The 99th Congress of the Swiss Abroad 2023 in St. Gallen: Celebrating Swiss Culture and Global Identity

The 99th Congress of the Swiss Abroad in St. Gallen in August 2023 was a momentous celebration of Swiss culture and its global significance. Organized by the Organization of the Swiss Abroad, St. Gallen served as the host city for this annual tradition, bringing together up to 400 Swiss citizens living around the world for a unique and diverse gathering.

The Congress had two central themes: increasing participation in the political process and promoting Swiss culture abroad. Deeply rooted in values such as commitment, excellence and solidarity, Swiss culture serves as a vital link between Swiss citizens around the world and their homeland. The Swiss abroad play a crucial role in fostering strong global relationships, particularly in areas such as diplomacy, science and technology.

In an election year, the Congress emphasized the importance of culture in shaping political discussions, fostering understanding and contributing to economic prosperity. Culture, it was emphasized, is not only an art form, but also a driver of creativity, innovation and entrepreneurship.

St. Gallen was a fitting host city, reflecting Switzerland's rich cultural heritage through its own history and traditions. The Congress featured a three-day program of activities and discussions. The Council of the Swiss Abroad met on the first day to discuss several issues, including the upcoming federal elections and the introduction of e-voting, a convenience for registered Swiss abroad.

The cultural tour allowed participants to explore the campus of the University of St. Gallen and its significant works of art. The Congress officially opened with a ceremony and speeches by key figures, including Filippo Lombardi, President of the Organization of the Swiss Abroad.

The second day focused on the political program, with discussions on voting trends among the Swiss abroad, party positions on the OSA election manifesto and the importance of the SRG's foreign mandate for Switzerland. The day culminated in a plenary session on Swiss culture as an export product and its international influence.

The final evening was a lively mix of speeches, concerts and dinner,

giving participants the opportunity to celebrate Swiss culture. The Congress concluded with a Sunday excursion to Appenzell, where participants immersed themselves in Swiss traditions and enjoyed the country's scenic beauty.

As the 99th Congress came to a close, participants were filled with pride in their Swiss heritage and a deeper appreciation for the role of culture in uniting Swiss citizens worldwide. Swiss culture was reaffirmed as an export product, strengthening Switzerland's international image and global influence.

Looking ahead, the 100th Congress of the Swiss Abroad in 2024 promises to be another major event, to be held in Lucerne from July 11 to 13, 2024. Until then, Swiss culture will continue to shine, transcending borders and connecting Swiss citizens around the world.

Moving Back to Switzerland - Experiences in the First 6 Months

In the March edition of the Swiss Review USA, I wrote about our decision to move back to Switzerland after living abroad for almost 30 years.

Beginning of March, the team of Swiss National Radio and TV (SRF) came to film our move as part of their series "Bi de Lüt – Heimweh". Our container left Miami mid-March. On April 1st, we saw our new apartment in Weggis for the first time since renting it. My initial thought was, how do I fit all the furniture from our 20' foot container? The owner who lives upstairs arranged for a bottle of wine, two glasses, and two chairs for us to relax before the container arrived. Once all furniture was placed in the apartment – it all fit. At first, we were also struggling with plugs, adapters and converters!

The registration procedure with the administration office of Weggis as well as with all the other authorities and insurances was very efficient. Grocery shopping was time consuming at the beginning because in the last 30 years we only bought chocolate and Aromat from Swiss supermarkets when visiting Switzerland. After some time, we also got the e-banking in place which was not that easy. Shocking was when I received the invoice of putting up three lamps or the bill from the hairdresser ... Swiss workmanship comes at a price! Note: Can you imagine that whenever you order things or receive services, you won't have to pay in advance but get invoiced?!

May came and we participated as volunteers at the Riviera Latina Festival in Weggis. Yes, Salsa music for three days: "Viva las Weggis". Thomas is volunteering at the Furka Dampfbahn Bergstrecke where over 400 volunteers run a fabulous vintage steam railroad up in the high mountains of the Swiss Alps. And of course, we did sign up to be members of the Swiss American Club in Lucerne.

We spent the summer hiking in the mountains and traveling in Europe. We decided not to buy a car and exclusively make use of Switzerland's extensive and highly efficient public transportation system. If there is a rainy day in the northern part of Switzerland, we go for lunch to Milano by train in only 2 1/2 hours. Catching up with

old friends in all parts of Switzerland is fantastic. There is never a dull moment and if so, there are a lot of museums, concerts, or exhibitions all over Switzerland.

Now you may ask if I miss anything from Miami? Yes, my friends, but some already came and visited and I hope this will continue. Miami is a great city which I love, but at my stage of life Switzerland is a good solution. However, I have not experienced a winter – that may change my mind!

Almost forgot to tell you about recycling: The first time I went to the Ökihof in Küsnacht, the driver in the car next to me asked me if I'm ok. Apparently, I must have looked pretty baffled about the variety of recycling options there are!

Since I am back, I found out that most Swiss people are open minded, honest, and helpful. You just have to take the first step since it's not customary for them to talk to people they don't know.

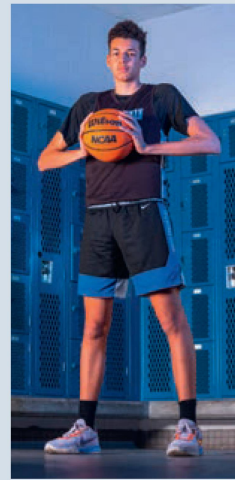

Celebrating 175 Years of Modern Switzerland: A Reflective Panel Discussion at the National Constitution Center

On September 8, 2023, history enthusiasts, scholars and the public gathered at the National Constitution Center in Philadelphia to commemorate the 175th anniversary of modern Switzerland. Organized by the Consulate General of Switzerland in New York and the Swiss Consulate in Philadelphia, the event featured a stimulating panel discussion and reception that explored the historical connections between Switzerland and the United States.

Ambassador Niculin Jäger opened the panel discussion with distinguished experts to delve into the rich tapestry of history shared by these two "sister republics." The panelists included:

- Dr. Brendan O'Leary, Lauder Professor of Political Science at the University of Pennsylvania
- Dr. Tina Kempin Reuter, Professor of Political Science and Public Administration at the University of Alabama at Birmingham
- Fabian Fellmann, US political correspondent for Tamedia
- Moderated by Lauren Swartz, CEO & President of the World Affairs Council of Philadelphia

The conversation revolved around the pivotal moment in Swiss history on September 12, 1848, when the old Swiss Confederacy transformed into a federal state, marking the birth of the first republic in Europe. This momentous occasion in Switzerland's history, as explained by the panelists, was profoundly influenced by ideas from the United States.

Intriguingly, the ties between Switzerland and the United States

are not just one-sided. The panelists uncovered how Switzerland, despite its small size, left an indelible mark on the US constitution, shaping some of its fundamental principles. As the event unfolded, attendees gained a deeper understanding of the enduring historical connections, reinforcing their status as "sister republics" and also continue to influence their political and social landscapes today.

Notable quotes during the event included:

"The remarkable thing about these two sister republics is a certain level of interdependence but a very strong differentiation...Most people don't know any Swiss politicians, and that is a supreme virtue of the Swiss system." Dr. Brendan O'Leary

"Switzerland is a very local place...People do not really move and this is one of the things that makes Switzerland unique, this focus on local culture." Dr. Tina Kempin Reuter

"We see that the electoral system clearly influences the political culture and how politics are carried out [in Switzerland]...The direct democracy forces the politicians to seek consensus, to find out who will be against passing a law - who will seek the votes to get a referendum - and try to avoid that." Mr. Fabian Fellmann

In conclusion, the event offered a thought-provoking glimpse into the enduring relationship between Switzerland and the United States, celebrating 175 years of modern Switzerland while fostering a deeper appreciation for the historical foundations of these "sister republics".
