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

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## Telegrams

■ The well-known stage and screen director, Michel Souter, has died at the age of 59.

■ Major row at the «Tagesanzeiger»: Editor-in-Chief Viktor Schlumpf has been dropped.

■ 700-year Jubilee: Over 100 000 people attended «Army Day 1991» at Emmen (Lucerne)

■ Walter Gut, the Federal Council's Special Representative for State Security Documents, retires at the end of 1991.

■ A new daily newspaper, «Le Nouveau Quotidien», has started publication in French-speaking Switzerland.

■ 246 young people gathered in the National Council Chamber for «Youth Session 1991». Petitions included Swiss membership of the UN and the EC, general prohibition of arms exports, radical environment protection measures.

■ A new credit of 800 million Swiss francs for eastern Eu-

rope is to be shared between Bulgaria, Rumania, the three Baltic states (Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania) and the Soviet Union.

■ This year's Nobel Prize for Chemistry has been awarded to the physicist and chemist, Professor Richard R. Ernst of the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Zurich.

■ Klaus Jacobi, State Secretary at the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs, is to retire from the civil service on March 1, 1992. He has held the post since February 1989. The 62-year old senior diplomat is to work as a consultant to private industry but will remain available to the Swiss Government for special assignments.

■ The last important business of the outgoing legislature was to give final approval to the new Trans-Alpine Railway. With a credit of about 14 billion Swiss francs, this is the biggest building project ever undertaken by the federal government.
