The occupancy of the available houses was more or less complete throughout the year and there used to be plenty of joyful activity in Durrenasch.

Times however have changed. The immense boom of world-tourism has opened to our compatriots abroad as well new possibilities and ever-improved conditions. On the other hand the needs and desires of our guests also evolved as the years went by. These changes in supply and demand caused a gradually diminishing use of our institution these last few years; most of our houses remained closed during the greater part of the year. As a result the yearly operating account was each time negative; in this context it may be mentioned that the 'Home' for the Swiss abroad is a private undertaking which has received no financial support, either official or semi-official during all these years!

The situation at hand compels us to close the 'Home' as of September 30, 1979. Considering the special character of this institution and the 23 years of its existence, it was a very difficult decision for us to take. In the hope that you will understand, we wish to thank you for your loyalty and we sincerely hope that you will be able to continue in the future to cultivate your contacts with the old country.


