



APOLOGIES - were received from Mr I. Ettienne (charge of D'Affaires), Mr Joe Dettling (Taranaki), Miss I. Bernold (Taranaki), Mr B. Dudli (Taranaki), Mr and Mrs H. Messmer (Wellington), Mr and Mrs B. Fluhler (Hamilton).

This was moved by Mr L. Chamberlain and seconded by Mr E. Studer, Carried.

READING OF MINUTES OF LAST ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING -The minutes of the last Annual General Meeting were read by Mrs P. Rowe and found correct. This was moved by Mr J. Stucki and seconded by Mr H. Mathys. Carried. There were no matters arising from the minutes.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT - read by Mr R. Dudli. Mr Dudli opened his report by mentioning the passing on of a number of members - two in particular he mentioned. Mr Tony Peyer, who was the first President and founder of the Swiss Society, and Mrs Hedy Biland, a long time editor of Hedy's Corner in the 'Helvetia'.

Also to all members who had lost a dear one in the past year, he extended his deepest sympathy. He then asked for a moment of silence as a mark of respect. Mr Dudli then remarked that the Society was financially in a very sound position, with some of the funds invested at the National Bank in Hawera. The Society had not been called upon to give any financial aid to any members. Mr Dudli went on to say that it was very pleasing to see the membership increasing steadily from year to year and mentioned that subs must be paid by the beginning of October otherwise no Helvetia will be sent to non-financial members.

After taking quotations from four different firms, to do the printing of the Helvetia, Mr Dudli decided to use the Stratford Press to do the job. Mr Dudli then paid a special thanks to all advertisers. In conclusion Mr Dudli thanked the editing committee for their co-operation throughout the year, the riflemaster for his organisation with the society competitions, and also his committee who had given their full support during the year, especially his secretary for all her fine work. Mr A. Binder moved that the president's report be accepted and Mr L. Chamberlain seconded it.

FINANCIAL REPORT - was read by Mrs P. Rowe. It was moved by Mr A. Binder and seconded by Mr L. Chamberlain, that the financial report be accepted.

Matters arising from the report: Taxation - it was explained the tax we pay was on interest received. Insurance - this is necessary to cover the shooting. Difference of tax paid in the 1983 and 1984 year - it was explained that the 1983 tax was sent to Taranaki Swiss Club

in error and by the time the society received the tax bill, our financial year for 1983 had been closed off so the 1983 tax was paid in the 1984 year. Interest Rates - the interest rate on our cheque account is 3% and the interest rate on our term deposits are 14% on \$2500 and 10% on \$2000.

SETTING OF SUBSCRIPTIONS - Mr Dudli suggested that the subs stay at \$7. He then asked for someone to move and second it. Mr H. Staheli moved that the subs stay at \$7 and Mr W. Unternahrer seconded it. Carried.

HELVETIA REPORT - Read by Mr Dudli. Seven small and three big issues of the Helvetia had been sent in the 1983/84 year. Since January 1984 the big issues have been sent out by the Swiss Embassy in Wellington to 1550 registered Swiss in New Zealand, therefore no one should receive two issues. It had been brought to Mr Dudli's attention that approximately 150 of our society members are not registered Swiss, but are very active within their clubs. So the committee was forced to send the four big issues to these 150 members, although this would bring extra expense to the society. He thanked the Swiss Embassy for easing the workload by sending out

the large Helvetia, and leaving the editing committee with only 150 to send out. Some members may have been surprised to receive the first Helvetia which was printed in Stratford with the proper Swiss emblem on the front page in red and white. Contrary to the decision made at the Annual General Meeting to have the emblem in black and white. There was no extra charge for this, and it was decided to leave it at that. Mr Dudli then apologised for the errors that may have occurred during the first year in publishing the Helvetia. Finally, he thanked his editing committee for all their support, and a very special thanks to his co-editor. Another question arose concerning father and son living in the same household, but only required one Helvetia. The reply was in this case the additional member need only pay \$3.00.

RIFLEMASTER'S REPORT - this report was read by Mr W. Unternahrer. One question arose, how many medals were purchased? Mr Unternahrer replied, 100. Mr Dudli thanked Mr Unternahrer for his report.

APPOINTMENT OF SCRUTINEERS - Mr L. Kuriger moved that Mr D. Hiestand and Mr A. Binder be appointed scrutineers. Mr Dudli pointed out that Mr A. Binder was to chair the meeting during the election of officers and could we call for another scrutineer. As Mr Hiestand was nominated, it was seconded by Mr H. Mathys. Mr L. Chamberlain then nominated Mr E. Studer and Mrs M. Gianotti was the seconder.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS & EDITING COMMITTEE -Mr Dudli stated that all officers were available for re-election. Mr A. Binder (past president of the Swiss Society) took the chair. Mr A. Binder systematically called for the re-election of officers. As there were no new nominations, the following were re-elected:

President - Mr R. Dudli; Vice-President - Mr C. Schuler; Secretary/Treasurer - Mrs P. Rowe; Riflemaster - Mr W. Unternahrer; Delegate to the Swiss Abroad Conference in Switzerland - Mr H. Messmer; Auditor - Mr M. Robinson.

Editing Committee, Editor - Mr R. Dudli, Committee - Mrs F. Kull, Mr C. Schuler, Mr L. Chamberlain, Mrs A. Kiser, Mr L. Kuriger and Mrs P. Rowe

Mr Dudli then took the chair and thanked those present for the confidence shown in the re-election of the officers.

GENERAL BUSINESS - Mr Dudli asked Hamilton if they would like to host the 1985 Annual General Meeting. Mr Staheli replied that Hamilton would be very honoured to do so.

It was suggested that an honorarium be paid to the secretary/treasurer. After a lively and lengthy discussion it was moved by Mrs E. Studer (Hamilton) and seconded by Mrs M. Gianotti (Auckland) that a travelling allowance up to \$100 be paid.

A question arose concerning the problems the Auckland Swiss Club were facing, and was aksed what was going to happen. Mr Dudli replied that "We, as a Society can only interfere when a club doesn't function for a whole year." Mr Dudli then asked for all the members from the Auckland Club to work together in establishing the future of their club. An Auckland club member replied that given time they will sort out their own problems and felt confident their club will be alright next year.

As there was no further business, Mr Dudli thanked the Auckland Club for their hospitality and thanked everyone present for coming along and wished them all a safe journey home.

He then declared the meeting closed at 5 pm.
