



▲ The popular initiative for “Switzerland without an Army” attained an unexpected level of sympathy, with 36% of voters supporting the initiative.




▶ The cantonal parliament in Appenzell Auser Rhoden finally grants women the right to vote in cantonal matters.




▼ A great number of child murders - like that of 10-years-old Doris Walker - shook the Swiss.




