New German Language School Opens in Central New Jersey.

In the hit movie Field of Dreams, a farmer hears "if you build it, they will come," and builds a baseball field for the replay of famous baseball games from the early 20th century.

In the same belief that dreams do come true with hard work

In the same belief that dreams do come true with hard work and a belief in success despite obstacles, a group of Swiss, German and Austrian in central New Jersey envisioned building a new German language school and cultural community to foster the language and nurture their heritage with their children. German School of Monmouth County officially opened in September 2007 with a grand

opening celebration picnic attended by more than 150 people. Although the group believed enrollment would start at 25 students, more than 70 students, 2 to 62 years old, joined the school in its first year. From parent-child MusikGarten classes to age-appropriate native and nonnative speaker classes for young children, teens and adults, the school is a definite hit. Local community groups, libraries and other educational institutions have requested GSMC offer a trial class to introduce the German language back into the community.

This year, the IRS granted the school its request as a non-profit organization, offering even more people in the region an opportunity to learn German for business and pleasure, as well as

celebrate St. Martins, St. Nicholas, Weihnachten and traditions like Fasnacht (Fasching) and Ostern with songs, performances and activities in German.

This is what Mark Jones says about

himself: "I was born in Basel to an American father and a Swiss mother. We lived in an apartment in Liestal and eventually moved to the United States by the time I was two. I held on to my Swiss citizenship and to this day I have both a Swiss and a United States passport.
Being Swiss was a huge part of




my identity while growing up. I was the only child in my class who had pictures from his infancy dressed up as a Waggis for Fasnacht. I distinctly remember knowing the name Betty Bossi before I knew the name Betty Crocker, and I still get odd looks

from Americans when I use words like 'Maschinli' and 'Pfläschterli' instead of 'remote control' and 'band-aid'. The Swiss influences on Snow Party are due to the fact that I spent my summers in Switzerland and, ironically, all my memories of snow come from the months of July and August. I would take trips to high peaks like Titlis, or to the Gornergrat at Zermatt, and get a taste of the white winters I never had in Florida. However, snow just involves the setting in Snow Party, the real appeal of the book is the charming community spirit of the snow people. While it may seem a stretch to others to connect this book to Switzerland, I, on the other hand, see Snow

Party as a mirror image of my experiences with the first of Auqust festivities in my grandparent's village of Bubendorf. Granted, the snow people aren't setting bonfires or blowing alphorns, but looking at my illustrations brings back crystal clear memories of the village gathered up on a forested hill with rows of tables, a band of musicians, children and adults laughing, eating and singing some lovely songs, not to mention all the speeches and toasts. North Pole anybody....?

Swiss Nationals Heinz Fischer and his wife Lyndy Burdet have no time for a sedentary life style. At ages 79, respectively 76 the Fischers have little interest in golfing as they prefer more demanding sports like deep sea diving, climbing high mountains, hot air ballooning, sailing, skiing and flying their own plane. They seek their challenges all over the world including - for obvious reasons: Switzerland. When not on expedition, the couple stations in their permanent home in Lyndon, Vermont.

Last April Heinz and Lyndy Fischer requested to be dropped from a helicopter several miles from the most northern point of the earth. They were accompanied by their Australian guide. Together they embarked upon the arduous ordeal, heading for the North Pole on skis. This is easier said than done for nature will trick you. Take into account that your exactly calculated destination sits on a floating ice cap and consistently drifts: "You may journey north but simultaneously you drift south." Temperatures can drop as low as minus 75 degrees F. You are relentlessly on watch for polar bears and hope not to encounter any. Wind, fog and ice storms could obstruct your view. Worse, explorers could get trapped in the weather and become only too vulnerable to the extreme elements with only a slim chance for rescue from disastrous conditions. "It was

tough" the Fischers say; "We were at the weather's mercy". But luck was at their side. The Fischers describe their weather conditions as ideal. Gratefully there were no fierce ice storms. At night the team bunked in their tents they hauled along on their sleds. They kept warm in their sleeping bags by the means of chemical heating packs. Regardless, the temperatures inside their lofty residence reached a cozy minus 21 degrees F. During the day the Fischers pulled, dragged, pushed and hurdled their supply sleds over the rough and buckled ice surface. At times they were able to

travel on skis.
Other times they had to climb over the ice tectonics carved by wind and sculptured by overlaps during high and low tides. Picks and ice tools became their indispensable tools.
Finally the coor-

dinates of the couple's GPS indicated that they indeed had arrived at the exact North Pole. The awe and serenity around them

caused them to stop and observe the curvature of the earth they describe as clearly visible in every which direction they turned. That very instant engraved a deep and unforgettable impression into their souls. The Fischers experienced paradise. They never forget the peace and appreciation for the beauty of the rugged earth knowing they were really at the North Pole. Unfolding their Swiss flag, they celebrated having reached the Top of the World, literally. The Guinness Book of

Records documents our Swiss friends as the oldest couple who skied to the North Pole. This has minor significance for the Super Seniors Heinz and Lyndy. The couple prefers hoping to inspire other seniors. They want to set an example, encouraging us to enjoy the beauty of this world every which way we can: "Take

good care of yourselves, remain active and sustain your interest in life. Every day is a gift!"
Wondering if the Fischers have further plans for a new expedition they indicated that indeed they do, however they decline to reveal any details: Lyndy quickly adds: "It might fail".

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Washington, D.C. Swiss Benevolent Society

The Swiss Benevolent Society of Washington, D.C. (SBS) was founded in 1865. It is the oldest Swiss organization in Washington, and has the mission of helping Swiss in need that reside in the Metropolitan Area. Over the 143 years of its existence, direct help was provided to individuals who encountered financial difficulties. In the early years the SBS would also extend travel assistance for some to return to Switzerland. Frequently this was done through loans, expected to be repaid.

For years the Society membership remained constant around one hundred. An annual meeting was held, typically a dinner meeting. A small group of active members oversaw the general welfare of members. This included visiting the homebound, delivering flowers for special occasions, buying groceries or other necessities. The SBS has on occasion supported Swiss cultural and charitable events, such as hosting a group of young Swiss cancer patients for a visit to Washington. As direct service to members diminished, the membership voted in 1998 to dissolve the SBS as a Membership Society and converting it to an organization controlled by a small Board of Directors. Board members are drawn from the other local Swiss organizations. In 1980, with the ever-increasing costs of college education, a Scholarship Program was initiated to help Swiss and descendants of Swiss with at least one Swiss grandparent. Eligibility to apply requires residency in the Washington Metropolitan Area, except for the residents of the tiny West Virginia community of Helvetia, which was settled by Swiss in the mid 1880s.

While the Scholarship Program is now the major focus, limited assistance to individuals in need, elderly and shut-ins have continued as cases are brought to the Society's attention. The assets currently stand at \$130,000. It has been a longstanding policy to maintain a strong assets base, allowed to grow with inflation, while dispersing annual income and donations for aid and grants. With the loss of dues-paying members the SBS funding of programs now depends exclusively on donations, gifts and the income from interest bearing assets. In good years as much as \$7,000 in scholarship grants are awarded. In the last three years considerable assistance in several critical cases was provided. The Society is a 501(c)(3) taxexempt organization allowing contributions to be fully tax-deductible.
