Wikipedia describes that an Amish colony originally started in Switzerland in 1693 and that the Old Order Amish retained their traditional culture which means that they are not allowed to use electricity or drive motorized vehicles.

Our tour started with an authentic Amish luncheon. The food was prepared by Sarah and was very delicious. The way they prepared the chicken, butternut squash, corn, coleslaw and mashed potatoes was exceptional. We all enjoyed their hospitality. The Amish way the corn is harvested is very different from how modern farmers do it. A horse is pulling a cart through the cornfield while the Amish farmer uses a sickle to cut the cob and throw it onto the wagon. Another farmer uses a horse with a tiller to turn over the soil.

Before we were back at our starting point in Harmony, we stopped at an Amish furniture store and a bakery. That is an experience everyone should have as it brings you a different view of what can be done with what nature provides.

The participants of the event agreed that this was a special tour for going back in time. The fact that there is a connection to Switzerland made it even more special. Many thanks to Paul Zellweger for organizing the day.

Another key event happened later in the fall with our traditional cheese sale. Once again, we hosted a very successful sale of authentic Swiss cheese. 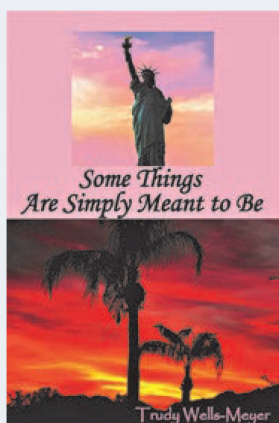
