
#### Editorial

# Challenges:

# Crossing the English Channel thinking of the River Aare's waters



Sarah Doughty-Schatzmann was born in England in 1973 after her Swiss parents moved to the UK in the 1960s. She swam the English

Channel as part of a 6-lady relay team last year on 14/8/2022. The distance is 22 miles straight across but with the currents, they travelled about 32 miles. As a team, they raised over £10,000 for the UK charity Aspire – for people with spinal injuries.

Swiss Review: Sarah, how did this work?

Sarah Doughty-Schatzmann: We set off at Midnight on the 14<sup>th</sup> from Samphire Hoe beach near Dover and landed at Wissant, France at 14.43. The night conditions were challenging as you can't see where you are swimming and couldn't hear much when you were in the water. We each swam for an hour and then rotated to the next swimmer. I was swimmer number 5 and swam for one hour in the dark and then one hour during the day. We all swam to the

shore at Wissant beach to the applause of locals on the shore!

SR: How did you train for this challenge?

SD:I started training for the event a year before. A major part was acclimatising to cold water by swimming without a wetsuit in the channel in February when the water was 8 degrees. In order to be able to swim the channel as a relay, you need to pass a qualifying swim of 90 minutes swimming in the water of fewer than 16 degrees, come out for an hour, and then go back in for another hour of swimming.

SR: Where does your love for swimming come from?

SD: I have always been a keen swimmer. My mother, Antoinette Schatzmann-Kaeser, who is 82 in November, still swims a mile a day. She learned to swim in the River Aare and credits the fast-flowing river with why she's such a strong swimmer. The River Aare is still very important to us as a family today and we regularly visit the family home in Aarau to see relatives.

### Liverpool: Remo Forrer represents Switzerland at Eurovision 2023

Remo Forrer, winner of the show 'The Voice of Switzerland' in 2020, is going to the Eurovision Song Contest (ESC) for Switzerland. Broadcaster SRF announced in March that it will be the 21-year-old musician from Hemberg (SG) flying the Swiss flag in Liverpool, at the 67<sup>th</sup> ESC.

'For me, it's the music equivalent of the Champions League and an enormous honour.' The singer was also successful in Germany, according to Radio SRF information. Remo also won the format 'Show us your voice' on RTL. On this occasion, judges praised his exceptional voice, which balances power and tenderness. That may explain his affinity for musicians like Lewis Capaldi, Ed Sheeran and James Arthur. A talented multi-instrumentalist, Remo first learned the accordion but has since moved on to the piano.

The ESC is 'something of the greatest thing you can do,' Forrer said to the SRF. The semifinals will be held on May 9th and the finals on May 13th. The Swiss participant has been chosen by 100 selected viewers and a 20-strong international jury. As with the Grand Final of the ESC, the vote from members of the public and the jury vote were each given a 50% weighting, with the scores ultimately going in favour of Remo and his song.

Remo is already looking forward to his journey to Liverpool, and all it's going to entail: 'The Eurovision Song Contest is the biggest music event there is, and I find it incredibly inspiring to be in a place where all the participants share the same passion for music'.

The project (Eurovision Song Contest) 2023 will be released in Switzerland by SRF, RTS, RSI and RTR.



If you hold pre-settled status in the UK, you can apply for settled status as soon as you have five years' continuous residence in the UK and meet the relevant conditions. Your pre-settled status does not expire until the date stated in the letter you received from the Home Office, but you can apply to switch to settled status as soon as you have lived in the UK, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man for five years in a row (known as 'continuous residence'). Please visit the UK government websites for full details on how to switch from presettled to settled status and how to view your immigration status.

Remember that you must apply to the EU Settlement Scheme again, before your pre-settled status expires, to stay in the UK!

### Swiss Church in London: 'Time, Talents... and Money'

What does the Swiss Church in London (SCL) mean to you? More or less than the price of one coffee per month?

On my desk, I have a professional report from our Chartered Surveyors, highlighting the physical condition our church. The survey is carried out every five years, and helps us to plan maintenance and to set our budget. At the back of the report necessary expenditure is colour coded from red (urgent – work required now) to green (desirable within next five years). It is likely that we will declare a loss for 2022 – it was a tough year. The staff, volunteers, trustees, members and friends all worked incredibly hard. However, with less grant funding, and restrictions for commercial hire still in place, our income was adversely affected. And, of course, we had to cope with 10% inflation. Should we be pessimistic? I don't think so. We are very fortunate to have Revd Harry Ching as our Interim

Minister while Revd Carla Maurer is on leave. Slowly, folks are returning to Sunday services. La Causerie and the Muttergruppe are back meeting at church. At Easter, we will welcome a confirmation group from Switzerland. There is an exciting programme of music and arts events over the spring.

But yes, we need financial support from the Swiss community in the UK. If 1,000 people were to donate £30 each this year, the £30,000 raised would pay for a lot of this year's maintenance. You can give securely via our webpage. All donations are gratefully received.

## Book presentation:

# 'Living in Hotels' a memoir by Helen Wallimann



The New Helvetic Society has organised an event on 25 April with Helen Wallimann presenting her memoir: 'Living in Hotels: Brown's in London – The


Savoy in Cheltenham'.

From my earliest infancy I had always lived in hotels: from 1942 to 1945 at Brown's Hotel in London, and from November 1945 until 1963, when I started work in London, at the Savoy Hotel in Cheltenham.

The book begins with a brief account of how my father, who grew up in a rural village in Central Switzerland, became the manager of one of London's most prestigious hotels, and how he and his growing family lived through the war years in London. Here, already, certain events are seen through the eyes of a child.

The largest section of the book is devoted to life at the Savoy Hotel in Cheltenham during the years from 1945 to the 1960s. We never had a private apartment in the hotel, nor did our rooms have private bathrooms. We had no more privacy than the guests. As my mother, with six children, could not keep an eye on all of us all the time, we enjoyed considerable freedom, both in the garden and

in the hotel. As a result, we came into regular contact with an unusually wide range of people. We were in daily contact with the staff: dishwashers, porters, chambermaids, waiters and waitresses, gardeners, house-keepers and office staff. We knew several of them quite well, saw them at work and sometimes helped them. So we knew their jobs, just as we knew how our father earned his living. Besides the staff, we knew the guests, especially the many long-stay residents whom we saw daily. We observed them with interest and were sometimes amused by their peculiar habits. They often chatted with us —

most people like little children – and sometimes even gave us presents.

For this account, I have relied largely on my own memories of childhood and adolescence. However, I have also included information I had from my parents (verbally, from diaries and letters and from the memoirs they wrote for their children) and from my brothers and sisters. I found information about many of our hotel residents and staff in electoral registers and indexes of wills and administrations, census returns, newspaper articles, ship passenger lists, and in the internet in general. Most of the photographs come from the Savoy Hotel archives or from collections left behind by my parents.

# West Surrey Swiss Club: The provoking performance of the 'Arms and the Man'

Our first event of the year was a Saturday matinée on 7 January at the Orange Tree Theatre in Richmond preceded by a pub lunch at the Orange Tree pub next door. We watched a thought-provoking performance of 'Arms and the Man' by George Bernard Shaw.

This famous personality who was born in Dublin in 1856 finally found commercial success with this play written around 9 years later. It is a comedy of social satire, bordering on farce, set during the Bulgarian-Serbian war around 1885 written by a man who was not only alive at the time but was committed to socialism and anti-war beliefs. One of the main protagonists is Captain Buntschli, a very pragmatic Swiss professional soldier who apparently when questioned, confessed he joined the Serbian Army because 'it was the nearest'! The Serbs are defeated and Buntschli is seen on the run and seeking sanctuary in our young heroine's bedroom who, after some hesitation, hides him under a large fur on her bed. He admits to being hungry and asks for chocolates and then devours several chocolate creams. Claiming to be a very experienced soldier and prefers to carry chocolates in his uniform pocket since they are more valuable than bullets. This astounds the young lady since her suitor, Sergius, is a swaggering cavalry Major. He is quite the opposite of Buntschli seemingly inspired by the glory of war and death and romantic love whose feelings are mirrored by his lover Raina as well.



The play exposes the ridiculous attitudes of the military upper classes of the day and equally ridiculous romanticism associated with it via the amusing plot in which Raina is able to see the rather artificial feelings of a 'higher love' she has for Sergius whilst he realises he has more down to earth feelings for their vivacious servant who is looking to better herself! Raina comes to the conclusion that she actually has more in common with Buntschli and calls him 'her little chocolate soldier'. In the finale Sergius jilts Raina in favour of the servant whilst Buntschli, discovering that Raina is older than he realises and therefore eligible, faces objections from the family regarding how an ordinary soldier like him with a low social position can support their daughter.

The hilarious climax then comes when Buntschli discloses to them his recently acquired inheritance without actually mentioning the hotels. He reads from the inventory prepared in detail in the Swiss manner in addition to uttering the famous line, 'My rank is the highest known in Switzerland: I am a free citizent'. Buntschli goes on to list his assets which dwarf those of the Bulgarian family namely, 300 servants, 200 horses, 6 palaces, 10,000 teaspoons, knives, forks etc which causes the father to say 'Are you the Emperor of Switzerland?'. The happy couple is betrothed and Buntschli looks at his watch and says he must leave at once and will return promptly in two weeks with the wedding plans. He departs leaving the astounded family and the last words are from Sergius who says 'What a man!'.

For the 2023 edition, the festival is partnering up with LEEDS2023 and the EU Delegation to the UK and planning to present the festival in two locations: in Leeds in April 2023 and at the Institut francais in London in May 2023.

The programme will be curated in 3–4 blocks of screenings across 2 days accompanied panel discussions (Q&A) with the filmmakers, industry events and workshops.

The following film has been selected to represent Switzerland: OLDSCHOOL, by Yasmine Bahechar. Somewhere in Geneva, a friendship between a group of girls has been forged between the Rhône and the Arve, right where the two rivers meet and mix

homogeneously. A departure can turn things upside down. There are those who leave and those who stay. Those who leave, leave behind memories. Those who see people leaving, keep the memories.

OLDSCHOOL is a short film written and directed by Yasmine Bahechar. In 2020 she completed a Bachelor's degree in filmmaking from the Geneva University of Art and Design (HEAD – Genève), with honours for her film OLDSCHOOL (2020).
