These prizes will be awarded to the best original, unpublished essays in the social history of medicine submitted to each competition as judged by the SSHM's assessment panel. The 2002 essay competition is open to post-doctoral scholars and faculty who obtained their PhD or equivalent qualification after 31st December 1996. The 2002 student essay competition is open to students in full or part-time education. Each prize winner will be awarded £300.00, and his or her entry may also be published in the journal *Social History of Medicine*. ### **Technotopias: Texts, Identities, and Technological Cultures. 10th to 12th July 2002, Glasgow, UK. An Interdisciplinary Conference organised by the Department of English Studies, University of Strathclyde**

The University of Strathclyde is a world leader in science and engineering yet, like many similar institutions, it maintains a strong commitment to the humanities. In societies that seem to place increasing emphasis on the application of technology and scientific knowledge this kind of commitment is sometimes seen as irrelevant. For humanities departments this situation raises new questions of identity, within both university faculties and cultural discourses itself. In the light of this situation Technotopias aims to investigate the complex historical and contemporary interplay between the humanities and technology. Firstly, Technotopias aims to reflect upon the place of the arts within modern academia; secondly, to investigate the complex historical and contemporary interplay between the humanities and technology; and finally, to address the impact of these relationships upon the formation of physical

and cultural identities. To realise the interdisciplinary nature of this conference, papers from all fields of literary and cultural criticism, as well as the scientific and technological disciplines will be presented.
