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# The Symbol of the Swiss Abroad


## From its beginnings to the present design

From 1916 when our Organization was founded, to 1921, we had no crest. From 1922 to 1924, a round signet was used on which the Swiss flag was framed by the German, French and Italian abbreviation of Nouvelle Société Helvétique (NHG).



There was no special symbol between 1924 and 1937. One simply used the Swiss cross. During 1927 and 1928, our Organization as well as the Federal Administration used a variation which suited the Swiss abroad right to the ground: the Swiss cross sent rays into all four corners of the world, just like the sun, thus symbolizing the Swiss presence in the world.




1924-1926  
1929-1937



The first real symbol of our Organization was created only in 1938 by the graphic artist Hans Fischer. It showed the two halves of the globe joined by the Swiss cross and carried the inscription «400 000 Swiss live abroad». The latter was dropped at the beginning of 1945, since the figure was no longer correct.




1938-1944

The two halves of the globe were used as symbol up to 1961. After that, they were replaced by a Swiss cross next to a simplified globe.




In 1963, a new symbol was designed, a globe which had CH (Confoederatio Helvetica) on the left of the equator and the Swiss cross on the right. This crest was used for two years.



The present symbol of «Fifth Switzerland» was first used in 1965. The stylized globe with the Swiss cross at the level of the equator reminds one of the two halves of the globe joined by the Swiss cross first used by Hans Fischer. In 1966, the symbol was again altered, though only slightly. The Swiss cross was moved upwards a little, so that the centre of the cross is roughly where Switzerland is situated, provided one looks at the globe as showing Africa and Europe.

In 1966 the Organization of the Swiss Abroad celebrated its golden jubilee, and ever since then, this symbol has been used as official crest of the Swiss abroad. It was made use of in the plebiscite campaign for the adoption of Art. 45bis in the Federal Constitution and in the same year also for a special stamp issued by PTT, to the value of 20 cts.

«Saint-Gothard - VIA HELVETICA»

This richly illustrated book contains a comprehensive inventory of the salient facts in the history and the present of the Gothard, pointing up with clarity the major political and state-forming impulses which emanated from this pass and exercised a decisive influence on the evolution of the Swiss Confederation. At the same time, the book is a committed affirmation of the future of this most central of all alpine passes. With its wellnigh 300 illustrations – over 50 of them full-colour plates – this book is a fascinating treasure trove and a real joy for every connoisseur of literature concerning communications and postal history. Most of the pictures, documents, old postal cancellations and seals as well as the postage stamps come from the PTT-Museum in Berne.

Here, in short, is a cultural-historical work of enduring value for all those interested in history and philately. Not least among the many charms of this book is its author's delightfully colourful writing which lends the work its unusual vitality. Mr. Wyss has succeeded brilliantly in doing justice to both rail and road in the latter part of his book. The book has been printed and bound with care and good taste and may be described without undue immodesty as a bibliophile work.
