HAMLET (POP 70) GOES IT ALONE

VELLERAT (Switzerland), Sunday.— With a symbolic border post and local passports, this tiny Swiss mountain hamlet has declared itself independent.

As the 70 rebel inhabitants celebrated their self-styled status as Switzerland's first "free commune" yesterday, more than 1000 outsiders marched in to support the unilateral declaration and join the festivities.

Vellerat, which occupies all of 200 hectares (just under a square mile) in north-western Switzerland, is one of several French-speaking villages in the mainly German-speaking canton of Berne which wants to join the neighbouring French-speaking canton of Jura.

Its unilateral declaration means it will no longer pay taxes to Canton Berne or obey orders from Berne authorities, residents say.

Since there are no precedents, no one is sure how the Swiss Government will respond to Vellerat's stand, for which 90% of the inhabitants voted last week.

After Vellerat's inhabitants voted last week in favour of independence they constructed a symbolic border post on the sole access road — which runs through Jura canton — and printed passports valid only within the hamlet.

But a minority still opposed independence, postal workers, who are federal employees, refused to cancel commemorative stamps which the rebels had printed to mark the birth of the free commune. — AAP — Reuter.

On Saturday, July 24th, Werner Schuepbach passed away peacefully in Belmont near Wellington, in his 86th year.

Having kept out of the limelight most of his life, this is an appropriate time to say a few words about this extraordinary man and his life.

Born in Truebschachen, Emmental, into a family of Teachers, he too was teaching in Eriz, where he stayed until his retirement as Teacher and District Councilor. Most of his free time was devoted to the study of Biology, Botany, Anatomy and related subjects in the light of Antroposophical Science. he produced a number of books on these and other subjects, amongst it a study of Goethe's dramatic works, Islamic Architecture and a volume of Poetry. Werner Schuepbach was writing until well into his eighties.

Three of his four children came to live in New Zealand during the 1950s and after several lengthy stays as visitors, Werner Schuepbach and his late wife Frieda settled in Belmont for good.

He lately had become a benefactor of the new Rudolf Steiner School in Belmont and it is thanks to his generosity, that this project came into being. Peace be with you Werner.

It is with deep regret, that we learned of the sudden death of Hans Burkhalter on the 10th July in Wellington.

Hans was born 1910 in Steffisburg, Kt. Bern. When he left School 1926, he began an apprenticeship in the Hotel-trade and later worked in many well

known Hotels in Switzerland and throughout Europe.

He met and married Maria and this became a happy partnership, extending into their working life as well.

1951 they went to Australia where their son James was born. Moving to Auckland in 1953 where they were involved in the formation of the Swiss Club.

1956, Hans became Butler to the American Ambassador in Wellington and Maria was able to use her skills in the service of the Ambassador's residence. They remained in this position for 20 years, serving under six Ambassadors and being highly respected for their integrity and professional competence. Hans could have written a book on all the famous people he met during those 20 years of seeing history being made. But discretion was one reason for his success.

When Hans retired 1976 to his lovely, self-converted hillside home in Highbury, Wellington, he was ready to enjoy the splendid Harbour views, his dogs and his books. One of his hobbies was his shortwave radio on which he listened every morning for 30 years to the News of Switzerland.

Last year, after some very firm persuasion by Maria and James, he accompanied Maria for his first and only return trip to Switzerland and spent some time visiting places of his memory in the Bernese Oberland.

We, who have known Hans, will sadly miss him, but with a feeling that he made the best of his time on earth.

FIRST AUGUST CELEBRATION IN QUEENSTOWN

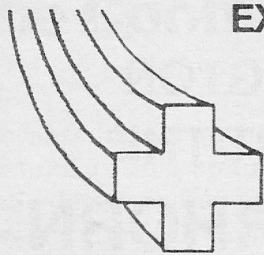
It coincided with the towns famous winter festival which opened by the Major of Queenstown in the Travel Lodge Hotel on August 1st.
