CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

The Charge d'affaires and Mrs. Walter Sollberger together with the members of the Staff of the Embassy of Switzerland and their families wish all compatriots in New Zealand a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.



Mother Theresa (above) was on her way today from her adopted home in the slums of Calcutta to Oslo, where she will pick up this year's Nobel peace prize on December 10 for her dedication to the world's poor.

The Yugoslavian-born Roman Catholic nun said she hoped to meet Pope John Paul II during a two-day stopover in Rome. But no appointment has been set yet, she said before her departure from Calcutta's Dum Dum airport.

Mother Theresa arrives in Oslo on Saturday to accept the nearly \$200,000 gold medal and diploma.

She plans to donate the prize money for food, housing and medical care for the poor.

She will attend the award ceremony on Monday night and will deliver her Nobel lecture next Tuesday, but she has asked that the traditional \$6000 dinner be cancelled.

Even a simple meal of sea food salad, reindeer steak and ice cream would have been too much for the woman who devoted her life to the poor of Calcutta slums. She asked that the money saved on the dinner be given to the poor instead.

WELLINGTON SWISS CLUB SUB-COMMITTEE FOR RECRUITING NEW MEMBERS.

Recruiting new members for the Swiss Club — Why is it so difficult?

The question was asked, and a sub-committee of the Wellington Swiss Club set about to find out (Helvetia, May 1979). We sent a comprehensive questionnaire to everybody of the Swiss community in the Wellington area, members of

the Swiss Club as well as non-members. Returned answers should indicate - and a detailed analysis to this effect will be submitted to the Club Committee - what people expect from the Swiss Club, and how it might have to change its activities and attitude to keep itself alive.

Some highlights; a third of all people approached sent back replies - of which nearly double as many were from non-members rather than members; they mainly came from young people, too. Answers and comments show that a large majority is interested, indeed, in the Swiss Club, but many are not too happy with its present set-up. They resent a certain tight inhospitable atmosphere towards newcomers (old-fashioned Swiss provincialism?) and would like more open friendliness and equal contact opportunities for everybody, including friends and associates from the host country. The impression that older Club members - some of whom founding members of the Swiss Club - seem to have turned into a ruling clique (Vereinsdirigismus), does obviously incite opposition particularly in the younger generation. To have a real chance to meet other Swiss abroad is one theme that recurs in over half of the replies. Also, a wish to see some of the Club monies occasionally spent for charitable purposes is expressed by many. It is interesting to note too, that many are not satisfied with the traditional social evenings merely culminating in culinary activities; they want some cultural background once in a while, an informative talk perhaps on actualities in Switzerland, Swiss - N.Z. relations etc. (Wouldn't this be something for Swiss Embassy staff to look into, thus doing a greater service to the Swiss colony and beyond - in a way as is done e.g. by the French?)

One thing that certainly should and could be remedied easily: over half of the non-members who returned the questionnaire, declared they had never officially been made aware of the Swiss Club, or been invited to join! One did not know it existed - well, we have 8 new members so far, as a result of our approach.

And more even, there are plenty of good suggestions how to make Club activities more appealing to a greater number of Swiss compatriots. To all those who took care to fill in the questionnaire, we are most grateful indeed.

Albert Schuler who passed away at Hawera on October 25th came from Kanton Schwyz, Switzerland.

Mr and Mrs A. Schuler were married in Switzerland in 1937 and a week after the marriage went to South America. Unable to find work he returned to his homeland again. A year later in 1939 they came to N.Z. with a group of 20 young Swiss, to begin a life of working on Dairy Farms, working at Okato, Okaiawa and Manaia before purchasing his own farm at Otakeho.

Mr Schuler, was a very keen card player and was also a good shooter coming together with perhaps 15 to 20 other Friends for a shoot before the Taranaki Swiss Shooting Club was formed.

15 years ago he was gored by a bull leaving him partly disabled but he suffered very bravely.

Unfortunately 2 of his 4 children predeceased him. To his wife and family and grandchildren we offer our deepest sympathy.

With a sad heart I received the news of the sudden death of a very dear friend, Charlie Camenzind of Putaruru on the 17th October 1979.

Charlie was born of a family of two boys and two girls but unfortunately lost his parents at a very early age, consequently the children were brought up by foster-parents and relatives. Charlie had the good fortune to be apprenticed as a good tradesman painter in the Ct. Aargau. Charlie always spoke well of his boss which gave him a good start of his future life. After working on many jobs here and there he eventually came up to Goldau. The Depression was still on and jobs scarce and money even less, when I got to know him at the time and asking him to come and stay with my parents who had a Hotel-Restaurant

doing painting jobs here and there. End of the Thirties Frank Ehrler from Taranaki arrived home for a holiday and spoke in glowing tones about New Zealand and so in 1939 a group of six of us left for "God's own". Arriving at Auckland Wharf my uncles, Albert Schicker, Hawera, and August Schicker of Putaruru picked us up and that night at our reception at August Schicker's place Charlie got asked by Dolfie Mathis to come and work at his farm. Later Charlie did a lot of contract painting around the Putaruru district and was well known as an excellent tradesman. About that time Charlie kept company and courted one of Anton Steiner's (Lichfield) girls, the lovely blond Ettie and they married in December 1940. The marriage was blessed with three nice boys and two girls. 1976 Charlie eventually made his first trip to his beloved Switzerland and after having lost all contacts with his brother and sisters he managed to locate them and what a happy reunion it was. His great passion in life was bowling and all his friends of the Putaruru Club paid their last respect by a guard of honour at the church entrance in their all white. Charlie will be sadly missed by all his friends here and in Switzerland. To his wife and family I am offering my deepest sympathy, from his long time colleague.

For Members of the Solidarity Fund

WHAT TO DO AT THE AGE OF 65?

Basically **nothing will change** with regard to your membership of the Fund. The Constitution does not provide for an age limit (as for instance the AVS). Nevertheless, you have a choice of **three possibilities**:

1. **Continuation** of your membership at the same conditions as hitherto.
2. For members with annual savings deposits; provided you have been a member for at least 15 years, you may send in an application **to discontinue your annual payments**. Your entitlements will remain secure at the present level, i.e.

- a. lumpsum compensation of losing your livelihood due to political events.
- b. at all times; the right to have your savings repaid (the amount as on the day you stop payments). This right to repayment is transferred to your heirs in case of death.

3. Withdrawal from your contract, getting a **repayment** of your savings deposits as they stand on the day of withdrawal.
