ZURICH IST ALS SOUVERANER MEISTER BEREITS AM ZIEL

Durch die Niederlage Servettes gegen die Young Boys ist der gegen Winterthur siegreiche FCZ nicht mehr einzuholen. Noch keine Entscheidungen in der Abstiegsfrage in beiden Spielklassen. Bellinzona schloss nach dem Sieg im B-Spitzenkampf zu Luzern auf.

Nach dem Cup Sieg nun auch der Meistertitel für den FC Zurich — einzig diese Entscheidung ist in der drittletzten Meisterschaftsrunde gefallen, während die Beantwortung der übrigen Fragen (UEFA-Cup-Qualifikation, Abstieg sowie Aufstieg und Relegation in der Nationalliga B) vertagt wurde. Zurich's erneuter Titelgewinn (der achte für den FCZ) ist gewissermassen ein Hat-trick, nachdem der Letzigrundverein die Meisterschaft schon 1974 und 1975 gewonnen hatte. Und auch diesmal gewannen die Zürcher den Meistertitel überlegen. Wer sich schon zwei Runden vor Schluss als Gewinner feiern lassen kann und 5 Punkte Vorsprung aufweist, der ist nicht zufällig Meister geworden, auch wenn die Young Boys durch ihren 2:1-Heimsieg über den Tabellenzweiten Servette mit dazu beitrugen, dass der Titelgewinn des Konietzka-Teams, an dem kaum noch jemand gezweifelt hatte, jetzt schon feststeht.

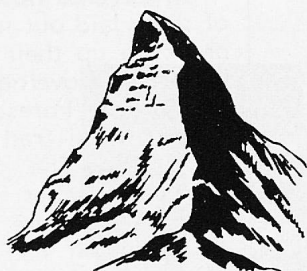

FUN ON FOOT WITH THE HIKING PASS

For visitors who want to explore Switzerland on foot, the Reka hiking pass covers four worthwhile walking areas: hilly Appenzell, the 420 miles of footpaths and mountain trails in Toggenburg, through field and forest and past sedate farmhouse in the Emmental or through the broad meadows and woodlands of the Jura. The hiking pass covers overnight stays and breakfast in one of the many hotels and inns and use of all public transport facilities (trains, postcoaches and aerial cableways) in the district. The brochure, with maps and suggested routes, also contains ideas on what to do in bad weather, such as visiting castles, museums and churches or taking the plunge in indoor swimming pools. Period of issue: 15 May to 30 June and 1 September to 31 October. Two days (one overnight stay) cost Fr. 40, four days (three overnight stays) Fr. 95 and seven days (six overnight stays) Fr. 170.

THROUGH SWITZERLAND WITH THE POSTCOACH HOLIDAY SEASON TICKET

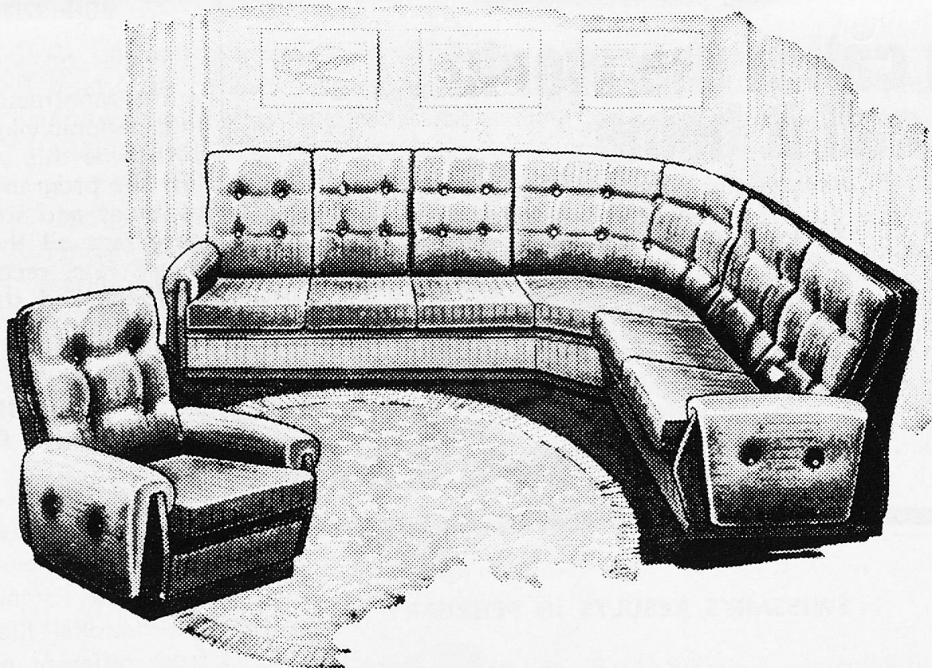
To discover the whole of Switzerland by postcoach you need buy only one ticket. The postcoach network covers more than 4,000 miles of services in Switzerland and across the frontier (Brig-Domodossola, Lugano-Stresa-Varese or St. Moritz, Ponte Tresa-Luino, Thusis-Chiavenna, Davos-Stelvio, Scuol-Landeck and Principality of Liechtenstein. The postcoach holiday season ticket is valid for one month and entitles the holder to half-fare travel on the all-Swiss services and a reduced fare on those that cross the frontier or on organised excursions. The ticket costs Fr. 40 for adults and Fr. 20 for children between 6 and 16 and holders of a holiday ticket.

SWISSAIR'S RESULTS IN FEBRUARY

In February, Swissair's traffic showed a considerable re-animation. While the total of ton-kilometres supplied was 19 p.c. higher than in the same month a year ago, the number of revenue tkm rose 24 p.c. Passenger transport was up 23 p.c., cargo and mail carryings increased 28 p.c. and seven p.c., respectively. The average seat load factor improved from 48 p.c. to 51 p.c. The overall load coefficient advanced from 49 to 51 p.c. Total revenue of the company increased 19 p.c. whereas total expenditure (before depreciations) was up 11 p.c.

NATURE TRAILS IN SWISS FORESTS

Switzerland now has about 100 nature trails, most of them laid out in woods where ramblers can widen or brush up their knowledge of botany, geology and minerals. Novelties are the geological nature trail in the Birregg Forest on the Pilatus near Lucerne and the botanical trail at Aeschi, located above the Lake of Thun. The Swiss Nature Protection League (Schweizerischer Bund für Naturschutz) has published a brochure describing about 70 of these trails in detail. It can be obtained from offices of the League, Postfach 73, CH-4020 Basel, and costs Fr. 2.50 plus postage.

EXPO HENRY MOORE 1976 IN ZURICH

From 3 June to 28 August the Zurich Forum is staging a comprehensive exhibition of works by the British sculptor Henry Moore in the park area on the right bank of the Lake of Zurich. The small sculptures and graphic work will be housed in a specially-erected building and the large sculptures will be grouped in the open air. The exhibits cover work done by Moore from 1924 to 1976 and he personally takes part in arranging the exhibition.

10th INTERNATIONAL JAZZ FESTIVAL IN MONTREUX

The Montreaux International jazz festival, now an internationally-known event, is being held for the 10th time this year. From 25 to 27 June folk music fills the programme. The following weekend is taken by blues and soul and from 6 to 11 July it will be pure jazz all the time. Other attractions will be a music fair, record shops, film showings, photo exhibitions and street and park concerts.

SWISSAIR OFFERS GREATER CHOICE OF IN-FLIGHT MUSIC

Since 1 April, passengers in Swissair's wide-body jets can enjoy a greater selection of musical entertainment. Previously, only one standard program could be listened to over eight channels on the international flights. Now, music buffs can choose from different programs on all wide-body flights to and from Switzerland. These programs are changed once a month.

Another novelty is that, in First Class, earphones are made available free of charge. In Economy Class, however, passengers will also in future be charged a fee in accordance with IATA regulations.

Musical entertainment on long distance flights is very popular. In 1975, about half of all Swissair passengers enjoyed this pastime.
