A familiar voice gone quiet(er)

Christian Froelicher in Melbourne has been the Executive Producer and well-known voice of the German Language Program of SBS Radio Australia for 29 years. Now, at the tender age of 57 he has decided to retire. Christian's announcement was received with surprise and quite some disbelief by many. What is the program going to be like without the presence of Christian behind and in front of the microphone? What is he going to do now that he has retired?

Swiss Review (Ed): Two interesting questions that many are eager to have answered. But first, tell us a little about you! Where did you grow up and when and what brought you to Australia?

Christian Froelicher: I was born in Italy but grew up in Lucerne, Switzerland. My upbringing was quite multicultural. I would speak Swiss-German with my four siblings and Swiss/US-American father, but Italian and later English with my Italian/US mother. We had relatives in Switzerland, Austria, Italy, Ireland, Chile and the United States. As a result, our family gatherings were

rather noisy and chaotic! I guess that made me the perfect candidate (laughs) for multicultural and multilingual SBS when I came to Australia in 1994, aged 27. I applied from Switzerland and arrived with a one-way ticket. I immediately fell in love with Australia, its people and amazing nature. By 1996, I had an Australian passport.

SR: To be a radio producer and presenter is somewhat unusual and perhaps even a bit glamorous. How did you get into this?

CF: After obtaining my Matura in Lucerne in 1986, I went to Berne to study History, Journalism and Political Science. I also studied in Geneva and visited summer school at San Diego State University, USA. The seed to become a journalist was planted from an early age. I remember my primary teacher in Year 6, Herr Liechti, telling me he liked my essays! Aged 16, I started writing articles ('Wald-und-Wiesen-Journalismus') for my local newspaper, the gloriously named 'Vaterland' which later merged with its rival LNN to become today's Luzerner Zeitung. Aged 20, I switched to radio journalism, first with Radio Extra Bern, then for five years with DRS 1 and its youth network DRS 3. That was a lot of fun, especially DRS 1 where I hosted the Nachtclub from 12am to 6am, 1-3 times a week. I also worked for a news wire service, Schweizerische Politische Korrespondenz. In hindsight, I must have gotten very little sleep! No wonder it took me 7.5 years to finish my degree.

SR: What is the most fascinating and satisfying aspect of the job?

CF: The best thing about being a radio producer is going on air. There's something magical that happens when you talk to an invisible audience. It's very intimate and somewhat surreal there's very little room for error. I was quite frightened when I calculated how many interviews I conducted in my 29 years at SBS German: Roughly 6,000! But it was never about the host



- it was always about the content: There are so many amazing stories in our community and beyond. My aim was to treat each interview or topic with the respect it deserved, be it an encounter with Roger Federer at 'Switzerland meets Federation Square' or an indepth series in 2005 about the war recollections of our elderly listeners ('Wo waren Sie am 8. Mai 1945?'). I always saw myself as a public servant, not a preacher. My role was to offer others a platform to share their stories and voice their opinions.

SR: Coming back to the first question above, what is the future of the German Language Program without you, and particularly also if one considers that migration from German-speaking countries is decreasing compared with other languages?

CF: There are 68 languages at SBS Radio and every five years, SBS adjusts the programs to reflect the current language composition of Australia. The allocation of programs is based, among other factors, on the results of the census, namely the question 'which languages other than English do you speak at home'. Unfortunately, the number of German speakers in Australia has dropped every five years since I joined SBS German in 1994. To give an example: SBS German once

had 12 one-hour programs per week, then nine, seven and today there are five. They run Monday to Friday from 7-8pm. The entire show and some of the highlights are uploaded to sbs.com.au/german and the team remains heavily invested in Social Media. My successor as Executive Producer is German-born Benjamin Kanthak in Sydney. I'm sure our audience are as excited about Benjamin as I am. In other words: The program is in excellent hands and the future continues to look bright!

SR: There is a saying that busy people will always be busy, even in retirement. What does the future for you look like?

CF: There's a beautiful pun in German, Unruhestand, which suffers a bit when translated. It combines Unruhe (inner unrest or turmoil) with Ruhestand (state of stillness or relaxation). In English, the practical translation might be active retirement. In my case, it will be a mix of travelling, volunteering, spending time with family and pursuing the odd hobby such as going back to playing the piano! Soccer is a big part of my life too. I play in Victoria's Over 45 division and lately started refereeing junior and adult matches in my suburb. However, an immediate project is to reconnect with my old stomping ground: My wife and I secured a four-month 'Gast-Aufenthalt' for our daughter (16) at my old secondary school. Our daughter will be taught in German and learn about her second homeland and its customs and habits. As for myself, I will be in Lucerne for two of the four months and have equipped myself with a 'SBB-Generalabbonnement'. Without wanting to sound like an advert for Switzerland's amazing Public Transport System: What better way is there to explore the stunning hills, lakes and mountains of beautiful Zentralschweiz, than hopping on a 'free' bus, train, boat or mountain cable car?

SR: Thank you Christian, your voice on the air waves will be missed but we wish you all the best for the next exciting chapter in your life.

In August 2023, over 150 Honorary Consuls from all over the world were invited to Bern to attend the 2023 Honorary Consular Conference. Honorary Consuls of Victoria, Queensland, Tasmania, South Australia and Western Australia as well as New Zealand attended the 3-day conference of intense meetings, information gathering and networking to assist them in their work.

On 29 July our National Day dinner was held with around 50 people attending. We were honoured to host a contingent from the Swiss Football Association, including the president Dominique Blanc, and relatives of player Geraldine Reuteler. Zopf, Cervelat, Vol-Au-Vent and Zuger Kirschtorte gave the menu a distinctive Swiss feel.

We here in the deep south haven't traditionally been very engaged with our heritage – our 1 of August event is pretty much all we've organised in recent years – however these few weeks gave us a great opportunity to bring out our inner Swiss!



175th anniversary of the Swiss Constitution

On 12 September 1848, Switzerland stepped into a new federal era with the adoption of a Constitution, which laid down the principles of how the country would be run.

Switzerland's initial birth date is given as 1 August 1291, but it wasn't until 1848 that the country started to bear a resemblance with the nation it is **today**.

High visit from Bern at Sydney 1 August celebration

For many years, Castle Hill Showground has been the venue for the traditional 1 of August Swiss National Day Picnic, organised by the Swiss Yodlers of Sydney and the Swiss Folkdance Group Alpegruess. An ideal place to invite friends, families, and members of the Swiss Community to celebrate a fantastic day with lots of attractions and a real Swiss fest atmosphere. It's easily accessible by car and only a two-minute walk from the nearest public transport, so enjoying a beer, some wine or a 'Kaffi Schnaps' does not harm.

This year, we not only had Ambassador Caroline Bichet-Anthamatten and Deputy Consul General Jérôme Charbonnet as our guests of honour, we were very fortunate to also welcome a very special guest from Switzerland – Federal Councillor and Foreign Minister Mr Ignazio Cassis (pictured)! The entourage of black limousines bearing the Swiss flag arrived right on time at 2.15pm.

Mr Cassis thoroughly enjoyed being greeted in his native language Italian by Martin Scarpino, and after acknowledging the local VIPs, a warm welcome was also extended to the two accompanying Members of the National Council of Switzerland, Thomas Aeschi (SVP) and Yvonne Feri (SP). The team of the Consulate General welcomed the visitors, and everyone assembled for the obligatory group photo.

The entourage then proceeded to pay a visit to all the stalls of the different organisations. Mr Cassis showed great interest and spent some considerable time with the Cercle Romand, the Swiss Club of NSW, and many other stalls.

Some beautiful flower girls then guided Mr Cassis onto the stage, where his speech was eagerly awaited. His charming and skilful address in all four national languages was well received. Mr Cassis spoke of the importance and the strength of the Swiss-Australian relationships and the values both Nations share. He also highlighted the impact the Swiss have made in Australia and the contribution we make. He was delighted to see over 1000 people attending a day where Swiss values had priority. After acknowledging the traditional custodians of the land, past, present and future, the tunes of the Swiss and Australian National Anthems stirred many hearts.



With the official part over, a well-deserved Bratwurst, Rivella and Nussgipfel awaited our guests. A special table was set up with the best view to enjoy the performance of the Swiss Yodlers of Sydney, who sang 'Am Jodlertisch' and 'Bärgarve', and two lovely dances presented by the Folkdance Group Alpegruess. And all too soon, it was time for the VIPs to depart for their next official appointment.

Meanwhile, the raffle sold over 6000 tickets, and the 'Streichelzoo' and kids rides were very popular with the younger generation. Swiss goodies were also in high demand including Rivella, Raclette, Swiss cheeses, Landjäger, Nussgipfel, Biberli and of course Bratwurst, Cervelats and Fleischkäse. By 4pm, everything was sold out!

The weather gods were smiling upon us which added to the success of the event. Everyone had an entertaining and memorable day enjoying Swiss traditions and of course the very special visit by Mr Cassis.

A big thank-you goes to all the people who helped setting up the event, run the stalls, and provide the time and effort to achieve such a great outcome.
