News on the Swiss education scene

Swiss universities and institutes of technology enjoy a good reputation world-wide. The wide range of university courses on offer attracts a large number of students from Switzerland and abroad who are interested in a degree from a Swiss institute of higher education.

The term "university institutes" covers ten cantonal universities, two federal institutes of technology and several university-level institutions. The present university system is the product of a long tradition of education in Switzerland. Currently around 100,000 students are enrolled at Swiss universities. Courses cover everything from theology, humanities, economics, social science, medicine and natural science.

To be eligible for a university course, candidates must have a

federally recognised maturity diploma or an acceptable equivalent. Persons with non-Swiss educational qualifications are therefore often confronted with the problem of having their diploma recognised. In many cases an additional pre-university course is demanded. This, along with the biannual acceptance examinations

for students with foreign diplomas ("Aufnahmeprüfungen für Studierende mit ausländischem Diplom"), is held in Fribourg. Language skills often present an additional obstacle. A thorough knowledge of at least one national language is an essential requirement for every university course. Candidates without such

skills must attend language courses.

Since Swiss universities and institutes of technology are public, Swiss citizens pay relatively low fees – generally between CHF 500 and 700 per semester. Living costs vary from student to student, depending on personal needs and the place of study. However, students should reckon on roughly CHF 16,000 to 24,000 per year for such costs.

In the ideal case, the period of study for an initial degree (Ordinary or Masters) is between four and five years. A doctorate will take another one to two years.
