The U.S. and the Swiss Constitutions

The U.S. Constitution has had a significant influence on the Swiss Constitution, as well as many other constitutions around the world. This influence is evident in several key areas, including federalism, the separation of powers, and the protection of individual rights. Here's how the U.S. Constitution has specifically influenced the Swiss Constitution:



Federalism: Both the United States and Switzerland are federal states, meaning that power is divided between a central (federal) government and individual states (in the U.S.) or cantons (in Switzerland). The U.S. Constitution was one of the earliest examples of a successful federal system, and its structure influenced the Swiss decision to adopt a federal system in their own constitution of 1848. Previously, Switzerland had been a loose confederation of independent cantons. The Swiss constitution adopted a federal system that allowed for a strong central government while preserving the autonomy of the cantons.

Separation of Powers: The concept of dividing government powers into separate branches (legislative, executive, and judicial) to prevent any one branch from becoming too powerful is a core principle of the U.S. Constitution. This principle was also adopted in the Swiss Constitution, which establishes a Federal Assembly (legislature), a Federal Council (executive), and a Federal Court (judiciary), each with distinct functions and powers.

Protection of Individual Rights: The U.S. Constitution, particularly through its Bill of Rights, emphasizes the protection of individual freedoms and rights. The Swiss Constitution also contains a catalogue of fundamental rights. While the specific rights and the extent of their protection may vary between the two constitutions, the underlying principle of protecting individual rights is a common feature.

Democratic Processes: The U.S. Constitution establishes a system of representative democracy with mechanisms for direct participation by the electorate, such as elections. The Swiss Constitution goes even further in incorporating direct democracy, allowing citizens to play a more direct role in the legislative process through tools such as referendums and popular initiatives, a feature that, while not directly derived from the U.S. model, reflects a similar commitment to democratic governance.

Constitutional Amendments: Both constitutions provide mechanisms for their own amendment, allowing for adaptability over time. While the processes differ, the inclusion of such mechanisms reflects an understanding of the need for constitutions to evolve with changing societal norms and values.

The influence of the U.S. Constitution on the Swiss Constitution is a testament to the historical significance of the former and its role as a model for constitutional governance. However, it's also important to note that the Swiss Constitution reflects Switzerland's unique historical, cultural, and social context and contains elements specifically tailored to Swiss traditions and values.

175th Anniversary of the Swiss Federal Constitution of 1948

In 2023, Switzerland commemorated the Swiss Federal Constitution of 1848. The Federal Constitution forms the basic legal order of the Swiss Confederation: it regulates the relationship between the Confederation and the Cantons, the structure and responsibilities of the federal authorities and the fundamental rights and duties of citizens.

The International Bundesbrief Society together with Kaufmann Rüedi Attorneys at Law, the University of Lucerne, and the Obwalden Institute for Justice Research organized two events. Preparations began in 2020 in Philadelphia at the PA Historical Society for the loan of their U.S. Articles of Confederation. The first event on November 16, 2023 at the University of Lucerne focused on celebrating the shared democratic and constitutional heritage of the United States and Switzerland. There was an exhibition of the original German version of the U.S. Articles of Confederation of 1778, the first American constitution. There are interesting connections between the U.S. Articles of Confederation, with which the American colonies entered into a "firm league of friendship" (Article 3), and the Swiss Federal Constitution of 1848, by which the peoples of the then 22 sovereign cantons united to form a federation (Article 1).

The festivities to mark the 175th anniversary of the Swiss Federal Constitution concluded with a reception and exhibition on November 27, 2023 at the Federal Court in Lucerne. Cantonal Councilor Dr. Armin Hartmann and Federal Judge Marcel Maillard spoke as guests of honor. In addition, selected students from the University of Lucerne and pupils from the Alpenquai cantonal high school presented their digital exhibition project at the Federal Supreme Court. An important aim of the celebrations was to host open discussions with the younger

generation on such topics as freedom, democracy and personal responsibility. Anna, a student at the Alpenquai cantonal high school, took part in the digital project, explaining that "on an anniversary, people like to look back into the past, but I also want to look forward." University of Lucerne students Yasmin and Georgina also shared their enthusiasm. In order to keep the tradition alive, they have already set a reminder for 2047 to start planning the celebrations for the 200th anniversary of the Swiss Federal Constitution in 2048!

The North American Swiss Singing Alliance (NASSA) is a international Swiss Singing organization, currently comprised of 13 Swiss choral groups from the Upper Mid-West and Canada, representing approximately 300 singers in mixed, men's, women's and yodel choirs. The North American Swiss Singing Alliance will be holding its 43rd Sängerfest in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, June 20-23, 2024. The Sängerfest is a celebration of Swiss music, history and traditions.

The first Sängerfest was held in 1897 in Cleveland, Ohio. Pittsburgh previously hosted the Sängerfest in 1939, 1971, and 1997. The most recent Sängerfest was held in Toledo, Ohio in 2018 (a Sängerfest scheduled for Edmonton, Alberta, Canada in 2021 was canceled due to the Covid pandemic).


Louisiana: Swiss American Society of New Orleans (SASNOLA)
