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

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
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NEWS OF THE EMBASSY

WM-GOLD UND -BRONZE FÜR GEWICHTHEBER BROILLET



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
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RATIONALISED FLOOR CLEANING

In order to stay looking spick and span, large premises of all kinds — supermarkets, factories and hospitals — need to be regularly cleaned, often at considerable cost. The new automatic floor cleaning machines recently put on the market by a firm at Munchwilen (Thurgau-Switzerland) are particularly effective for scrubbing large areas and saving hard human labour, at a minimum of expense. These machines successfully remove the most tenacious dirt even from extremely rough floors, merely by increasing the pressure exerted by the brushes. The machine only needs to be passed over the area once: the dirty water is immediately sucked up by the suction device and the floor is left not only clean but absolutely dry. An outstanding feature of these small automatic cleaning machines is their great handiness: they can turn on the spot and the hydraulically controlled traction drive enables the speed to be varied at will, in either forward or reverse motion. Most spectacular of the innovations offered by this machine is the ease and speed with which the dirty water can be emptied from the recovery tank: fitted on castors and easily disconnected from the machine, it is conveniently tilted into a sink, WC basin or drain. The machine can clean a surface of up to 40,000 sq. ft. per hour under the most favourable conditions. (SODT)

SWISS FIRM WINS IMPORTANT CONTRACT IN JAMAICA

After several months of negotiations, the firm of Schindler Waggon Co Ltd of Pratteln (Basle-Switzerland) has just been awarded — in the face of keen competition — a big contract in Jamaica for the delivery of 12 passenger carriages, eight of which are to be for second-class passengers and four for first-class. The customer is the Jamaica Railway Corporation, which expects to use these coaches on the railway line between Kingston and Montego Bay. The Swiss carriages secured the contract owing to their low weight, which will enable considerable savings in power to be made on the hilly stretch of line where they are to be used. (SODT)

THE OUTPUT OF OIL REFINERIES

During the year 1976, the output of the two oil refineries in Switzerland, at Collombey (Valais-Switzerland) and Cressier (Neuchâtel-Switzerland) totalled 4,905 million tonnes, i.e. an increase of 5.7% over the figure for the previous year. Output capacities however were used only to some 75% and output remained a million tonnes lower than that for the year 1973. Some 38.2% of Switzerland's refined petroleum products requirements are covered by the output of the two national refineries, the remainder being imported. (SODT)

SWISS TECHNOLOGY FOR YUGOSLAVIA

The firm of Inventa, in Zurich (Switzerland) has just granted the Yugoslav firm of Zeljezara Sisak in Zagreb a manufacturing licence for a process for the rapid polymerization of Caprolactam Laurinlactam which makes it possible to cast polyamide parts of dimensions unable to be obtained by other methods. Twelve countries have already been granted this licence by the Zurich firm. (SODT)

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
