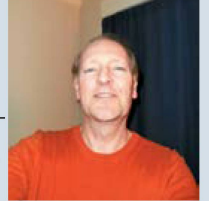

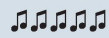

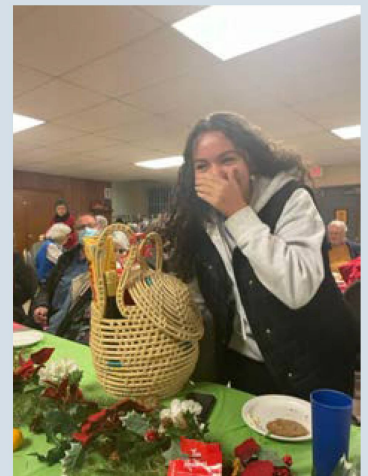

People - Meet Jacqueline Banz (Author of "PhilosophHer Thoughts")

Jacqueline, congratulations on your first book *PhilosophHer Thoughts* – a Peek into a Stoic Woman's Diary! You were born and raised in Switzerland and moved to Vancouver 12 years ago. Your diary entries and poems are in English. Do you think in English?

Yes, by now, after 12 years of living in Vancouver, I actually do.

The title sounds intriguing. What is the book about and how did it come to be?

It's a peek into my personal diary since January 2021. Every evening, I reflect on the day in a philosophical way. The heading on each page is tied to what happened that day, what I witnessed or heard, what got me thinking. Sometimes, I also write poems.

The goal of writing a page a day was initially meant as a discipline to help me write a non-fiction book. In the fall of 2022, I realised my diary entries should make up the actual book, not the other content. Working on the main book often felt like a chore while writing the daily one-pagers was something I wanted to do. I enjoy the reflective, meditative aspects of the writing process, and I'm always curious to see where my train of thoughts leads. Life is about enjoying the journey. That's why it felt right to publish "PhilosophHer Thoughts" as my first book.

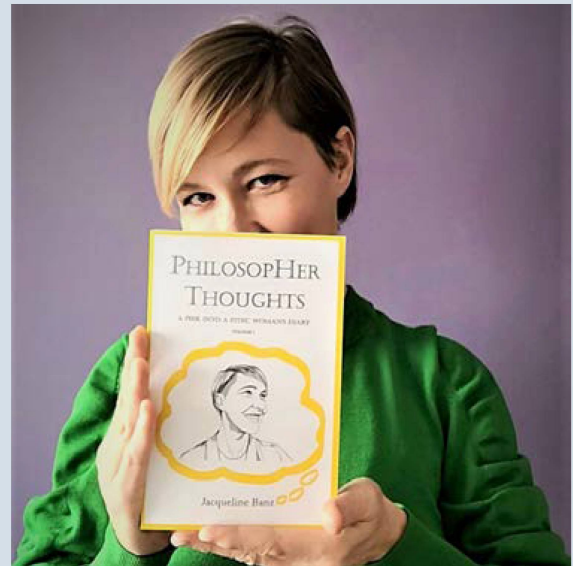
My diary often addresses societal norms and our Western lifestyle, which is very driven. In an attempt to get to where we want to be - which usually isn't where we are right now - we're always chasing the next goal. I'm starting to question that way of living.

Is Stoicism how you try to tame your monkey mind?

Stoicism is one way, yes, as is trying to live in the present. I try to tame my monkey mind by writing about my thoughts; this allows me to pause and reflect and consider various perspectives. It's the thoughts of past events - or the anticipation of a (dream) future - that causes us stress. Most stress isn't caused by an event itself, but rather by our reactions to a situation. Stoics strive to avoid labelling events or emotions as good or bad; they simply acknowledge their presence from an observant, less ego-driven perspective. Before reacting to something, we can choose to pause for a second; and we can choose to apply the four virtues of the Stoics (courage, temperance, wisdom, and justice) to any given situation (even those beyond our control).

Have you always had that mindset?

Well, I'm a constant work in progress and a lifelong learner. Living in the present is one of the hardest things you can do, as is pushing your ego aside when confronted with challenges. There will never be a day where I have it all figured out. And as I change and grow, my ways of thinking also change.



I've always been a believer that things happen for a reason. If something I desire doesn't appear, I see it as a sign it wasn't meant to be at that particular time, perhaps because the Universe has something different in store for me. If something I perceive as "unfortunate" occurs, I believe I will realise in hindsight it was a life lesson that helped me advance.

I believe that hand-written "Orders to the Universe" help in manifestation. A perfect example is how I received a Canadian work visa. In 1997, I spent 6 months in Vancouver and always wanted to come back here, but the high tuition fees for foreign students prevented me from getting my degree in Canada. Instead, I embraced the benefits of a Swiss university degree, though I still couldn't let go of the thought of living in Vancouver again.

After flying to the Paralympics Games in 2010, I got hooked on Vancouver once again, and my vacation turned into a job hunt marathon. Knocking on the doors of Swiss companies, I let them know about my goal of living and working in Vancouver. Despite their willingness to help, nothing came from that networking effort just yet. I didn't give up, though. Once back in Switzerland, I did what I always do when wanting to manifest something - issue a hand-written "Order to the Universe", stating exactly what I wish for and by when: to be living and working in Vancouver by May 1, 2011.

In order to be in Canada by that date, I quit a job I loved in Switzerland in January 2011, even though my networking efforts for Vancouver employment had not yet been fruitful. I simply trusted things would work out if they were meant to be. Surely enough, a few weeks later, three Vancouver Swiss connections informed me about a job opening that might be a door opener. Long story short, I applied, got the job, and arrived in Canada on May 1, 2011, a work visa (received the day before my scheduled flight) in hand. The Universe had delivered my order right on (Swiss) time!

The Congress of the Swiss Abroad in the Spirit of Democracy

Every year in August, the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad (OSA) organises a three-day congress for the Swiss abroad, an event popular with those interested in the mobility of the Fifth Switzerland.

In 2022, the congress took place in beautiful Lugano, where some 400 participants met fellow Swiss from all over the world, listened to exciting speeches, learned about current events in Switzerland, talked about their own experiences, and met interesting personalities from Swiss business and politics.

Within the OSA, Canada is represented by six elected Council Members (see below), whose mission it is to:

Inform: Keep the Swiss abroad informed and in touch with current affairs and politics in Switzerland;

Network: Offer services to strengthen the bond among the Swiss abroad, and between the Swiss public and its expatriate community;

Represent: Support and defend the interests of Swiss citizens living abroad before the Swiss authorities and public;

Advise: Offer free, up-to-date advice on issues related to emigration, living abroad, and returning to Switzerland.

Thomas Arn and **Johann Roduit** are Directors at the Swiss Canadian Chamber of Commerce and OSA Canada Council Members for 2021–2025. Both participated in the 2022 congress. We interviewed them about the congress and about their roles within the OSA.

How did you experience participating in the Congress of the Swiss Abroad?

"As a first time participant, it was very exciting to attend the congress. There was a good vibe, and I really enjoyed the event." – Thomas Arn

"It was a great experience. There are many challenges regarding how Swiss citizens abroad can fully participate in the democratic process. As delegates, we continue to lobby to improve the voting system from abroad, to ensure we can have better banking services, and to strengthen the possibility for the Swiss abroad to access the voluntary old-age / disability pension." – Johann Roduit

What was your main objective in participating in the event?

"My main objective was to start understanding the whole organisation better and to see how all the parts and pieces fit together (Swiss Community / Congress / Council / Executive, etc)." – Thomas Arn

"I'm particularly interested in promoting our Swiss cultural heritage abroad. I think our heritage does not stop at the geographical borders of Switzerland. On the contrary, Swiss immigrants have been influential all over the world and have left many artifacts (even chalets!) that should be preserved. This has not been thought of much in Switzerland, but I'm thrilled that "Culture" will be the theme of next year's congress. It will be an opportunity to think deeper about these questions and opportunities." – Johann Roduit

What was the highlight of these three days for you?

"The highlight was certainly meeting delegates from all over the world – a rich experience based on all these different stories. It renewed my interest in politics and showed me that active participation is important." – Thomas Arn

"It was tremendously enriching to meet with Swiss people from all over the world, and to see how we can work together to make the lives of Swiss citizens abroad better." – Johann Roduit

Did you have a special task during the event as an OSA Delegate?

"There was no task assigned to me personally. I finally wanted to meet all five Canadian delegates in person, and as many other delegates as possible. There was also time to connect with the media, Swiss politicians (National- / Ständerat), and with team members from the office in Berne." – Thomas Arn

"No special task. Just being a voice for the Swiss living in Western Canada." – Johann Roduit

What would you like to accomplish as an OSA Delegate?

"I would like to stay in touch with the different delegates, liaise with the Swiss in Canada who want to stay in touch, support them if there are questions / concerns / ideas, and connect them with the proper channels. Furthermore, I want to work on the mission and the Canadian priorities as per above to move the needle in the right direction." – Thomas Arn

"I would like to ensure that "official" Switzerland starts to think about what it means to protect and promote the Swiss cultural heritage found outside the geographical borders of our country." – Johann Roduit
