The concern expressed regarding falling hotel occupancy rates is of high interest to us. We normally travel to Europe for a 2-3 week visit in the October season (cost!), and my Swiss wife visits family for 2 weeks

each winter or spring. We find the hotel and restaurant costs to be too high. We are better able to find a reasonable holiday in France and Italy. We have used E&G lists in the past but they are now over our budget. My conclusion is that we are probably not alone and that lower cost travel for youth, seniors and any non-wealthy would increase visits to Switzerland. My first visit was in the 50's and I was in love with the country even before meeting my wife. I suggest that you need hotels of limited luxury, one or two stars, costing \$60-\$80 per night and air flights in the \$600 range. Get your tourist minister to remember the core traveler, not the wealthy Pasha.
