of our National Day Celebration which every year finds its greatest fulfillment in the *Bundesfeierspende*, the collection taken on the 1st of August.

This year, the collection is in aid of women's work under the motto of "*Woman in the service of the People*".

Our times demand more and more of all women. They have a difficult job as mothers and homemakers, as working women in all fields and as citizens. The women's organisations have as their aim to help to train and educate women and to enable them to face the problems of today and of the future. They do this by running advice and training centres in domestic, legal and cultural matters, etc., as well as by thorough professional training. The great responsibilities which the woman of today has to face is not only strange, but it demands special training for independent thinking and acting. The dangers of mass media, but also their positive sides, force responsible women to make their influence felt. Women's organisations relieve the State to a considerable extent of its tasks in welfare and other activities for the common good. This is one of the reasons why these organisations should be supported to further women's voluntary work.

In order to prevent the breaking up of the collection into too many small amounts, it was decided that the five umbrella organisations should be given the money to further their activities each in its own special field. Thus every kind of woman's work will benefit. The five are "The Alliance of Women's Associations" (*Bund Schweizerischer Frauenvereine*), the Union of Women's Societies of Public Utility" (*Schweizerischer Gemeinnütziger Frauenverein*), the "Swiss League of Catholic Women" (*Schweizerischer Katholischer Frauenbund*), the "Swiss Federation of Protestant Women" (*Evangelischer Frauenbund der Schweiz*), and the "Swiss Association for Home Service" (*Schweizerische Arbeitsgemeinschaft für den Hausdienst*).

It is a wonderful task for the individual to support these worthwhile activities by buying special stamps and postcards and above all by purchasing the badge. We Swiss abroad can at least do the latter. The attractive badges will be on sale with Swiss societies and Consulates and Embassies. Perhaps we Swiss in Great Britain should remember that several of the women's organisations which will benefit from our support regularly subsidise the Welfare Office for Swiss Girls in Great Britain and two of them were instrumental at the time in getting the

Swiss Hostel for Girls established in London.

Please give as much help as possible — it is worth it.

MR. PAUL BUCHER — 70

Mr. Paul Bucher, of Bedford, well-known to many of the older generation of Swiss Observer readers, has now fully retired from business life. Born in Oerlikon, he first came to this country in 1920, holding several positions in the City of London and also in Bradford. After 18 months in Spain, in 1925 he returned to Switzerland, but came to England again in 1929 working in the West End of London.

In 1933 he was given the position as first Company Secretary and Commercial Manager of the newly formed Britannia Iron & Steel Works Ltd. in Bedford, a subsidiary of George Fischer Limited, Schaffhausen. He later also became Chairman and Director of Le Bas Tube Co. Ltd., London, and Director of the Holding Company,

George Fischer (Great Britain) Ltd. He retired as Managing Director of Britannia at the end of 1965, but stayed on the Boards of the three Companies until the beginning of June this year. During the last five years he has travelled extensively overseas in the U.S.A., Canada, Africa and the Continent.

Mr. Bucher will celebrate his 70th birthday on 27th June 1970, not at his home in Bedford, but somewhere in Spain on yet another short holiday tour.

We wish him continued good health and many more years of happy retirement.

COMMUNIQUE BY THE POLITICAL DEPARTMENT IN BERNE CONCERNING THE FORUM OF SWITZERLAND

On June 5th 1970, the "Forum of Switzerland London" Foundation was created in Berne. The aim of this institution is to equip existing premises in the "Swiss Centre" in London with a view to organising cultural, social and economic events. In accordance with the Federal order of 18th December 1969, the Confederation will contribute 2.2 million francs to the creation of the "Forum". The remainder of the expense will be assured by contributions from the Swiss Colony in London, from private business and other interested parties.

Mr. Willy Spühler, former federal councillor, has been nominated as President of the Foundation. All the interested parties will be represented at the Council of the Foundation. These will include the Confederation, Pro Helvetia, the Federation of Swiss Societies in the U.K., the Swiss Bank Corporation, Swiss Fair Ltd., La Nouvelle Société Helvétique, the Swiss National Tourist Office and the Swiss Economic Council.
