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I grew up in the Valais/Wallis. There, helicopters were often in the sky, and it was always something exciting. They would transport cows, hanging an a kind of harness, back to lower regions when snowfalls came too early in autumn and left them stranded high in the alps. Helicopters would land on the roof of our hospital with injured tourists, mostly during the skiing season. One memorable year an avalanche buried the railway line and the road to Zermatt. At that time helicopters had to bring down all the stranded tourists, it was quite a sight.

For the last three days, helicopters have also been flying above our house in direction of the San Bernardino Mountains. But they do not bring excited and happy memories. On the contrary, my stomach muscles tighten up, because that can only mean on thing: Fire! A few years back the fire on our hills came so close that we were told to evacuate. So cat, computers, important documents, some clothes and the two of us found refuge at a friend's house. When we came back after two days, the pool was black and everything smelled of smoke, but no other damage. These last three days we could see the smoke but it was much further away. Now it's over and I am breathing easier again, hoping very much that this summer, against all predictions from the authorities, California will be spared.

Working with different cultures in numerous countries has reminded me that being Swiss is a great advantage. We Swiss should always cherish our heritage."

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
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Book Reviews

years for a reprint of my father's 1970 New Glarus Photograph Journal."





New Orleans 1867 -Photographs by Theodore Lilienthal

The book contains photographs by Theodore Lilienthal, now in the Napoleon Museum in Arenenberg, Canton of Thurgau, Switzerland. The photographs of New Orleans constitute the first photographic survey of any American city. They were originally exhibited at the Paris Exposition of 1867 and came into the possession of Napoleon III. They were preserved but unknown outside of the Museum until 1995 when they came to the attention of Mr. Van Zante who was then the curator of the Southeastern Architectural Archive of Tulane University. The pictures were made two years after the end of the Civil War and were intended to advertise New Orleans and its recovery after the war.

In 2000 the photographs were exhibited at the Tulane University Art Gallery and the New Orleans Museum of Art and are now presented in this handsome book. It is available at Amazon. com and in bookstores.



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
Living close to nature

Swiss Straw Bale House

Christian & Regula Heeb, from St.Gallen, Switzerland moved permanently to the Resort City of Bend, Oregon in 1998. Drawn by the relative liberal community, the unspoiled great outdoors and the convenient location close to Americas West Coast, they bought a 40 acre

waste product like straw, whose insulation factor is simply phenomenal.

The interior and exterior shell of Rancho Las Hierbas, as the house is called, was finished in stucco to give it a modern Southwest feeling. It is not hooked up to the grid. All energy is created on site by photo voltaic cells . There are cells for hot water as well. Propane is used for cooking and sometimes



heating the rooms in Winter. Notice the eagle checking out the photographer!

piece of high desert on the edge of Bend. The secluded property, tucked in a cul de sac, is bordered on two sides by the Deschutes National Forest. It has great views of the majestic Cascades Mountains. The volcanoes of the Sisters, Mount Bachelor and even Mount Jefferson can be seen from the site.

This is their story:

"True to our calling to live close to nature we decided to have as low an impact on the land as possible. In 1998 we built a straw bale house in the center of the property. While there is a regular wood frame to the house, all the walls are actually filled with straw bales. This construction type takes less wood than regular construction and uses a

in the winter for hot water generation if there isn't enough sunlight.

Radiant floors heated by propane are only used if we are not at home during the winter months. If we are at home, we heat the whole house with wood firing in our masonry heater, which also functions as pizza and bread oven. It is similar to a European "Kachelofen". Most days during winter the oven needs to be lit only for some hours in the late afternoon. The southern exposure of the large living room windows further helps keeping the house warm. We decided initially to just use sixteen solar panels with 75 Watts each. Now of course there are much more efficient panels available. While we still work on

travel and nature photographers and most of our work is done digitally. We had to change our life to adjust to a low energy use. The computer screens, the washing machine and the fridge are all low energy. We have no hair dryers or cloth dryers. Hanging the laundry outside is the best way to dry it in Bend. In the high desert this takes hardly half a day. There is never an unnecessary lamp turned on. All light bulbs are energy efficient.

Christian & Regula Heeb have been traveling the world for major European and US publishers for 20 years. After time spent in the deserts of Australia, Africa and the USA, they decided to leave Europe behind. Christian says: "Switzerland is a beautiful country that works. There is really not much to be said about it in a negative way besides that there was not enough space for us. Where in Switzerland could we have found a 40 acres pro-

Timing is everything

Patrick Puton was born in Switzerland, the land of watchmaking. His mother was a watchmaker. His father became president of Rolex in the United States. And now he is founder and president of Excel Time Service, a year-old company in Coral Gables that repairs mechanical and quartz watches. All his highly skilled watchmakers are Cuban, including master watchmaker Federico Rodriguez, who at age 63 has 45 years of watch repair on his résumé.

The young company specializes in repairing Rolexes, but it also repairs watches by Cartier, Omega, Longines, Rado, and Hamilton, along with many other brands, including Cuervo y Sob-

rinos, a Cuban watch.
Buying luxury watches has been
popular for 20 years, with sales
of luxury brands jumping 16

percent in the past year alone. For owners of expensive watches, maintenance is important. "Just because you own a Mercedes Benz doesn't mean it doesn't

need service." That's where Puton's business comes in. Puton, 46, opened in the Alhambra Tower in September 2006, after nearly a year of assembling the unique work space that watchmakers require. His nearly 2,000-square-foot space on the 12th floor faces north. "Northern light is important for a watchmaker," he explains. "And it's not so hot." The workbenches, made locally, are modeled after the traditional watchmaker's bench

watchmaker's hands steady.

It is a job that cannot be rushed. It might take three or more hours. The average repair bill is \$250, varying according to the complexity of the problem.
Puton expects

Puton expects revenue to reach \$450,000 by the end

of this year, and he plans to expand his space. He wants to add more watchmakers to his staff and perhaps, sometime in the future, to franchise Excel. For more than 20 years, Puton has specialized in watches. He served as a senior executive at Rolex Watch USA, and was a

project manager for Rolex of Canada. He also served as a management consultant and later senior executive to the luxury group LVMH (Louis-Vuitton-Moet-Hennessey). But Puton never studied watchmaking.

"I did take a watch apart once," he admits.

He didn't say whether he put it back together again.
