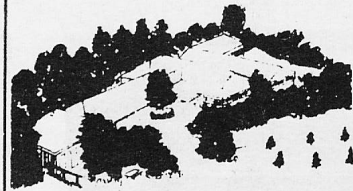

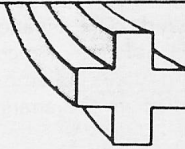

the 60-year-old pontiff later flew by helicopter to this town near the Normandy beaches to honour St Therese, who entered a convent here at age 15 and died at 25 in 1897.

the Pope, who was due to fly back to Rome from nearby Deauville, told a big crowd at the basilica overlooking Lisieux that St Therese's simple message of love still applied today.

His tone was much more sombre in his message to UNESCO.

'The world has been led into an unstable situation due to geo-political reasons, to wounded national prides, to the materialism of our age, to the decadence of moral values,' he said.

'It has been led to a fragile equilibrium which risks being destroyed from one moment to the next because of errors of judgement, information or interpretation,' he added.

### 5.1 SWISSKOR 80

The Republic of Korea, Switzerland's third largest trade partner in the Far East, will be hosting the Swiss industrial exhibition, *Swisskor 80*, in the Korea Exhibition Centre in Seoul, from 31st May to 8th June 1980. On the occasion of this exhibition, organised by the Swiss Office for the Development of Trade (SODT), some 140 Swiss firms will be presenting a number of leading products, for example machinery, (in particular machine tools), precision instruments, watches and textiles. In addition, representatives of various service companies (banks, tourist agencies, engineering consultants, transport, etc.) will also have stands. (SODT)

### 5.2 A NEW SWISS WATCH

In order to celebrate the 10th anniversary of its presence on the quartz watch market, a Swiss watch firm has just launched a new analogue type quartz watch giving eloquent proof of the company's outstanding technological capabilities. The most striking feature of this watch is its thinness. Thanks to a new system of construction, the thickness of this timekeeper has been reduced to 1.48 mm and even 1.35 mm for a number of collector's items.

Second, the two hands give the impression of being suspended in space. As a matter of fact they have been applied by transfer onto two colourless revolving discs placed on a transparent or opaque ground that is used as a platen and supports all the components of the watch. Other striking features are the quartz tuning fork which is sealed under vacuum in a case which is itself under vacuum, and the electromagnetic, rotary, step by step, Lavet-type motor. Powered by a 1.55 volt battery, the watch has enough power for one year. It is fitted with a time zone device making it possible to move the hour hand without changing the time in minutes. (SODT)

### 5.3 ANTI-FLOODING ALARM SYSTEM

In order to give as early warning as possible of water seeping or pouring in, for example in a cellar, a museum, a telephone exchange or a computer room, a Swiss firm has just produced a new alarm system which goes off as soon as the water level reaches 1 mm. The system consists of a sensor connected to a warning device, which may be set up on the spot or several hundred yards away. It can be used not only for detecting leaks in pipes, water seepage or the start of rain but also for warning that a certain minimum or maximum level has been reached. In addition, it can be used to give warning of the presence not only of water but also of any other liquid like oil or chemical products; the sensor is simply different depending on whether the liquid conducts electricity or not. ### 5.4 MINIATURE IRON FOR RESTORATION PURPOSES

In co-operation with the Swiss National Museum, a Swiss company has developed a three-component system for the restoration of paintings, sculptures and old fabrics. The first component makes it possible to control the temperature between 0 and 250°C, with a precision of  $\pm 1.5^\circ\text{C}$ . It is fitted with a sensor and a thermometric safety device which switches off the heating circuit in the event of a short-circuit or a breakdown in the sensor. The other two components are irons. The first, a special regulator-equipped iron, has a teflon coated aluminium soleplate and sides. The second, a miniature iron, comprises - like the regular-equipped iron - a built-in temperature sensor and an amphenol plug matched to the control unit as well as three different sized slide-in iron and stylus inserts with chromium-plated soleplates, which can be used for doubling and setting in restoration work. The great accuracy in the setting of the temperature is one of the main advantages of this new restoration system. Very

delicate restoration work on very brittle paintings and fragile sculptures and fabrics can be carried out with these units without the works of art being damaged by heat. (SODT)

### 5.5 NEW AUTOMOBILE ENGINE

A Swiss engineer has produced an automobile engine consuming from 20 to 30% less fuel. The combustion chamber in the cylinders has been specially designed to create a veritable whirlwind for mixing the air and petrol. Owing to the higher pressure, combustion is improved considerably. Although fitted with antipollution devices, this engine is much faster than conventional models. (SODT)

### 5.6 A CHINESE-SWISS ELEVATOR FACTORY

An agreement for the manufacture of elevators and escalators in the People's Republic of China has been signed between China and the Swiss firm, Schindler Holding Co. Ltd. The first of its kind to be signed in China with a foreign manufacturer, this contract combines foreign financial participation with the contribution of existing assets of a Chinese state concern. A joint company, the China Schindler Elevator Co. Ltd., will be set up, with a capital of 16 million dollars. It will take over the management of a number of existing factories, in particular in Peking and Shanghai, and will be responsible for the installation and maintenance of other units in the country. Part of the production will be exported, first of all to Asia, and subsequently all over the world. 75% of the joint company's capital will be owned by the China Construction Machinery Corporation and the remainder by Schindler Holding Co. Ltd., the second largest manufacturer of elevators and escalators in the world, and Jardine Schindler. (SODT)

### 5.7 LUXURY ALL-PURPOSE VEHICLE FOR SAUDI ARABIA

A short time ago, a Swiss automobile designer, Franco Sbarro, completed an all-purpose car designed specially for Saudi Arabia. Called a Windhawk, it has three axles, with four mechanically operated driving wheels and two hydraulically operated driving wheels. This vehicle, which is designed for gazelle hunting, has five speeds, is powered by a 270 HP Mercedes 450 engine, weighs 2,600 kg and costs in the neighbourhood of 200,000 Swiss francs. (SODT)

### 5.10 DOWNWARD TREND IN THE NUMBER OF HOUSING UNITS VACANT.

On 1st December 1979, there were 15,200 housing units vacant in Swiss communes of over 2,000 inhabitants, which corresponded to 0.74% of the total number of units, which numbered 2,049,700. Consequently the downward trend recorded during the last few years continues. The proportion of housing units vacant amounted to 1.08% in 1978, 1.53% in 1977 and as much as 2.04% in 1976 (on 1st December in each case). These figures are much higher than the average for the period since the second World War. In fact, the proportion of housing units vacant compared with the total number available was always less than 0.5% until 1970. It was only in 1971 that the figure began to increase, the average being 0.87% per year between 1971 and 1975. (SODT)

### 5.11 NEWS IN BRIEF

- **The Altenrhein Aeroplane and Vehicle Factory** recently signed a contract in Djakarta (Indonesia) for the **delivery of twenty training planes** of the AS 202-18 Bravo type. These propeller-driven planes will be used for training pilots as part of the project for setting up a civil aviation network in Indonesia and may not be used for military purposes. Deliveries will start in January 1981. (SODT)
