From the middle of this year all Swiss citizens domiciled in foreign countries will be able to take part in federal referendums and elections by post. The only thing they have to do in order to be eligible is to register with their responsible embassy or consulate. You can read all about it further on in this issue.

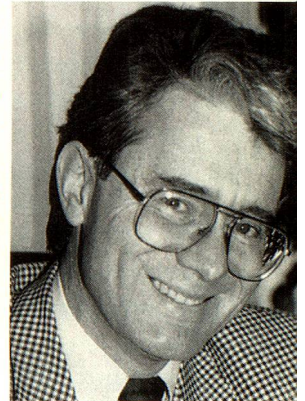
This substantial extension of the opportunity of becoming involved marks an important gesture as well as an outstretched hand by the federal government to Swiss citizens living abroad. It is also the outward sign of a substantial measure of political success by the "Fifth Switzerland" and

its lobby here at home. With the introduction of the vote by correspondence, one of the oldest demands – and the one maintained with the greatest persistence over very many years – of the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad has been finally achieved.

The next thing is for optimal use to be made of this new and very valuable right. We are well aware that it is no simple matter to reach a well-founded opinion on the key subjects of Swiss politics from a distance which may be very far away indeed from the frontiers of your country. But it is also true that it is sometimes easier to pick out the essential from a distance – where one is not too deeply involved in the turbulence of everyday political life.

There is no doubt that this extension of political rights requires the provision of more information. The Swiss Review – proud of its new mantle – is here to bring you its contribution. We are not of course alone in this. Swiss Radio International is beamed to you – on short wave and by satellite – in your own language with current information on many subjects direct from Switzerland.

But whether you decide to use your vote or not – the Swiss Review, published by the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad with the highly valued support of the federal government – will continue on tap to supplement your existing links with Switzerland and to provide you with more comprehensive information more frequently than before. We hope that you will make maximum use of what we would like you to think of as your "hot line" to your old homeland.
