PRO AERO : WE MUST NOT LAG BEHIND !

Germany possesses 7 Civilian Flying Schools, 23 Gliding Schools, 465 Glider Camps and over 1,000 positions for gliding practice. In the N. S. Flying Corps there are 62,000 active Pilots; 80,000 young people of the Hitler Youth have their flying preliminary. Model construction in Germany is part of the school syllabus.

Italy has 39 Flying Schools, 2 Gliding Schools, 53 Schools for model construction, and 30,000 young flyers. Like in Germany, model construction is compulsory in school.

France expended in 1938, 78 millions French francs for their popular flying.

England possesses 59 Flying Schools, while 29 new Schools have come into being lately. A complete Pilot course costs no more than 90-100 frs. The new Civilian Air Defence has at their disposal about 34,000 applications.

Switzerland has at the present time :-

To rectify this deficiency and come into line with the other countries, the Aero Club of Switzerland has, with the assistance of the Federal Authorities, opened the second Pro Aero collection. Last year's collection produced 363,000 frs. which was utilised for Model flying work, for Glider groups and for Civilian flying, and should help to lay the foundation of military flying. To achieve the object much is to be done yet. A much larger Pilot Corps and much more material is needed for this purpose. All the Cantonal authorities have granted their permission for the sale of PRO AERO badges.
