CELEBRATIONS IN NEW ZEALAND.

The Swiss Consulate at Wellington will be closed on the first and second of August. In commemoration of the occasion the Swiss Flag will be hoisted on the building on both days.

A congratulatory cable message will be despatched in the name of the members of the Swiss Benevolent Society in New Zealand to the President of the Swiss Confederation, Mr. Ernst Wetter, in time to reach him at Schwyz for the official celebrations. Special greetings will be included to General Guisan for the Army. A cable will be sent also to the Swiss Club of New South Wales at Sydney, who are arranging a banquet for the evening of August 1, at Farmers', Sydney.

At Auckland our fellow-countrymen will celebrate the occasion at the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. Peyer, and a representative gathering is expected.

In the Waikato, two celebration parties will be held in the evening of August 2. The Swiss of Waihou, Te Aroha, Morrinsville, Paeroa and Thames will gather at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Steiner, Waihou, while the Swiss community of Springdale will be guests of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Werder. The musical and gastronomic items of the planned programme sound enticing.

The Swiss community at Wellington will celebrate in one of the Club Rooms of the Evening Post Building, also on the 2nd of August. The musical programme is in charge of the able musicians Messrs. Max Bruehlisauer, Hermann Schlatter and Karl von Rickenbach, whereas Mr. Tony Komminoth will don the white cap of chef de cuisine and pastry-cook.

COMMEMORATION SOUVENIRS.

Orders for Commemoration Souvenirs (Commemoration Booklets, Memorial Tableaux, Commemoration Coins, see June issue "Helvetia") can still be placed with the Consulate of Switzerland at Wellington, P.O. CELEBRATION BROADCASTS.

Please note the change regarding the time-table of all the broadcasts announced in the June issue of the "Helvetia". They have now definitely been fixed for the following days and hours:

SPECIAL SHORTWAVE BROADCASTS FROM SWITZERLAND:

Friday, August 1, 1941: From 4.45 p.m. to 6.30 p.m., shortwave-length 20.64 and 26.31.

Sunday, August 3, 1941: Same time and wavelength as above.

The Sunday programme as regards essential items will be a repetition of the programme of Friday.

SPECIAL NEW ZEALAND CELEBRATION BROADCAST OVER 2YA WELLINGTON:

To mark the occasion of the 650th Anniversary of the Foundation of the Swiss Confederation, the National Broadcasting Service is honouring Switzerland, as already has been mentioned in the June issue of the "Helvetia", with a special programme of Swiss history, characteristics and achievements. The programme will be interspersed with musical items,

and will now take place on August 1, from 7.45 p.m. to 8.30 p.m., over 2YA Wellington.

REGULAR SHORTWAVE BROADCASTS FROM SWITZERLAND.

The Special First-Sunday-of-the-month-Broadcast, on July 6, 1941:

Due to atmospheric disturbances Switzerland like many other continental stations could not be received.

Daily Broadcasts from Switzerland:

The daily shortwave broadcasts on meter-band 48.66 from Switzerland are now coming in very well, although there are usually more static disturbances on the 48 shortwave band than on other meter-bands, which frequently spoil the otherwise excellent reception. Switzerland can now be heard daily on the 48 meter-band (48.66) in the morning at 8.40 a.m. until 9.15 a.m. or thereabouts, and again in the evening from 4.40 p.m. to 5.15 p.m. The broadcasts bring the daily news from Switzerland and abroad, and there is also a good deal of music.

SHORTWAVE-LENGTH 31.32 ON THE NIGHT FROM AUGUST 1 TO
AUGUST 2 (MIDNIGHT OF FRIDAY TO SATURDAY), 12 to 12.30.
