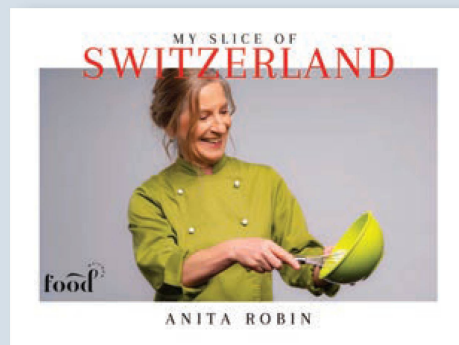

Online desk for Swiss Nationals residing Abroad

Entering your details in the Register of the Swiss Abroad, ordering confirmations, announcing civil status matters, and subscribing to publications: The

FDFA's online desk offers Swiss nationals abroad the opportunity to request services from the comfort of their homes. It simplifies correspondence between Swiss nationals and their Swiss representation. Once you have opened an account, you can access your details online in the Register of the Swiss Abroad.

AUS: May 2023 – Mobile Passport Station in Perth

Ensure your civil status information is up-to-date

Do you plan to take advantage of the opportunity to renew your passport in Perth? Make sure your civil status is updated with the Consulate General of Switzerland in Sydney in order for the representation to inform the competent civil status authority in Switzerland. Please note that registering a civil status change can take up to three months. Passport applications can only be processed once the registration has been completed in Switzerland. Furthermore, please ensure that your email address is up-to-date in the records of the representation in Sydney. **Please note, dates of the visit in Perth are still to be confirmed.**

AUS: Jungbürgerfeier in Sydney

From Swiss Club of NSW: On 27 February, the Jungbürgerfeier event for 2023 was hosted by Consul General of Switzerland Conny Camenzind at her Residence in Sydney. Invited were young Swiss living in NSW who have or will turn 18 this year and are registered with the Swiss Consulate. The event aimed to highlight all the services that are extended to Swiss citizens in Australia. Other topics covered were voting rights of the Swiss Abroad and of particular interest to some young Swiss were the education possibilities at Swiss Universities, opportunities for overseas travel and networking, and Swiss events and culture in Sydney.

Approximately 20 young Swiss attended the event. Among the guests were also Consul Andrea Köppel Nko'o, Head of Trade Point Australia Mascia Buzzolini, Council of the Swiss Abroad Beat Knoblauch, Vice-Chair at Australia Chapter at European Travel Commission Livio Goetz and Martin Frutiger, Webmaster at the Swiss Club of NSW. The Swiss Club offered the young Swiss a 3-year free membership to the Club.

The Young Swiss also participated in a 'Swiss Quiz' organised by the Swiss Consulate, which tested their knowledge of Switzerland. Congratulations to the winners who took home Swiss gifts. After the formal proceedings, the young Swiss and guest speakers had the opportunity to network and chat. The evening ended with the presentation of Swiss goody bags containing numerous Swiss items, gifts, informative pamphlets, and Lindt chocolate offered by generous sponsors.

Congratulations to the young Swiss who took the time to celebrate this important moment in their life and for showing pride in their Swiss heritage.





Switzerland opened its first representation, a Consulate, in the year 1912 in Auckland. In 1937 the Consulate moved to Wellington and in 1959 it was upgraded to a Consulate General. Switzerland established diplomatic relations with New Zealand in 1962 and opened an Embassy in Wellington in 1963 since New Zealand had a growing need for more independence in their foreign policy.

After the establishment of diplomatic relations between Switzerland and New Zealand, the first Swiss Ambassadors characterized the

relation as mutual “getting to know each other”, which from today’s perspective also included amusing and clichéd aspects. For example, the local media in New Zealand were interested in the cooking skills of the diplomats’ wives and mentioned the beauty of the Alpine country. New Zealand readers also learned that Swiss women had no voting rights until 1971. Max Corti, the first resident Ambassador, moved to Wellington in 1969. The customs and traditions of the New Zealanders, as well as their leisure activities, initially seemed strange and unfamiliar to him but he soon focused on the economic and political aspects of the bilateral relations. Ambassador Corti underlined the importance of adequate and appropriate Swiss representation in New Zealand. In the following years economic relations improved and trade delegations from New Zealand travelled to Switzerland and vice-versa. While New Zealand was in search of new foreign investors, Switzerland lamented about certain customs barriers and other obstacles to trade. Soon after, a double taxation agreement was signed and with a few exceptions, the volume of trade increased slightly but steadily.

The Swiss representation in New Zealand was headed four times in succession by a Chargé d’Affaires. Although no disadvantages are seen in the appointment of a Chargé d’Affaires instead of an Ambassador, it was observed that New Zealand would appreciate the appointment of an Ambassador again at a later stage.

In the late 1980s, multilateral political and scientific issues and topics gained increasing importance and more bilateral agreements were signed. In the year 2000, Ambassador Sylvie Matteucci presented her credentials in Wellington. There has never been a New Zealand Embassy in Switzerland, it is based in Berlin instead. Thus, in 2002 it was observed that the bilateral relations between Switzerland and New Zealand were good but not very intensive and therefore the closure of our representation in Wellington was being considered. Thanks to a strong lobby in the parliament, the Department of Foreign Affairs of Switzerland did not press ahead with the closure of the Embassy.

In the past, Switzerland offered its good services to New Zealand and represented the country three times: in 1952/53 in Iran, between 1956-1959 in Egypt and from 1984-1995 in Libya.

2023 marks the 60th Anniversary of diplomatic relations between Switzerland and Aotearoa New Zealand, the land of the Long White Cloud. Yet, there are no clouds on the bilateral horizon. On the contrary, we share the same values and advance them together in the international arena – most notably by defending a rules-based international order for the sake of peace, human rights, the climate and free trade. Our bilateral trade relations provide room for more and there are sectors in which our relations can be developed further, e.g. by bringing Swiss trains, transport and waste management solutions to New Zealand or by increasing our cooperation in the field of vocational education and training.

NZ: Cyclone Gabrielle: New Zealand in a state of emergency

On 12 February, cyclone Gabrielle hit New Zealand’s North Island’s northernmost region and tracked down the east coast leaving behind widespread trail of devastation and destruction. The storm killed 11 people and caused damage on a scale that New Zealand has not seen for at least a generation. About 10,500 people have been displaced and 144,000 properties remained without power. The Government declared a National State of Emergency for 14 days which applied to six regions: Northland, Auckland, Tairāwhiti, Bay of Plenty, Waikato and Hawke’s Bay and announced an emergency relief package of \$186m. Experts fear that the total costs of the disaster could rise above \$8bn.

The Embassy of Switzerland in Wellington followed the events closely and has always been at the disposal of Swiss nationals (residents and tourists alike) in need. We have been contacted by a few Swiss tourists stranded in Napier and had several requests by Swiss tourists whose travel plans have been affected. However, so far there were no reports of any Swiss people injured or gone missing. New Zealand’s disaster response has been active and functioning but due to internet fibre cuts and power outages, some communities were without cell phone and internet connection for several days and until connections were restored, relatives overseas had difficulties communicating with their loved ones. Thus, New Zealand Police encouraged people to report that they were safe via registering via the New Zealand Police ‘I’m Alive’ website: <https://forms.police.govt.nz/im-alive>

New Zealand has been affected by tropical cyclones and flooding due to heavy rainfall previously and is also located in an earthquake zone. Furthermore, there are numerous volcanoes active on the North Island.

The Swiss Embassy therefore advises Swiss nationals to observe the weather forecasts as well as the warnings and instructions by the local authorities such as the Civil Defense (www.civildefence.govt.nz/) and GeoNet (www.geonet.org.nz/) carefully.

An important part of our journey to Europe last year was my father-in-law's 100th birthday. We planned a celebration with about 35 guests who consisted of many relatives, the few of his remaining friends and several people he knew well from work or from his involvement with the union. With the help of staff of the aged care facility, especially its fantastic chef, it became a great occasion. The president of the Basel Bürgergemeinde visited as well, together with her 'Weibel' in historic costume (the lady's personal assistant), who presented the centenarian with a wonderful bouquet. This made the celebration even more special. The festive meal was certainly enjoyed by everyone, not least by my father-in-law, who, to our surprise, took more than three hours before he nodded away sometime after coffee and then needed a proper rest upstairs. In the days and weeks which followed, he mentioned again and again to my husband: "My birthday was such a wonderful day! To think that all these people were there just for me!" And a little later: "Bisch jetzt du au do gsy?" ("Have you been here as well"?).

It proves to me what I read in an article many years ago, that "people with dementia may forget events (or their details) quite quickly, but emotional memory lingers. Feelings of frustration, joy, happiness or despair may continue well past the event that provoked the feeling". (Meredith Gresham, SMH 14.1.2013).

Isn't it good to know that we can make people with dementia feel joyous. So, if you have an older relative or friend whose brain is no longer functioning as it used to, do not give up on him or her. Take this person out for a lovely walk through the garden or drive to the beach together, look at old photos and reminisce about the olden days, sing songs you both remember and, especially if it is your mum, dad or grandparent, don't forget to give each other many hugs.

Study mission to bolster cooperation in vocational education and training

Most young people growing up in Switzerland have an important choice to make when aged 15 years old and nearing the completion of lower secondary school: around 60% of young people opt for an apprenticeship, or in other words, vocational education and training (VET).

Apprenticeships are an integral part of Switzerland's educational system. It prepares a broad cross-section of students for over 230 professions across the entire economy – technology, hospitality, banking, insurances, health, as well as most traditional trades and crafts, so white-collar as well as blue-collar jobs. This well-regarded career pathway that combines on-the-job training with one to two days per week of lessons in vocational schools contributes significantly to maintain a low youth unemployment rate, but furthermore, Swiss companies offer apprenticeships as part of their strategy for building a talent pipeline. In turn, the apprentices receive a high-quality vocational education, which then gives them direct access to the labour market. The combination of highly skilled professionals with academically trained specialists is key to drive innovation outputs and thus to lift the global competitiveness of the export-oriented Swiss economy. The professional associations (trade and branch associations) and the individual companies are responsible for defining and continuously updating the actual training content, thereby ensuring that the skills of the workforce meet the needs of the labour market. The companies offer apprenticeship positions and cover the practical part of the training. The social partners (employers association and trade unions) also have a role in the management of the system. VET enjoys high social status and is therefore perceived as being an equally valuable alternative to the academic path. In fact, former apprentices have risen to lead

major companies across the Swiss economy, Federal Departments and even the Swiss Confederation – as was the case in 2021 with then President of the Swiss Confederation Guy Parmelin, who started his professional career after his apprenticeship in agriculture. In Switzerland, VET is part of a flexible and permeable education system that ensures everyone has access to further training, higher education, or the possibility to explore career changes throughout their lives. There are no dead ends in the Swiss education system. The Swiss model of apprenticeship is widely considered a success story, and yet, in a fast-changing environment, exchanges amongst experts, trainers and practitioners is necessary to keep up with today's challenges. This led a

consortium of organisations including Movetia, the Swiss national agency for mobility and exchange, the Swiss Federal University for Vocational Education and training, and the Geneva-based Global Apprenticeship Network to undertake a mission in Melbourne and Auckland on the topic of the 'Future of apprenticeships' from 5 to 10 February 2023.

Over 170 delegates, with 32 speakers from six countries, gathered with the aim of sharing perspectives and building stronger relationships and areas for future collaboration. The two Swiss Embassies in Oceania were actively involved in supporting the mission as part of their mandate to promote the Swiss education system and foster international mobility of students and young professionals.
