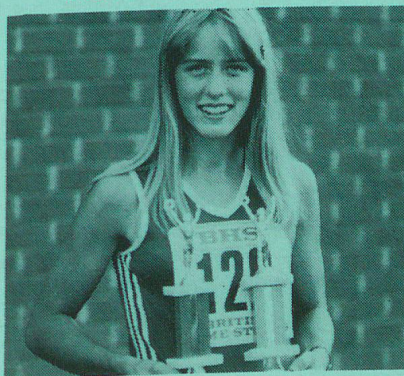

Swiss Scene

From the impressive cover, one would imagine that **Swiss Scene - News and Views on Switzerland** would be full of the sort of glossy advertisements for perfume and cigarettes which tend to fill the Sunday supplement magazines. Fortunately, this is not the case. In fact the advertisements blend in well with the actual content of the magazine. A monthly guide to all aspects of Swiss life, **Swiss Scene** itself takes a neutral stance on the issues it reports, which range from business and technological innovations to general news (as featured in the 'Headlines' section). Indeed, this section touches every aspect of Swiss life.

The feature pages cover issues which are frequently related to finance and investment, although fortunately these tend to be written with the layman in mind. Regional issues are dealt with in the 'Riviera Scene' and 'Zurich Scene' pages and, and for visitors there is a 'Tourist News' page.

The range of news and features covered in 70 pages is very impressive and editor **Janice Binkert** has assembled a very professional editorial team. There is perhaps a lack of colour photography, but this is out-weighted by the quality of writing sustained throughout.

Swiss Business

The January/February issue of **Swiss Business** (The International Swiss Magazine for Trade and Investment) as usual maintained its high

standards of writing on the widest range of issues from the economic, business and investment spheres.

The issue in question looked at some market trends and featured an eye-opening article about Switzerland's charter airline companies. Whilst on subjects 'transportational', the export-promotion consortium **Swissrail** came under focus. This feature examined the collective Swiss rail and rail engineering companies' achievements around the world. These include a major involvement in the mono-rail which was featured at the 1986 World Expo in Vancouver, Canada. The centre pages 'Switzerland your business partner' are written by the Swiss Office for Trade Promotion (OSEC) giving some indication of the content therein.

The underlying tone, in many articles, revolves around the position of Switzerland post-1992 and the formation of the 'Single Market' in Europe. Naturally, this primarily has business implications, particularly as Austria seems a likely future member, leaving Switzerland 'land-locked' as the only non-EC nation in Western Europe (excepting Scandinavia). **swissBusiness**, in fact, used the Switzerland-EC relationship as the basis of its heartfelt editorial by **John Wicks**.

Swiss Radio HEAR THIS!

As promised, from this issue we are carrying information and programme details on the English Language Service broadcast by **Swiss Radio International**. It aims itself at Swiss citizens living abroad, fulfilling a similar function to that of the BBC's World Service but with the 4-fold disadvantage of having to broadcast in 3 mother tongues plus English. Sadly, like all good civil service operations, it remains one of Switzerland's best kept secrets.

I met **Richard Dawson**, one of SRI's journalist-presenters, in Näfels last September. When I offered free space in the Review to display programme and wavelength information he seemed keen. We both agreed that the previously published wavelength guide was incomprehensible to a mere mortal. Since then he has not returned my calls or responded to my correspondence. Perhaps he's been got at! Perhaps a senior governmental mandarin heard that he was about to leak programme information and now he's breaking rocks or painting road signs!

Subsequently, I have spoken to the head of English Language programming, **Israel Cinman**, who was most helpful. He tells me that SRI broadcasts here on **9560 MHz and 11935 MHz Short Wave**. Each English programme (on air at 7.30, 8.30, 12 noon, 14.00, 16.30 and 19.30 GMT) contains 7 minutes of news from Switzerland plus 23 minutes of World affairs, with special interest travelogues and features at the weekends. I shall attempt to tune in and tell all next time.

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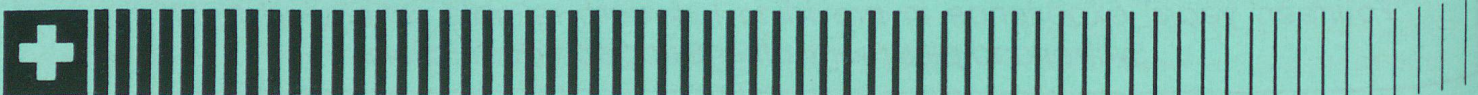

Eating SWISS

The Restaurant Review

In the inaugural restaurant review, in our last issue, Nick Miller tried out the exciting food fayre of The Chesa and the other restaurants under The Swiss Centre's roof. We decided that he is still so filled from their delights, that we would have to send another intrepid reporter on the next eating expedition. John Chapman was tempted to sample the winter delights of St. Moritz...

St. Moritz

I last went to St Moritz in September of 1982, though at that time I was on holiday in Western Switzerland! This time the St Moritz I took time out to visit was its namesake restaurant in Wardour street in London's Soho district, home of some of Britain's finest eating establishments. Set on two levels and decorated in authentic Swiss style, St Moritz has an immediately noticeable friendly and intimate atmosphere. Owner **Armin Loetscher** told me that this aspect leads to a more personal service and I must admit, this was certainly the case with my meal. A tasty 'Potage du Jour' was followed by a sumptuous main course of 'Scampi Provencale', in a delicious sauce, served with mixed vegetables. For dessert, a specially concocted Gran Marnier soufflé. I am virtually vegetarian, but for meat eaters, the fayre was varied and well presented.

St Moritz has had an interesting history. Armin told me of his early days in London (he arrived

in 1958) and the St Moritz of the 'Swinging Sixties'. In those days, Armin was in charge of the club which lies below the restaurant. Then it was almost exclusively Swiss youth who visited the club, and Swiss musicians would play live music interspersed by Beatles and Rolling Stones records. In the early seventies, Armin ('Sweetie' to his friends!) took over the responsibility of the restaurant and has made it very much 'his own'.

Today, largely due to the more restrictive immigration policy for non-EC citizens, the club has only a handful of Swiss attendees. At lunchtimes, the restaurant is largely populated by TV and music business personnel, but in the evenings one can still find a sprinkling of Swiss eaters. For the personal touch and fine cuisine I can heartily recommend a meal at St Moritz. Of course, it is also ideally situated for combining a meal with a night at one of the many theatres or cinemas nearby.

Fondue Memories...

If 'St. Moritz' suggests not so much a Soho restaurant as a heartwarming log fire in a mountain homestead on a cold Alpine night after a day on the slopes, then your thoughts turn to one of the delights of Swiss nights, namely the shared pleasure of a Fondue. With this in mind, **The Swiss Centre** held its annual Fondue promotion from January 16th to February 19th of this year.

As usual, there were a wide variety of menus available from £10.00 per head prepared by the Executive Chef, Felix Zund. These ranged from the traditional cheese 'Fondue Valaisanne' to the somewhat more exotic 'Fondue Chinoise'. As if these were not tempting enough, how about the 'Toblerone Fondue' to send your taste buds into triangles ... a pot of melted Toblerone served with freshly sliced fruits.

These mouth-watering dishes, served in the **Locanda**, were all successfully received by the visiting masses, though apparently those responsible for 'losing a cube of bread' in the bubbling pot tended not to undergo the traditional forfeits! Ladies forfeit a kiss for each lost piece of bread and men have to fork out for a bottle of wine or a round of kirsch each time. High penalties for careless eaters, you might think. Still, if all this talk of delicious dishes has got you enthused enough to cook Fondue for yourselves, here are a couple of recipes which were the high points of the Swiss Centre promotion, supplied courtesy of Felix Zund ...

Swiss Cheese Fondue

Ingredients

300g Gruyère grated, 300g Emmentale grated, 2 teaspoons of cornflour, 1 clove of garlic, 400ml dry white wine, 40ml Kirsch, Dash of lemon juice, Ground nutmeg, Pepper from peppermill

Method

Rub the inside of the Fondue pot with the garlic. Add the wine and the lemon juice, and heat over a low flame. Add the cheese gradually and stir all the time. When the mixture bubbles, pour in the cornflour blended smoothly with the Kirsch and cook for about five minutes. Add pepper and nutmeg to taste ...

Serves 4.

Toblerone Chocolate Fondue

Ingredients

400g milk Toblerone chocolate
Kiwi Fruit, Pineapple, Strawberries, Lychees, Pears

Method

Break the Toblerone chocolate into small pieces and place in a small copper pot. Stir over a gentle heat until the Toblerone chocolate melts. Serve a variety of freshly sliced fruits cut into medium sized pieces to dip into the chocolate Fondue ...

Serves 4.

Of course, Lausanne's natural charm makes it an ideal travel choice for non-sports fans too! Full details about travel arrangements to and from Lausanne (and indeed all your travel requirements) are of course available from the Swiss National Tourist Office.

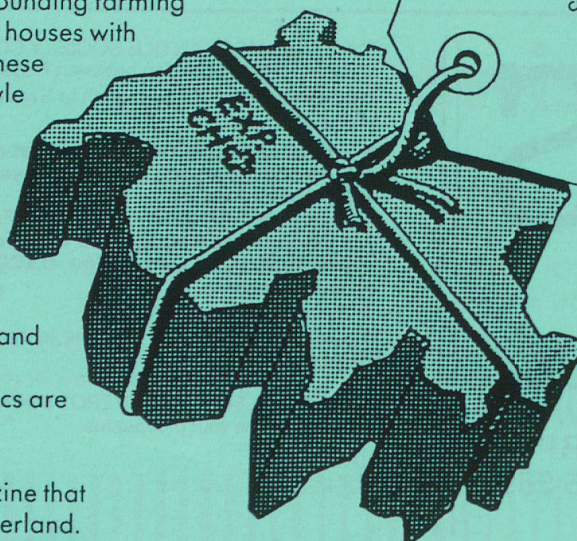

Of Anglo-Swiss relations and three nonagenarians

Anglo-Swiss relations go back to Roman times, when a Rhaetian legion came to Britain ... an historic curiosity ! It was Bishop Armenfredus (Ermenfroid) from Sion who crowned William the Conqueror.

In his book *'The Swiss and the British'* (published by Michael Russell) Sir John Wraight, former Ambassador to Switzerland, gives an exhaustive and illuminating history of Anglo-Swiss relations through the centuries, and the present-day connections between the two nations. At the time of writing, Sir John is on a tour of several Swiss cities, lecturing on this subject. Without being presumptuous, one may state that Anglo-Swiss relations today are very good at every level, diplomatic and cultural.

The **Swiss National Tourist Office** have always been at the forefront of fostering relations in their particular field and the impressive Swiss presence at the **Daily Mail International Ski Show** and the **World Travel Market** testified most decisively to the success of Switzerland's efforts in this sphere. Much more has been done in the cultural field over the last 15 to 20 years than earlier on when Swiss abroad in general complained that culture was given an inferior place.

The Swiss Embassy, of course, plays an important part in diplomatic relationships and in every other aspect (economic, defence, culture). The bulletin published monthly by the Cultural Section (anyone interested may apply for it) regularly tells of Swiss musicians appearing in London and of artists' exhibitions. It also lists current Swiss films and theatre productions (including Duerrenmatt's "Visit" which is on release again, for the first time since 1958). Frequent readings by Swiss authors take place at the Embassy and elsewhere in the U.K.

Book choice

Two books recently issued by British authors which you might find of interest. The first is the delightful history of 200 years of English travellers in Switzerland. "Southwards to Geneva" by **Mavis Coulson**. Secondly, "What makes Switzerland tick" by **Richard Wildblood**, in which he poses the challenging question of what Switzerland really is.

In a previous issue I wrote about the history of the Anglo-Swiss Society. In the meantime, its 40th anniversary dinner has taken place. It was a glittering affair with the Earl of Limerick in the chair, and the Swiss Ambassador and Madame Pictet present, as well as Colonel Stuart Townend, the founder and first Director of the Society. Many prominent members were amongst the guests, **Dr. Hans Egli**, one of two Swiss members of the very first committee (the other being Mr. Walter Meier).

Nonagenarians

Hans Egli is also one of two stalwarts reaching the age of 90. His birthday falls on 17th March. In the September 1987 issue I wrote about his distinguished career as a lawyer and chief correspondent of the "**Neue Zuercher Zeitung**", and above all about the invaluable services he has rendered to the Swiss community over many decades. He has devoted his life to Anglo-Swiss relations, and a great debt of gratitude is owed him. Congratulations may be sent to 6a Rodborough Rd London NW11.

Another distinguished compatriot to reach the age of 90 now lives in Switzerland. **Mr Willi Renz**, of Steinwischlenstrasse 2, 9052 Nieder-teufen, celebrated his birth on 2nd January.

Jean W. Bonjour of 72 Shirley Avenue, Croydon, Surrey, celebrated his 90th birthday on 23rd February. Only a few months ago, he was made an Hon. Member of the Swiss Mercantile Society after a life-time of devoted service with the same commitment as in his career at the Swiss Bank Corporation. He is also an Hon. Member of the New Helvetic Society. He has the distinction of being the only Council member who, until a short time ago, never missed a meeting, except one when British Rail was on strike !

All his friends sympathised with him when he recently lost his wife whom he had nursed through a long illness. We admire his strength and courage and we wish him, as well as Dr. Egli and Mr Renz, many more years of good health and enjoyment.

Obituary

Finally, we have to announce the death of **Mr. D.E. Bonnet**, of Carshalton Beeches, Surrey. He died on 1st January at the age of 91. He too was with the Swiss Bank Corporation. He will be mainly remembered for his great services to the Swiss Benevolent Society. He was one of the Vice-Presidents, having previously been Hon. Asst. Treasurer. He was also Hon. Auditor of the New Helvetic Society. We shall remember him with affection and send our deep sympathy to his family in their bereavement.
