CANBERRA SWISS SOCIETY

Für das erste Semester des laufenden Jahres können die Mitglieder der Canberra Swiss Society auf ein reges, vielseitiges Vereinsleben zurückblicken.

Ausserhalb des Programms trafen sich am 12. Februar 1977 eine stattliche Anzahl von Schweizern im Hause unseres Mitgliedes Toni Schlager zu einem Zusammensein mit den Sportlern, die unser Land an der 29. Weltmeisterschaften im Bogenschiessen in Canberra

vertreten hatten. An den ersten beiden Tagen des vier Tage dauernden Kräftemessens lagen unsere Landsleute ganz gut im Rennen. Leider konnten wir schlussendlich nur den Gewinn einer Bronzemedaille auf der Hochstdistanz von 90 Metern bei den Herren feiern. Immerhin ein beachtlicher Erfolg im Reigen der grossen Sportnationen.

Am 20. Februar liessen wir uns dann vom Pioniergeist früherer Zeiten inspirieren. In einer dem "Goldrush"-ähnlichen Atmosphäre wurde anstelle des "Küsten-Weekends" eine Saphire-Safari nach Grabben Gullan inszeniert. Unter der kundigen Leitung unseres Mitgliedes, Noldi Buenter, der in häufigen, oft einsamen Expeditionen schon manchen Opal oder Saphir der "terra australis" entnommen hat, belebten wir den Grabben Gullan Creek in Kürze mit einer emsigen Tätigkeit, die manchen Prospektoren beschämmt hätte. Vor allem unsere Frauen handierten mit Schaufeln, Hacken und Sieben, als hätten sie überhaupt keinen Schmuck. Schon bald hörte man hier und dort Ausrufe des Entzückens. Wenn auch die blauen Steine, erst im Sonnenlicht und durch das Vergrösserungsglas betrachtet, für einen Ring in Frage gekommen wären, schmälerte dies die Freude der Finderinnen kaum. Die wackeren Männer nahmen schon bald vor den im Bach auf Beute wartenden Blutegeln Reissaus und wandten sich den Karten und dem erfrischenden Bier zu.

Einen Monat später wurde dann das traditionelle Wiesenfest zur allgemeinen Zufriedenheit abgehalten. Während auf Toni Schlager's Farm die Canberra — "Dorfmusik" — Brassband zu Unterhaltung und Tanz aufspielte, schmornte auf dem Spiess das Schwein seinem Endziel entgegen, um darauf von weit über 100 Leuten geniesserisch verzehrt zu werden. Bei herrlichem Wetter floss danach noch mancher Tropfen edler Reben sowie von Hopfen und Malz durch die Kehlen. Die Kinder erfreuten sich an einem "Hayride" und konnten sich an einem alten Auto austoben. Weitere Spiele und die im Laufe des Tages geschlossenen Bekanntschaften bereicherten dieses Ereignis und jedermann wird sicher gerne daran zurückdenken.

Für den 17. April war dann eine "Wine-Tasting-Bus-Tour" Richtung Young organisiert, auf welcher jeder ohne grossen Eigenaufwand einen Einblick in die Vergangenheit und die Errungenchaften der Neuzeit unseres Gastlandes nehmen konnte. Nach den Besuchen eines kleinen historischen Museums und einer "Zwetschgenfarm" trafen wir auf

dem "Barwang"-Weingut ein. Erläuterungen über den Produktionsprozess waren von Degustationen gefolgt. Der Durst konnte also gestillt werden, aber der Appetit kam vielfach zu kurz, waren doch die von der Busgesellschaft gestellten Steaks hauchdünn und so knapp, dass männiglich hungrig blieb. Dies liess uns aber nicht weiter beirren, unser Bestes aus diesem Tag zu machen. Den Abschluss bildete die Besichtigung einer historischen "Homestead"; ein Haus, in welchem die Räume mit antiken Möbeln und Geräten verschiedener Stile eingerichtet sind, sowie der Besuch einer Glasbläser-Werkstatt, wo wir die Möglichkeit hatten, den Kunsthändler und seine Frau bei der Arbeit zu beobachten.

Auch die Vorführung des Dialektfilmes "Hinter den sieben Gleisen" am 30. April 1977 war gut besucht. Rund 40 Mitglieder erfreuten sich am köstlichen Humor der drei Clochards, die sich in ihrer Bleibe im Güterbahnhof Zürich mit menschlichen Problemen konfrontiert sahen. Kaffee und Kuchen unserer Damen rundeten auch diesen Abend in gemütlichem Zusammensein ab.

Am Wochenende des 3.-5. Juni 1977 hatten wir dann den Jodelclub "Edelwyss" aus Melbourne sowie einen Alphornbläser aus Sydney zu Gast, die Hauptattrakteure unseres Jodler- und Aelplerfests. Bei einem Cocktail-Empfang durch Herrn und Frau Botschafter Grossenbacher hatten Gäste und Gastgeber am Freitagabend die erste Gelegenheit sich auf Schweizerboden mit dem Lied "Schwyzerbode" näher kennenzulernen. Am Samstagmorgen wurde das Zentrum Canberras kurz in eine Schweizeralp verwandelt, halfen doch Treicheln und Alphornklänge sowie die Jodellieder und etwas Fantasie für Eingeweihte diese Impression zu schaffen, wobei die verschneiten Hügel im Hintergrund einem die Betonumgebung leichter vergessen liessen.

Die Abendunterhaltung selbst wurde zu einem durchschlagenden Erfolg. In dem mit Plakaten aus der Heimat und mit Fahnen dekorierten Saal waren nicht nur unsere anwesenden Landsleute, sondern auch die vielen deutschen und österreichischen Freunde und die australischen Gäste von den Vorführungen unserer auswärtigen Mitgenossen entzückt. Die Jodellieder erfreuten auch diejenigen, welche die Worte nicht verstanden, und besonders Hans Brunner mit seiner klaren Stimme schlug die Zuhörerschaft in Bann.

Besonderen Dank gebührt aber auch hier wiederum unseren Damen, die mit

unermüdlichem Einsatz für das leibliche Wohl der rund 250 Anwesenden sorgten.

Eine Tombola mit schönen Preisen und die flotte Tanzkapelle hielten die Gesellschaft bis in die frühen Morgenstunden auf den Beinen.

Am Sonntagmorgen liessen es sich unsere Jodler trotz einem leichten "Hangover" nicht nehmen, mit ihren Melodien auch noch die ältere Generation zu erfreuen. In zwei Altersheimen und einem Privathaus floss manche Träne der Rührung und die Sänger selbst wurden sich sicher bewusst, dass sie damit mancher Person eine grosse Freude bereiteten.

Ein Barbecue in einem der schönen Pinienwälder in der Umgebung der australischen Bundeshauptstadt sowie Kaffee und Kuchen im Hause eines Landsmannes brachten Gäste und Gastgeber nochmals näher zusammen und sicher werden diese frohen Stunden und die neu geschlossenen Bekanntschaften nicht so schnell in Vergessenheit geraten.

An dem vom "Good Neighbour Council" organisierten "INTERNATIONAL FOOD TASTING" vom 22. Juni 1977 nahm auch dieses Jahr wieder eine Delegation unseres Vereines teil, um die Schweiz zu repräsentieren. In eigener Regie bauten einige unserer Männer ein "Chalet", das, in Teile zerlegt, am Abend des Ereignisses im Saal aufgestellt und geschmückt wurde. SWISS NATIONAL BALL, 1977

Oh, what a wonderful night! And all because three Forest Cantons Uri, Schwyz and Unterwalden, around the Lake of Lucerne, joined together in 1291 to resist Rudolf I, the Holy Roman Emperor of the Habsburg dynasty. That was 686 years ago and ever since, on 1 August, the Swiss have celebrated their well-earned independence.

So this year, on 29 July, Mr. Joseph Koch, plus a committee of four, once again put in several months of hard work to establish the Swiss National Day Ball at Chaucers. Their fine effort was realised by a full house with some 560 guests.

The atmosphere was tingling with excitement when Mr. Joe Schibli, president of the Swiss Club of Victoria, opened the evening with a speech of welcome which embraced not only club members but all Swiss.

Then followed the guests of honour — the Consul of Switzerland, Mr. Werner A. Zellweger, who proposed the Loyal Toast and gave a resume on this historical time. The Rt. Hon. The Lord Mayor of Melbourne, Cr. Donald G. Osborne, who replied by proposing the Toast to Switzerland, and saying how happy he was to be included at this splendid ball which, of course, mirrored the feelings of all present. Then the Swiss National Anthem was played, followed by Advance Australia Fair.

The excellent meal got under way and the wine, especially selected by

Herman Schneider, of Seabrook Cellars, started to flow. Incidentally, these wines, both dry red and Riesling, with the very exclusive Swiss labels depicting a number of Cantons designed by Heinz Grunwald, are obtainable from the Swiss Club.

The Oberkrainer Quintet and the popular Swiss Duo, Marius and Adrien, each played for the dancing during the evening and immediately either group started to play toes commenced tapping and everyone was on the dance floor thoroughly enjoying themselves, including a good number of friends from the Matterhorn Group.

At intervals the Yodel Club Edelwyss and the Folk Dance Group performed, and the applause was indicative of how much they were enjoyed. Ignaz Martinu brought the house down with several tunes of the Kuhglockenspiel and breaths were held in case he picked up the wrong bell.

Due to the fine menu, culminating with many sparkling "Bomb Alaskas" being paraded through the assembly, the music and entertainment, the night rolled merrily on and all too soon it was midnight, the hour to pluck from the barrel the prize winning tickets in the guessing competition. Owing to the generosity of many donors there were a great number of prizes and space is not sufficient in this article to enumerate them all.

The major prize was donated by Swiss Air and Singapore Airlines, and this wonderful prize — a return flight to Zurich — was won by E. Roth, holder of ticket 6072.

The second prize, by courtesy of Ansett Airlines, was won by G. Burrell, ticket 21195; the third, donated by Australian Mines Itineraries, was won by Brian Whitlock, ticket 426; and the fourth prize, kindly donated by H. P. Frei & Co., was won by A. Rutishauser, ticket 3730.

Suddenly it was all over and another twelve months will have to pass before we Swiss can celebrate the 687th Anniversary of the Foundation of Switzerland and this superbly enjoyable night can be repeated.
