Council and Congress of the Swiss Living Abroad

From August 20th to 22nd, 2004, I attended the council meeting and the conference in Winterthur, after also having participated at the spring meeting in Bern. Unfortunately, this article can only be printed now, as the deadline for the local edition in the Swiss Review was just before the conference. The following report is a brief overview.

Swiss info.org, the excellent website for daily Swiss news, was discussed. Many Swiss living abroad read it regularly, especially before voting. We need to lobby for better funding.

The council members voted to support citizenship for second- and third-generation foreigners in Switzerland. However, the Swiss electorate later rejected it on September 26, even though many of these "foreigners" were born and schooled in Switzerland.

The council also voted to support the second parcel of the Bilateral Agreements with the EU. The original Bilateral Agreements of 1999 have been in effect since June 2002. According to council president Dr. G. Stucki, they proved to be of great benefit to Switzerland and to the Swiss residing in these countries. There are 370'000 or approximately 60% of our total of 612'000 Swiss abroad that live in EU countries. These agreements have now been expanded and will replace the former Agreements. They will also include the ten new countries that joined the EU in May. A referendum seems likely. This means that the Swiss electorate will vote on some of the agreements, possibly in the second half of 2005.

The biggest news for me was that a large number of Swiss Parliamentarians, from all the main parties, decided to form a support group for the Swiss living abroad. This is very good news indeed. In the meantime they had their first meeting. We now have over eighty contact people in Parliament, thanks to the organizers of this group, National Councillor Thérèse Meyer, and other parliamentarians.

The topic of the Congress on the following day was "Technical Innovation". Dr. Bertrand Piccard spoke about innovation and adventure. The Key note speaker was Federal

Councillor Micheline Calmy-Rey who explained the advantages of the Bilateral Agreements II with the EU.

Next year's congress will take place from September 1st to September 4th in Interlaken, and we are all invited. The date is later than usual, because it will coincide with the "Unspunnenfest". This traditional festival was founded in 1805 and expects thousands of participants for its 200th birthday. The last Unspunnenfest took place in 1993. It would be great to see many Swiss-Canadians there.

From January to June 2005, the various Swiss Clubs abroad have to elect or re-elect their delegates to the Council of the Swiss Abroad for a four-year term. Please read about the procedure in the Swiss Review of October 2004 or on the website revue.ch (under "ASO"). Canada has a right to three delegates and two substitutes who will regularly attend the meetings in Switzerland, at their own cost. We need to have delegates from the three main consular districts (Montreal, Toronto, Vancouver). The delegates can be from any province and get elected by their respective Swiss Club, as we do not have an umbrella organization. Please contact your Swiss Club and me or the ASO office in Bern, if you are considering this interesting volunteer position, and if you know German or French. I will step down after having attended meetings in Switzerland for eight years. During this time we have seen great progress. Every year more Swiss living abroad make use of their right to vote. In 1999 there were 67'000 Swiss living abroad who voted, in 2003 there were already 82'700. Approximately 10% of all Swiss live abroad. The right to vote helps us greatly in defending our interests, and we hope that many more of you will contact your Consulate General for the forms.

On November 6th, the Edmonton Swiss Mens' Choir, the Wildrose Yodel Club and guests gathered for our annual Winzerfest celebration. From nine in the morning until late afternoon we decorated the hall at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish in Sherwood Park (a beautiful hamlet East of Edmonton) and prepared the feast. Hike via Herman Pass to Iceberg Lakes, Oct. 3rd, 2004

Promptly at 10 a.m., on Sunday October 3, twenty-two of us, ranging from youth to golden age, started our hike from the Herman Museum, near Mt. Baker Lodge. The morning turned out to be perfect - beautiful sunshine with a gentle soft breeze and not a cloud in sight - the promise of a magnificent day. We broke up into two smaller groups to follow the National Parks Board's regulations "not to exceed twelve people per group" and make it easier for our group leaders, Irene Fritschi and Joe Mueller. With great excitement we all proceeded on our 5 hour journey, first along Baigley Lake, then up a serpentine trail to Herman Pass (1800 m), down to Iceberg Lakes, onward around Table Mountain to Ptarmigan Ridge Trail, and back via Artists Point to our parking lot.

Joe, the leader of the second group, periodically pointed out the various mountain peaks that surrounded us and explained which lakes those mountain trails would bring the hikers too and how some of those trails could be physically challenging. Mt. Baker is a magnificent formation of numerous peaks surrounded by beautiful lakes, and one could not help but see and admire her highest peak, standing gracefully, covered in sparkling-white radiance. As we were continuing our journey, we constantly came across hills that were full of rich autumn-colored vegetation, which looked like flowers from the distance.

At some point on our hike, somebody spotted three white dots on a "far-away" mountain slope. With the help of binoculars we discovered they were mountain goats. Later on we saw the trio at closer range. On the edge of a ridge they stood majestic, graceful and proud, observing their kingdom.

Finally we reached our destination – Iceberg Lake. What a breath taking picture - perfect scenery - "Mother Nature in its beauty!" We stopped to have a rest, eat our lunch, and of course, to take some pictures.

Only too soon it was time to move on for our return trip. The trail took us around the west side of Table Mountain, over rock slides, up to Ptarmigan Ridge. Naturally, Mother Nature never repeats herself and again offered us new, spectacular vistas all the way over to Skyline Divide, the glaciers of Mt Baker, and then south to Ross Lake in Washington State.



Encore cette année notre raclette de septembre a attiré près de 150 personnes.


