## **Autorinnen und Autoren / List of Contributors**

*Massimiliano Bampi* is Professor of Germanic Philology at Ca'Foscari University, Venice. He holds a PhD in Germanic Philology and Linguistics from the University of Siena. He has written articles and book chapters on various aspects of medieval Scandinavian literatures (including genre definition in saga literature and the development of the *fornaldarsögur*) and their modern reception. His research interests include Old Swedish and Old Danish translations of chivalric literature and courtly poetry in medieval Germany. He is a member of the research programme *Modes of Modification. Variance and Change in Medieval Manuscript Culture* (2018–2025), funded by Riksbankens Jubileumsfond.

*Simon Skovgaard Boeck* has a PhD in Nordic Philology from the University of Copenhagen (2009). He has published articles on Old Danish texts, on sixteenth-century Danish vocabularies, on word formation, and on a medieval bookbinding as well as a vast number of scholarly editions of Old Danish texts. Currently he is working as senior editor at the Society for Danish Language and Literature. From 2017 to 2020 he was a participant in the “Norse Perception of the World” project at Uppsala University. He is editor of the periodical *Danske Studier* (together with Henrik Blicher).

*Elena Brandenburg* is PostDoc at the Department for Scandinavian and Finnish Studies at the University of Cologne. Her PhD dealt with transmission and reception of chansons de geste in East Old Norse manuscripts (*Karl der Große im Norden. Rezeption französischer chansons de geste in den altostnordischen Handschriften*; Charlemagne in the North. Reception of chansons de geste in the Old Norse manuscripts, 2019). Her research interests include topics like cultural transfer, translation, and transmission of European literature in the North as well as studies of gender and alterity in medieval literature.

*Louise Faymonville* is a doctoral student in Scandinavian Languages at the Department of Swedish Language and Multilingualism at Stockholm University. Her ongoing research examines the development of profane literature in Old Swedish c. 1300 – 1530, focusing on the transmission and transformation of the courtly literary heritage of the *Eufemiavisor* in the late medieval textual landscape. Her main research interests include material philology and medieval Scandinavian literature.

*Fulvio Ferrari* is Professor of Germanic Philology at the University of Trento (Italy). His research concerns mainly the courtly literature of the Nordic and Dutch areas, the Icelandic sagas and the reception of medieval Germanic literature in modern and contemporary times. His most recent publications concern the peculiarities of the Germanic epic genre, the reception of Old Norse literature in Italy and the rewrite of *Darraðarljóð* by the Dutch romantic poet A.C.W. Staring.

*Jürg Glauser* is Professor Emeritus of Scandinavian Studies at the University of Zurich and the University of Basel (Switzerland). His main fields of interest are the Old Norse-Ice-

landic literature (especially Sagas and Eddas) and early modern Scandinavian narratives (ballads and chapbooks) as well as modern Icelandic literature. Preferred methodological approaches include text-transmission and book-history, authorship and textuality, pre-modern Nordic rhetoric, media and memory studies.

*Anne Mette Hansen* is Associate Professor in Nordic Medieval Philology and manuscript researcher at The Arnamagnæan Manuscript Collection at the Department of Nordic Studies and Linguistics at the University of Copenhagen. She is also head of the Arnamagnæan Institute and curator of the Arnamagnæan Manuscript Collection. Her main fields of research are practical texts and compilation manuscripts from the Middle Ages and the Renaissance, especially prayer books and didactic texts as well as encyclopaedic works. Preferred research and methodological approach is artefact philology.

*Karl G. Johansson* is Professor of Old Norse Philology at the University of Oslo. He has published monographs, articles and edited volumes in the field of Old Norse literature and philology. Currently he leads the research programme *Modes of Modification. Variance and Change in Medieval Manuscript Culture* financed by the Swedish Riksbankens jubileumsfond for the Advancement of the Humanities and Social Sciences for the years 2018–2025.

*Regina Jucknies* worked as a research assistant in Scandinavian Studies at the universities of Bonn and Cologne and was a founding member of the Society of East Norse Philology. She has published on Old Norse saga literature, on Icelandic paleography and early modern book history (her dissertation), and on East Norse literature and language, and she is the editor of a bibliography of Norse studies. She holds a Master of Library and Information Science, and together with a team of microbiologists and philosophers, she is currently investigating medieval manuscripts and their biography at Leipzig University Library.

*Jonatan Pettersson* is Senior Lecturer and researcher at the Department of Swedish Language and Multilingualism at Stockholm University, and he is active in the research programme *Modes of Modification* (2018-2025). His main research interests are medieval textual culture and different aspects of textual production, for instance translation but also different modes of textual reproduction. In the research programme he focuses on the role of the town and of urbanity in the history of texts, and studies, among other things, the transition from the medieval manuscript culture to the early modern printed book culture.

*Anna Katharina Richter* received her PhD in Nordic Philology from the University of Zurich with a study on early modern narrative literature in Denmark and Sweden. She works at the Department of Scandinavian Studies at the University of Zurich. Her main area of research is early modern literature and book history in Scandinavia (especially chapbooks, romances), and her current project deals with a manuscript containing a Danish translation of *Amadís de Gaula* and the dissemination of the *Amadis* novel in Scandinavia.
